

Evening Classes for Adults Get Under Way Monday

Evening classes for adults will get underway next Monday at Salem high school, under the supervision of the adult education department of the Salem Public school system.

Classes in 31 subjects will be conducted. Most subjects call for classes once a week. A few of the groups will meet twice weekly.

Stock Market At 4 Year High

New York, Sept. 13 (AP)—A morning buying spurge carried the stock market to a new four-year high today.

The rail group alone swept to a 19-year peak.

Leading issues moved up as much as \$2 a share before the edge of the advance was blunted. Dozens of stocks sold at their best prices for a year or more.

The market made its best showing after a high-speed opening when buying orders flooded the market. Gains were well maintained in later dealings.

Business was the largest in around seven weeks with about 2,500,000 shares changing hands.

Some favorites included Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Pennsylvania R.R., Seaboard Air Line, Southern Pacific, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem Steel, Western Union and American Smelting.

Silverton School Count Constant

Silverton — Howard George, principal, is announcing the first high registration for the first two days of school Monday and Tuesday, September 11 and 12, to be practically coincidental with that of last year.

Another coincidence is that the teaching force is the same as last year and at the beginning of the last school year only two new teachers were hired.

William Gates, manual training and shop department head stands first among the present high school faculty in number of years employment, this being his 29th annual signing of his contract for the same work.

A total of 357 attending the first two days is evenly divided with the odd one going to the girls at 179, with the boys, 178.

By classes, freshmen, are 58 boys and 58 girls; sophomore, 50 boys and 47 girls; juniors, 37 boys and 33 girls; and seniors, 33 boys and 41 girls.

The senior class shortage in boys is believed to be a continuance in seasonal work for a few days.

The total is believed to possibly run into 390 to 410, judging from last year's figures, within the first two weeks of school.

M. B. Ford, principal of the first six grades, reports from the Eugene Field building, 485 including 26 kindergarten; 67 sixth grade, 81 fifth grade, 64 fourth grade, 85 third, 80 second, and 82 first graders. This shows, according to the records, an increase over that of last year of around 40 for the first two days, however not as many additional registrants are expected in the grades as in the high schools.

Cordell Woodall, principal of two-grade junior high school, reports a total of 167 with the boys 19 in the lead of girls. In eighth grade, 42 boys and 31 girls, and in the ninth, 51 boys and 43 girls.

This figures a first two days' grand total of 983 for the Silverton schools with a potential registration of around 75 more within the month.

Power Concern Wants To Double Production

Spokane, Sept. 13 (AP)—Permission to double its electricity production by construction of a new dam and power plant was a red of the federal power commission yesterday by Washington Water Power company.

The dam and power plant would be built at Cabinet Gorge on the Clark Fork river in Idaho. The expansion would cost an ultimate \$40,000,000, company officials said.

"We expect power from Cabinet Gorge to be available by Nov. 1, 1952," if early government approval is received, said Kinsey Robinson, company president.

Last Leader Of GAR Passes

Vancouver, Wash., Sept. 13 (AP)—Theodore A. Penland, 101, last commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, died here today, the veterans hospital reported.

The Civil War veteran, full of chukles and spy until very recent years, attended a Los Angeles convention of the affiliated orders of the GAR last week.

He entered the hospital yesterday and died of a failing heart at 11 a.m. today.

He had been troubled with his heart for several months and was in the hospital for a time last spring.

Penland was elected commander of the GAR at the 1948 encampment at Grand Rapids, Mich. It was decided then that the handful of veterans would meet just once more—their 83rd meeting—and then call it quits.

That last convention was held in Indianapolis where the first was held.

Six of the 16 veterans remaining at that time, attended the last encampment.

Penland lifted his voice in the "Campfire" song: "Tenting on the Old Camp Ground." He didn't hear much of it though. His hearing failed rapidly in his last years.

He was born at Goshen, Ind., on January 23, 1849, and was barely 16 when he entered the 152nd Indiana Volunteers.

His father was killed in the war and four of his brothers were held prisoners.

He outlived six of his 10 children. Those who survive are Wilton, 78, of Wheatland, Calif.; Mrs. Claudine Parks, 62, of Sacramento; Floyd, 61, of Scottsville, Va., and Noel, 42, Davis Dam, Nev.

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Huk Raids in Philippines Tied To Aggressive Move in Korea

(Editor's note:—Since the outbreak of war in Korea, the communist-directed "Hukbalahap" movement in the Philippine republic has stepped up its terrorism and is becoming a serious menace, the Philippines foreign secretary reports in the following dispatch.)

(Last spring General Carlos P. Romulo said he believed the "Huks" presented no real threat. But he explains in the following dispatch how the Korean war has changed the situation. He has just arrived from Manila.)

New York, Sept. 13 (UP)—Last May when I returned from an earlier visit to the Philippines, I had occasion to explain that the violent acts perpetrated by the communist bands there (the Huks) were of a sporadic character and presented no real threat to the political stability of the country.

In recent weeks, however, these acts of violence have occurred on such a scale as would warrant a revision of that previous estimate of the situation.

The communist dissidents have begun to carry out a number of bold raids in a few provinces of the island of Luzon in a manner which indicates the presence of organized direction with a distinctly political motive.

They have taken advantage of the deteriorating economic conditions and the present campaign of the majority party against irregularities in the government to pursue their subversive activities.

These activities have been intensified following the outbreak of the war in Korea.

The link between the two is obvious.

As the communist North Korean troops continue to press their campaign of aggression in Korea, the organized communist elements elsewhere in southeast Asia, including the Philippines, would naturally be expected to adopt more vigorous tactics of harassment and violence.

This logically follows from the communist program of international action against the free world.

The execution of such a program in the Philippines became practically mandatory after President Quirino, with the overwhelming support of the Filipino people, decided to contribute food and medical supplies as well as armed contingents to the United Nations effort in Korea.

Philippine army troops, fully equipped and ready for action, are on their way to Korea, and substantial shipments of vaccines of various kinds, alcohol for medical use, and fresh blood will soon be sent there.

The communists and their sympathizers would hardly be expected to countenance the sending of these contributions.

Communist dissidence minority, while continuing to perform its functions as the opposition in our congress, has given full support to the main features of the foreign policy of the republic, in particular, the policy of assisting the United Nations effort in Korea.

In the meantime, President Quirino has embarked on a major program of reorganization of the government.

He has started to make important changes in his cabinet and proposes to streamline the various executive departments in order to achieve increased efficiency.

Service Men To Keep Rights

Men inducted into the armed forces under the 1948 selective service act have the same re-employment rights upon returning to civilian life as did the men inducted under the 1940 act.

Also these men have all of the benefits and assistance granted under the soldiers' and sailors' civil relief act. This information was released this week by Col. Francis W. Mason, deputy state selective service director.

Mason also said that arrangements are being made with the Oregon State Bar association by the Oregon State Selective service headquarters for the designation of qualified attorneys in various parts of the state to provide expert counsel for the potential inductees in arranging their personal affairs that would come under the provisions of the act.

Every effort will be made, Mason said, to provide men about to be inducted with the necessary information to enable them to adequately protect their equities in real property, automobiles and other items purchased under conditional sales contracts.
