

# Sulpha Drugs Fatal to Bees

American foulbrood, most destructive disease known to bees in Oregon, is being spread, rather than checked as is the intent by the feeding of sulpha drugs. This is the studied opinion of A. Burr Black, who made a careful survey of the sulpha situation in connection with bee inspections in Jefferson county and adjoining districts. Black is apary supervisor for the state department of agriculture.

About 13,000 colonies of bees were used from 259 apiaries in that district this season to pollinate clover, and about two-thirds of them were Oregon bees, brought in from 15 counties. In the out-of-state bees inspected, only one colony was found to be infected with American foulbrood.

Here's why Black says feeding of sulpha drugs isn't helping to control or eradicate American foulbrood. Of these bees in central Oregon, owners of 1904 colonies said they had fed sulpha. One hundred sixty-three or 8 1/2 percent of those colonies had American foulbrood.

Only 18 colonies of bees had foulbrood infection in 2063 colonies not sulpha-treated. That's eight-tenths of one percent.

Owners of 1,928 of the colonies inspected were not available so a check could be made on whether the bees were fed sulpha. These bee colonies had 3.2 percent infection.

From an apary standpoint, 65 percent of those treated with sulpha had American foulbrood; 25.6 percent of the "don't know" apiaries had the disease; and only 6.6 percent of those definitely not fed sulpha drugs were infected.

# Council Hears August Stayton Police Report

Stayton—August was a busy month for the Stayton police department, according to the report which Police Chief Lawrence M. Wright submitted to the monthly meeting of the city council this week at the city hall.

Thirty-eight arrests and seven citations were made. Being in a state of intoxication in a public place accounted for 18 arrests; drunken driving, 3; reckless driving, 3; having no operator's license on the person, 11; selling without a pedler's license, 2; disorderly conduct, 1; trespassing, 1; failure to stop at scene of an accident, 1; failure to stop at posted intersection, 1; basic rule violation, 1. There were 45 convictions.

Twenty-six of these cases were satisfied in justice court. Two larceny cases were satisfied. Twenty-seven complaint calls were answered with 23 of them satisfied.

Four dogs were impounded. Three were advertised the required five days and disposed of; one was redeemed by the owner.

Long distance toll charges were \$13.13; cost of prisoner food, \$11.25. Fines and costs assessed on city cases amounted to \$419.50. Fine from a reckless driving case, pending since May 5, for \$25, was collected. Total automobile patrol miles for the month was 2084 miles.

# Hold Special Session On Sewer Petitions

Mt. Angel—All members of the city council met in special session this week to pass on the sewer extension on Elm street, by petition of property owners.

Councilman Mucken said he estimated the work could be done for \$1.50 a running foot. The sewer will run through the properties owned by Fred J. Schwab, Mrs. Anna Frank, William Predeck, and Benedictine Fathers, from Sheridan to Elm streets to Roy Palmer property and 260 feet south on Elm street. Work will begin at once. The council also made a motion to invest in necessary sewer fittings.

Investigation will be made and names secured of parties tearing up the school grounds, disturbing the peace and reckless driving on Sunday evening, September 17, and the offenders prosecuted.
