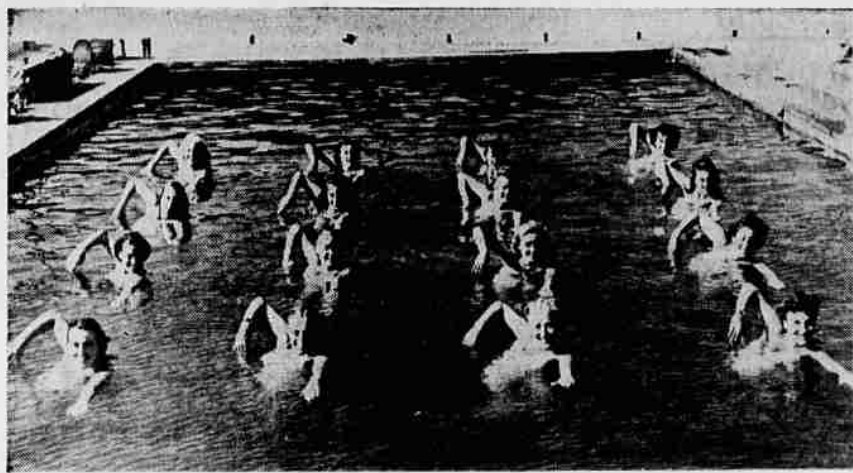

Water Follies Give Fair Goers New Type of Entertainment

A new type of entertainment will greet State Fair goers at the evening show, to be held before the main grandstand every night of week, from Labor day, September 4, to September 10.

The Water Follies of 1950, showing for the first time on the west coast, will be presented on the stage and in two portable pools. The show opens nightly at 8 o'clock.

Seventy performers make up the cast of the two hour show, which offers 12 water acts and 10 stage acts. Produced by Sam Snyder, with a musical score conducted by Larry Flint, the show is completely unlike anything that has shown before in Oregon.

Featured by the Follies are some spectacularly scenic effects, with the chorus swimming in precision in the portable pools which are, incidentally, the world's largest. The water ballet, swum in darkness with luminous suits is especially beautiful.

Among the outstanding stars to show with the Follies here are Bob Maxwell, world's leading acrobatic diver, and the only one in the world who can do a seven-somersault dive from a 10 foot board; Roger Nadeau, New England Diving Champion; Emile Hotte, Canadian Diving Champion; Eddie Mullane, U.S. Diving Champion and the Vinson Twins, identical twins who hold the National Synchronized Tandem Swimming Championship.

Eddie Rose, the water comedian, has been called by Eddy Cantor, who once toured with the show, the best in the business.

On the stage side, Martha Ann Bentley, one of the nation's foremost ballerinas, heads the bill. With her is Gloria French, singing star of the show, whom last month signed a movie contract, and Jack Marlin, talented mimic. Others include the three Marino sisters, acrobatic dancing team, Rose and Loden, an excellent comedy act, and the Norman Brothers, hand balancers. Lennie Loden is master of ceremonies.

Neatly staged, the show moves rapidly without a pause. With acts moving from diving pool to stage to swimming pool, there's never a pause between scenes.

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Nebraska Gov. Backs Matthews

Portland, Ore., Aug. 28 (U.P.)—Nebraska's Gov. Val Peterson has come to the defense of Navy Secretary Francis Matthews in his fight for a firmer stand against Russia.

Peterson departed from a prepared speech yesterday at the Oregon Republican club picnic to comment on the public repudiation of Secretary of State Dean Acheson has made on Matthews' stand.

"Matthews has done a lot of study on communists and he knows them for the stinking conspirators they are," the corn belt governor said.

He said, "Acheson can't stand, or understand, firmness to reds or pinkos."

Returning to his prepared speech, Peterson laid the blame for the Korean situation in particular and for the precarious world situation generally at the feet of the democratic administration.

Bar Lattimore From Speaking

Portsmouth, N.H., Aug. 28 (U.P.)—A scheduled speech by Owen Lattimore was cancelled by management of the fashionable Wentworth-by-the-Sea hotel last night because of protests by guests.

James B. Smith, owner of the resort hotel, said 210 of 350 guests voted 121 to 89 in a poll against Lattimore's appearance at an informal "Sunday night entertainment session." The 140 other guests, he said, did not return ballots.

Smith said he decided on taking a poll to determine the sentiment of the majority of guests after several protested verbally. Lattimore, whose subject was to have been "The Situation in Asia," said he was "extremely sorry" at not being allowed to speak.

He added that he wished to "make it clear that I am vacationing from my duties as director of the department of international relations at Johns Hopkins university and these talks I have given recently have been at the request of friends who asked me to stop during my trip."

His appearance at Wentworth-by-the-Sea had been sponsored by William G. Wendell, wealthy Portsmouth resident described as "an old friend of Lattimore's."

Lattimore, a Far Eastern expert, recently was charged by Sen. McCarthy (R., Wis.) with being Russia's "top spy" in this country. He was cleared of all charges by a senate investigating committee.

Hollywood Stars Offer To Entertain Troops

Hollywood, Aug. 28 (U.P.)—Hollywood stars who traveled world-wide to entertain G.I.s in the last war are ready to do the same during the Korean conflict. A spokesman for the Motion Picture association said the

screen's glamour girls and comedians were "ready to do a job" and the association had offered its services to the department of defense.

"They have told us they have no facilities or transportation for us so far," the spokesman said. "They don't feel they can take entertainers into Korea yet. We've asked the secretary of defense to set up a liaison officer here for camp shows, but we don't have even that yet."

Woman Held in OC for Murder

Oregon City, Ore., Aug. 28 (U.P.)—Mrs. Alice Marie Chaboude, 53, was held in Clackamas county jail on a first degree murder charge today after she admitted shooting Curtis A. Kandle, 68, Saturday night.

The shooting grew out of a boisterous birthday celebration which started early Saturday, according to state police.

Police said Mrs. Chaboude, housekeeper for Kandle, admitted firing two shots at the victim, who was attempting to break through the back door of his house at Upper Highland, about 12 miles southeast of here.

New York, Aug. 29 (U.P.)—New York police have arranged to question Screen Star Hedy Lamarr today about her \$250,000 worth of missing jewels.

The actress reported the gems missing Saturday while visiting New York city at the Sherry-Netherland hotel. She has been staying at a summer resort at Southampton, Long Island, about 100 miles east of here.

Miss Lamarr had delayed reporting the loss, thinking she might have left the jewels at Southampton. On her return there, however, she decided they had been lost in New York. She said they were not insured.
