Locals Seek to Buy Solons

The latest plan is to form a corporation among Salem baseball fans, and sell shares at \$25. A similar plan was attempted last winter, but gained little headway beyond a couple of "pep" meetings. The group of sponsoring businessmen is headed by Attorney Donald A. Young. He said Wednesday that the formation of a local corporation is already under way. Persons interested in buying one or more shares have been asked to sign subscription forms now in the hands of eight persons. Angel News; Noble Dependehner, president of Salem Tavern Owners association; Hunt Clark and Al Lightner of The Oregon Statesman. Should interested parties find it impossible to sign one of the forms, a letter addressed to any of the registrars will be sufficient. Once the signatures are gathered, a meeting of all those who signed will be called. A board of directors will be appointed at that time. The board will be empowered to hire a business manager, team manager, players, make a tie-up with a major league club, etc.

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Yank Rookie Trims ChiSox To Keep Half Game Edge

New York, Sept. 21 (AP)—Just think of all the red faces there will be in the automobile capital of Detroit if those New York Yankees run away in the American league stretch race with their 1950 model Ford.

The Yankee Ford — Whitey Ford that is — was a streamlined V-8 speedster today with a straight eight victories and no defeats, his last two wins coming when they were desperately needed to prevent the Yankees from skidding right off the main pennant highway.

Yesterday he pitched the Yankees to a three-hit, 8 to 1 victory over the Chicago White Sox for the eighth victory in a row since he joined the club as a wet-behind-the-ears-rookie fresh from Kansas City at mid-season. Had he lost the Yankees would have tumbled back into second place behind the Tigers, who scored an uphill, 6 to 5 victory over the Athletics in Detroit.

Today the Yankees were half a game in front of the Tigers and two full games ahead of the third-place Red Sox, who ran into disaster at Cleveland yesterday where they blew 6 to 3 and 7 to 1 decisions to the vengeance-bent Indians.

Bobby Brown made three hits, Jerry Coleman drove in three runs, and Cliff Mages hit a homer and drove in two runs as the Yankee second line of

White stopped the Athletics in the late innings. The Indians, who trace their own downfall in the race to the collapse that started when their ace, Bob Lemon, blew a 12 to 1 lead in Boston, smeared the Red Sox good yesterday, as first Lemon pitched a seven-hitter, then Eearly Wynn came up with a five-hitter. The Red Sox again succumbed to their Cleveland Municipal stadium jinx, winding up the season there with only two wins against nine defeats — the identical mark they had in 11 games there in 1949.

In the only other American league game, Washington outslugged St. Louis, 12 to 7. Brooklyn topped Pittsburgh, 7 to 2, and pulling three full games ahead of the fourth place Giants, and into a second place tie with Boston Braves, who bowed to the St. Louis Cards, 1 to 0, at night. The Giants were defeated twice by the Reds, 4 to 1 and 2 to 0, brilliant pitching by Ewell Blackwell and Ken Raffensberger being the payoff. The Dodgers put over four runs in the first inning and that was enough for young Carl Erskine, who went on to win his fifth game. Ralph Kiner hit his 46th homer for Pittsburgh.

The front-running Phils topped the Cubs, 9 to 6, as Jim Konstanty came in for the 68th time in a relief role and won his 16th game, Mike Goliat providing the margin by hitting two homers good for four tallies. Six Philly victories now will clinch the flag. Clyde Boyer hurled a four-hitter for the Cards' triumph, besting Vern Bickford, who gave up seven. The only run came in the eighth inning on Marty Marion's single, a sacrifice, and Harry Lowrey's single.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 21 (AP)—A field of 160 golfers teed off today in the \$15,000 Kansas City open with Sam Sneed, the year's leading money man, seeded No. 1 by the clubhouse experts after two sub-par practice rounds. 'New' Staff, Squad Builds Invaders Hopes for WU Go

The Central Washington Wildcats, who Saturday tangle with Willamette university on McCulloch stadium, are bringing to Salem a new coaching staff, mostly new playing personnel and a lot of new hope. Last year's CWCE squad was comprised largely of seniors, so the Wildcats were hard hit by graduation. Of the 52 players on the 1950 roster, 31 are newcomers. L. G. (Clipper) Carmody, former assistant coach, was recently appointed head Wildcat coach, to succeed Wilbur (Shorty) Luft, who resigned last month to enter the sporting goods business in Seattle. Carmody's assistants, both new to the CWCE staff, are Art (SOS) Foggolis, former Easton and Cle Elum high school coach who is a graduate of CWCE, and Del Peterson, former football coach at Morgan junior high

school in Ellensburg. Experienced footballers wearing Wildcat colors for the first time in Saturday's mix include 17 transfers from other schools, mostly junior colleges. Among the transfers are several big guards and centers. Heading the list of returning lettermen are four of last year's regulars, Jack Hawkins, all-Winco conference guard; Eric Beardley and Don Doran, halfbacks; and Danny Iyall, quarterback. That gives the Wildcats three returning regulars from last season's backfield. Other lettermen holdovers in the backfield are Harry Drittenbas, Gene Briscoe and Paul Schultz, fullbacks; Elmer Cherry and Harry Opsal, halfbacks; and Mickey Naish, quarterback. Schultz will see some duty as a wingman this year. In the line, letter winners back in the fold are Dick Lunch and

John Richardson, ends; Leroy Shuey and Dave Duclaw, tackles; New Kier and Hawkins, guards.
