

Three Public Hearings Set By Council for September 11

Three public hearings will be held by the city council at the meeting of Monday night, Sept. 11. They were set by the council at the meeting last night.

The most important will be on application of the Salem school board for a change in zone from business for the old Washington school property which the board has optioned to Safeway Stores for mercantile purposes. A condition of the sale is that the board deliver title with a change of zone.

Another hearing will be on the favorable recommendation of the planning and zoning commission for vacation of New Haven plat, and the other one will be on a recommendation of the commission that the application of Sule Eun be granted in part for a change in zone from Class I residential to Class III business affecting certain property in Mapleton addition. Ordinance bills for all the proposed changes were introduced Monday night.

Several businessmen and women in the downtown area petitioned the council to install one or two 12-minute parking meters in all downtown blocks in addition to those already installed in front of the banks. No action was taken.

Fair Ticket Sales Go Well

Tickets for state fair attractions, which open September 4, went on sale at a downtown ticket office Monday, and were, incidentally, going fast.

The ticket office is located on High street, on the courthouse lawn. Joseph Simeral, in charge of ticket sales, warned that advance sales have been heavy, and that it might be difficult to get seats for some shows unless they were purchased before the fair opened.

Reserved seats and boxes are available for the horse races, every afternoon of fair week except Sunday, with post time at 1:15; the horse show and rodeo, every evening at 8 o'clock, and the Water Folies of 1950, every evening at 8 o'clock. Mail order tickets are also being sent from the Oregon State Fair, Salem.

Quarter Million Spent For Tourist Attraction

Oregon organizations are spending \$247,877 in 1950 to attract tourists and to promote local industry and agriculture, according to a national survey conducted by the research department of The Curtis Publishing company.

The study lists the following expenditures: Grant Pass and Josephine County Chamber of Commerce, Grants Pass, \$2,500; Hood River Chamber of Commerce, \$3,500; Klamath County Chamber of Commerce, Klamath Falls, \$4,250; Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, Medford, \$2,300; Pendleton Chamber of Commerce, \$4,227; Portland Chamber of Commerce, \$5,100; Travel Information department, Salem, \$220,000; Oregon Coast association, Tillamook, \$6,000.

These sums are for advertising and promotion purposes, exclusive of administrative and overhead costs.

Nationally, the report shows that a record \$10,048,391 is being spent this year, primarily to attract vacationers. The country's tourist industry has grown into an \$8,000,000,000 business, the study points out.

ton addition, petitioned for a change in the sidewalk line so that it will be four feet from the inner edge of the sidewalk to the property line on Fredrick street.

A petition of property owners facing Superior between West Nob Hill and South Commercial for permission to construct curbside walks instead of regular sidewalks was referred to the planning and zoning commission.

The commission was asked to recommend a policy on this subject. This was done because of a fight being made by residents and property owners along Electric avenue between Berry and Raynor against the construction of sidewalks along that avenue. The remonstrance was denied, but it was referred to the zoning commission.

A petition for a sanitary sewer for property adjacent to Gear street was granted. Referred to City Manager J. L. Franzen was a letter from Dr. Harry A. Brown requesting permission to build a temporary frame garage at his home at 1710 Winter street.

The planning and zoning commission reported it was returning without recommending a petition requesting that commercial development be prohibited for all property facing Bush Pasture park. The council took no action.

Relative to a letter from W. C. Winslow protesting sewer service charges on certain property the city engineer and the city manager reported sewer service was not available to the property and the charge was cancelled.

No appearances were made for or against when a public hearing was called on a petition to change from a Class I residential zone to Class III-X restricted business zone property in Lot 7, Block 6, University addition.

Two bidders offered \$200 each for Lots 3, 4 and 5 of Block 2, North Limits addition, and both were rejected as too low.

Applications of E. E. Batterman for a permit to make alterations at the Royal Court apartments, and A. J. Earhart to make alterations to a residence in the 400 block on North Summer were granted.

Residents of Evergreen Acres appeared in a request for permission to form a water district. No action was taken.

The city traffic safety council, headed by Dave Hoss, is planning a sharp campaign starting about the middle of September, and got authority to put advertising and literature, placards on utility poles, and stencils on sidewalks as a method of carrying on the drive.

The council adopted a resolution prohibiting parking on both sides of Knapp street.

The council voted to put all court residence groups on commercial rates for collection of sewer service charges. City Manager Franzen asked for a declaration of policy on the question because of a protest by W. E. Foren, who claimed there was discrimination as between a court owned by him and apartment houses. Each of his court units has been assessed on the same basis as ordinary dwellings, or 65 cents a month.

No action was taken on a request by Clay Cochran, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, for parking reservations in front of the Chamber of Commerce in the Senator hotel, for the benefit of tourists and other out-of-town people visiting the chamber.

But the Chamber of Commerce was granted permission to set up a sign in the parking strip of the courthouse grounds, across Court street from the hotel, with an arrow pointing to the chamber.

Scio Youth Dies Of Polio Attack

Sherman Alburton Wagner, 12 year old Scio youth, died at the Salem Memorial hospital after suffering a polio attack shortly over a week before. It started a week ago Friday when the youth came home from a picnic with a peculiar sore throat and illness. The following day he talked only with difficulty, and last Tuesday when his condition had not improved, it was determined he had been afflicted with polio in the throat region. He was taken to the Salem hospital last Tuesday where he died Saturday evening, August 26.

Sherman was born August 1, 1938 at Minot, N. D. The family has resided in Oregon and Scio for the past five years where his father, Albert Wagner, is principal of the Scio Union high school. Sherman would have been in the seventh grade at Scio this fall.

The body will lie in state at the Scio Baptist church Tuesday August 29 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Graveside services will be held Tuesday at 3 p.m. at Rest Haven Memorial Park in Eugene.

Memorial services will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Scio Baptist church. Rev. Victor Loucks and Salem and Rev. Elvin Fast of Scio, former and present pastors of the Scio Baptist church will officiate with the Huston funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Wagner of Scio; two sisters, Mavis, six, and Myrna, four years old; and his grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth Wagner of North Dakota.

McKay Declines Debate Offer

Gov. Douglas McKay today answered with a terse "I do not agree to (your) proposal" regarding Austin F. Flegel's proposal last Friday that the two candidates for governor debate in Enterprise, Ore., on "Does Oregon Need a New Administration?"

Flegel noted in his wire to the governor that their paths would cross on Friday at Enterprise. He said he thought the voters of Walla Walla county should have the benefit of an open forum discussion between McKay, the republican candidate, and Flegel, the democratic nominee.

The short text of Gov. McKay's wire read:
"I do not agree to proposal in your telegram of August 25th."

Salem Electric got a franchise from the city council Monday night for the lighting of all of that part of Salem west of the Willamette, which means the Kingwood district and the former West Salem.

City Manager J. L. Franzen told the council the cooperative's bid was \$1627.44 lower than that of Portland General Electric company. Mayor Elstrom said he did not look favorably on an arrangement whereby Kingwood would be lighted by one concern and old West Salem by the other.

Before the merger of West Salem with Salem it was lighted by Salem Electric.

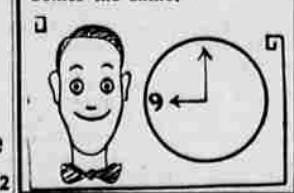
Baby Falls 4 Stories Unhurt
