

Design Your Homes to Suit the Husband Is Advice to Brides

New York, Aug. 31 (AP)—Brides who want to preserve their marriage are warned by a New York designer to build their homes around their husbands.

"Let the old boy put his feet on the furniture if he wants to," the designer, Harriet Sherry, said. "Therefore buy furniture that can stand it."

Miss Sherry said too many women try to design homes to suit themselves and ignore the needs and desires of their husbands. It's a good way for a newly-married woman to get off on the wrong foot, she observed.

Men Not Alike

"There are no two men alike when it comes to the way they want their home," Miss Sherry warned, however. "Every bride, before designing and decorating her home, should try to learn just what her husband's needs would be."

Her objective is to please her man, not to try to arouse the envy of her friends, or to keep up with the current vogue."

First, Miss Sherry said, it must be decided just what functions the home furnishings are to perform.

The bride must ask herself whether—in addition to living—the home is to be used for entertaining or business.

Need Place to Work

"Many men, especially attorneys, must bring work home after office hours," Miss Sherry said. "In that case, there must be a place for them to work. It should be a place furnished practically and one that is decorated in such a way as to cause the least amount of distraction."

"Other men have hobbies. They, too, must have room to practice their hobby. It does no good for a wife to laugh them off or to try to suppress them."

"Here's a warning about the man with a hobby—don't try to stick him in the basement or in the garage, where the lighting and heating probably are poor. Give him a room he'll be proud of."

Airforce Lift For Korean War

McChord Air Force Base, Wash., Aug. 31 (AP)—The air force lifted the lid here yesterday on the scope of the huge U. S.-Canadian airlift operation in Korea.

Spokesmen disclosed that since July 26 the joint air operation has carried more than 1,000,000 pounds of cargo to the Orient via Alaska. The number of personnel carried was not disclosed.

The air force has assigned 72 four-engined transports to the airlift and the Royal Canadian air force has contributed eight.

The change in emphasis from air defense to air transport posed new problems for the McChord command of Col. T. Alan Bennett. The mushrooming transport business required the hiring of more than 1,000 additional civilians, mostly mechanics and other aircraft experts.

Six flights leave daily from McChord to speed critical supplies and men to Japan.

Col. G. W. Prentice, commander of the 325th all-weather group at McChord, paid special tribute to the efficient Canadian operations.

19-Year-Old Private Lives Colonel's Life

With U. S. Forces in Korea, Aug. 31 (AP)—A 19-year-old private in the air force is living the life of a colonel.

For the past month Pfc. Stanley Tompkins of Kirksville, Mo., has had a colonel's job—without the eagles.

He volunteered to stay behind to handle communications when a forward airfield was abandoned. That made him commander of what was left of the base.

Tompkins slept in the colonel's bed, used the colonel's electric razor, helped himself to some of the provisions the colonel left behind. And when he answered the phone he complied with army procedure, thus:

"Pfc. Tompkins speaking—base commander."

Stores to Close Noon Salem Fair Day

Downtown Salem merchants Thursday morning decided to observe Salem day at the Oregon State Fair, Wednesday, September 6.

Cooperating with the state fair board the majority of the merchants announced that they would close their places of business at 12:30 p.m. on that day. There may be a few exceptions but all merchants are expected to decide on the closure.

Instead of opening at their usual times on September 6, however, the downtown stores will open their places of business at 9 a.m.

East German Peace Treaty

Berlin, Aug. 31 (AP)—The West German newspaper Die Welt said today the Russians and the communist government of the Soviet zone have reached agreement on a peace treaty.

The terms would be used as a new lever to pry the Western allies out of Berlin, the newspaper said.

Die Welt, established in the British zone and in West Berlin, is frequently well-informed on East German subjects.

The report of the treaty negotiations could not be confirmed in other quarters. U. S. intelligence sources said they had no knowledge of it.

Die Welt said the pact was approved in Moscow by the Soviet council of ministers after a year's work under the leadership of Gregori Maximovich Pushkin, ambassador to the East German democratic republic.

The newspaper's informants said the Russians had written in to the treaty the following terms:

Soviet troops would withdraw behind the Oder river in the east within six months after the signing.

Approval of a "request" by the Socialist Unity (communist) party of east Germany that the western allies quit West Berlin.

Coastal Ships Remain Tied-Up

Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 31 (AP)—British Columbia coastal shipping, tied up by the Canadian rail strike, remained idle today despite the end of the trainmen's walkout.

Deckhands and engineroom workers said Monday they would strike Canadian Pacific and Canadian National steamship services as soon as the rail strike was terminated. Service had been interrupted by refusal of the seamen to pass picket lines.

The railroads announced last night they will not attempt to resume steamship service until negotiations have been completed between the companies and the Seafarers' International union (AFL), which represents the engine men and deck hands.

Only small lines offering limited passenger and freight services are operating and only within a 200-mile radius of Vancouver. Isolated northern communities are receiving essentials via an emergency airlift.

The seamen are asking a \$30 monthly wage increase and other improvements in working conditions. Approximately 600 men are affected.

Three Admirals Given Top Ranking Posts

Washington, Aug. 31 (AP)—President Truman today raised three widely known naval officers to top ranking posts.

He nominated Vice Admiral Robert B. Carney for promotion to the four-star rank of admiral as commander in chief of naval forces in the eastern Atlantic and Mediterranean.

He also sent to the senate the nomination of:

Adm. Richard L. Connolly as president of the naval war college, succeeding Vice Admiral Donald B. Beary who is retiring. Connolly has commanded the eastern Atlantic-Mediterranean forces. He will be a vice admiral in his new job.

Rear Admiral Matthias B. Gardner for a promotion to the rank of vice admiral as commander of the Second fleet, succeeding Carney.

The Second fleet is based at Norfolk, Va., and normally operates in the Atlantic.

Yacht Burns, Sinks

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 31 (AP)—The 75-foot yacht Pleasure Islander burned and sank in Puget Sound between Whidbey Island and the mainland yesterday.

The coast guard said the vessel's engineer, the only person aboard, escaped without injury.

Green Light on Defense Money

Washington, Aug. 31 (AP)—The house voted today to let the government go ahead immediately with defense programs covered by a \$16,700,000,000 appropriation bill still pending in congress.

One program is a \$4,000,000,000 expansion of foreign military aid.

Chairman Cannon (D-Mo) of the appropriations committee told the house the money in the bill is needed now. The house then adopted by voice vote a resolution permitting the defense agencies to start spending in anticipation of eventually getting the cash.

To become effective, the resolution must get the approval also of the senate.

The bill itself was passed by the house last Saturday and is now before the senate appropriations committee. The senate group is holding hearings and final congressional action on the bill may not come for another 10 days or more.

The hearings are centered on the \$4,000,000,000 of foreign military aid. It appears ticketed for early committee approval.

Governor Not Mad at Labor Federation

Governor Douglas McKay showed today he isn't mad at the State Federation of Labor because it endorsed his opponent, democratic State Sen. Austin Flegel for governor.

He saluted the federation by designating next week as "Union Label Week."

In a prepared statement, he said the AFL principles have improved wages, hours and working conditions. He added that sound labor-management relations in Oregon "have fostered healthy state growth in war and peace."

Consul's Wife Falls From Deck of Yacht

Istanbul, Turkey, Aug. 31 (AP)—Mrs. Aldine De Silva, American wife of the Brazilian consul here, fell from a yacht and disappeared last night in the Marmara sea.

The 42-year-old Mrs. De Silva was the daughter of Mrs. J. W. Moore of St. Albans, West Va. A search by police boats today had failed to recover her body.

Chicago Jail Held 'Rotten'

Chicago, Aug. 31 (AP)—Some prisoners at the big Cook county (Chicago) jail, says State's Attorney John S. Boyle, have been getting women, liquor, narcotics and fine food—by paying a few dollars to the right person.

Boyle termed the jail "rotten from top to bottom," and said a grand jury will investigate the "shocking conditions." Boyle said he had received a report from an assistant, James Condon, who has been investigating jail conditions since an escape plot was thwarted last month.

Col. Chester L. Fordney, the jail warden, said "conditions are not as bad as the state's attorney thinks." He added, however, it was "no secret" that narcotics and other items, knives, razor blades and hypodermic needles — have been smuggled into the jail. He denied that prisoners held trysts with women.

Fordney's superior, Sheriff Elmer Michael Walsh, a republican, said that politics were behind the charges.

Boyle, a democrat, said Condon told him that prisoners, by paying \$3 to a guard or a trusty, have entertained women visitors in a consultation cell near the main entrance.

Prisoners by paying \$5 have been able to buy whiskey and narcotics, as well as steaks—not on the prison menu—Boyle said his assistant told him.

Rumors of Shipyard Reopening Denied

Washington, Aug. 31 (AP)—Rumors that the standby shipyard at Vancouver, Wash., would be reopened because of the Korean war were laid at rest yesterday by a maritime commission aide.

A spokesman for the office of Vice Adm. E. C. Cochran, newly appointed commission administrator, said there were no plans for reopening the nation's four standby yards.

The aide said the rumors may have originated from inspection trips to the Columbia river yard by contractor groups who maintain the facility in a "mothball" condition.

The commission spokesman added "we have a great stockpile of ships in our reserve fleet, some 1,500 Liberty ships" and have been able to meet military sea transportation service needs.

No Break in Sight Of Oregon Heat Wave

Portland, Aug. 31 (AP)—Prospects for a break in Oregon's heat wave are slight, the weather bureau indicated today.

Temperatures of 90 and above were usual over eastern and southern Oregon Wednesday. Likely it will be as hot through Friday. Some increase in cloudiness is expected in northwest Oregon, but in the south and east 85 and above was forecast.

State Forester George Spaur said fire conditions are bad, but the worst is yet to come. Timber is dry, but when east winds common to early fall arrive it will be "a veritable powder keg," he said.

Medford reported 96 degrees yesterday. Burns and Ontario reported 95, Baker and La-Grande 92, Bend and Klamath Falls 91, and Pendleton and The Dalles, 90. It was 81 in Portland.

Pinson to Be Extradited

Attorney General George Neuner said today extradition papers for the return of state prison escapee John Omar Pinson, 32, would be sent to Hood River's county clerk this week for certification.

Pinson, recaptured in Pierre, S. D. this week, was serving a life term at the penitentiary when he escaped May 30, 1949.

Although Pinson has not definitely waived or refused to waive extradition, officers were to be given papers before they left for Rapid City, S. D., to pick up the fugitive.

Warden George Alexander said two men will get Pinson and return him to a correction cell equipped with case-hardened steel bars.

Pinson murdered a state police officer in Hood River and also had been associated with a number of thefts and burglaries.

Can't Appease So Must Fight

In the opinion of Dr. Robert Gregg, dean of Willamette university, the United States must not stop at the 38th parallel once the communists are forced to retreat. "To do so would merely give them another jumping off spot," he said, as he addressed the Salem Lions club Thursday.

Dr. Gregg spoke of the strategic importance of Korea and that of Formosa as well. In the latter place he stated that an effort should be made to get the United Nations in on the situation, as we have in Korea.

For a long range policy the speaker declared that we must match the promises of the communists in the matter of land reforms in China and, in some way, must make good. "Fine-sounding phrases do not satisfy hungry people," the speaker stated.

In closing Dr. Gregg declared that "we can't appease and we must fight—if necessary a whole coalition of Asiatic peoples."
