

## Rockefeller Refused Divorce

Chicago, Sept. 21 (AP)—The Chicago Tribune said today that Mrs. Winthrop (Bobo) Rockefeller, who in 1948 married one of the heirs to oil millions, "never will give" her husband a divorce.

The Tribune quoted Bobo as saying that as far as her husband, grandson of John D. Rockefeller, is concerned: "I want him to suffer the way he has made me suffer; as he has humiliated me before the world."

Bobo, the former Eva Pauleklute, daughter of Lithuanian immigrants, made her statements, the Tribune said, at the Lowell, Ind., farm home of her stepfather and her mother, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Neveckas. She and her two-year-old son, Winthrop, Jr., have been visiting at the farm for the last seven weeks.

The Tribune said Mrs. Rockefeller said "she is afraid Rockefeller may start legal action in an attempt to have the child removed from her custody, but she added she would fight any such attempt with every possible means."

Bobo said she plans to return to New York late next month and will spend some time there.

## Facility Gets City Water

Salem's Naval Air Facility, which has had its water supply from a well on the east side of the air field will soon be getting its water supply from the city lines.

The facility has secured 4,000 feet of eight-inch water pipe from a navy installation at Arcadia, Calif., and is laying it on top of the group preparatory to its being laid by the city water department.

City Manager J. L. Franzen stated that the pipe will be laid as soon as possible by the water department and will be connected to the water main at 25th street.

That building now occupied by the navy facility and formerly used by United Air Lines has been getting its water supply from a one-inch pipe which comes off a wooden main laid during the war by the army from Fairview home. The wooden main is now deteriorating and has several leaks and as soon as new pipe is laid the one-inch pipe will be cut off.

## Polio Death in Umatilla County

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—Umatilla and Linn counties are areas of "mild" polio epidemics, the state health officer said yesterday.

One of the 17 cases reported for Umatilla county resulted yesterday in the death of Dale Patineau, 16, of Lexington. He had been under treatment in a Walla Walla hospital. Linn county has had 14 reported cases so far this year.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, the health officer, noted that the Portland-Multnomah county area has had 59 cases, but said this was far from epidemic proportions because of the greater population. A new case in the city boosted the year's tally to 51, of which five have resulted in deaths. Last year there were 28 cases and six deaths in the same period.

The disease incidence appeared to Dr. Thomas L. Meador, city health officer, to have reached its peak. "It has followed the pattern of other years, starting late in July's hot weather, gathering momentum in August and then tapering off with the advent of cooler weather," he said.

The latest Umatilla county cases involved a 10-year-old Stanfield girl and a 35-year-old Athena man.

## Rolling Log Crushes, Kills Marvin Ritchey

Dallas, Sept. 21 — Marvin Ritchey, 38, donkey engine operator for the King Brothers Logging company operation near Hoskins, about 25 miles south of Dallas, was fatally injured Wednesday noon when a log rolled off a truck and pinned him against the trailer.

Ritchey suffered a crushed chest and a fractured leg. He died in the ambulance while en route to Dallas, about 1 p.m.

Ritchey was born May 27, 1912, in Silverton and had lived in Dallas for the past 10 years. He is survived by a son and a daughter, Larry and Judy, both of Dallas; his mother, Mrs. Eula Ritchey, Palo Alto, Calif.; and two sisters, Mrs. Thelma Farrens and Mrs. Ellen Ingham, both of Redwood City, Calif. Funeral services will be held Saturday, September 23 at 2 p.m. in the chapel of the Bollman funeral home. Interment will be in Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum, Salem.

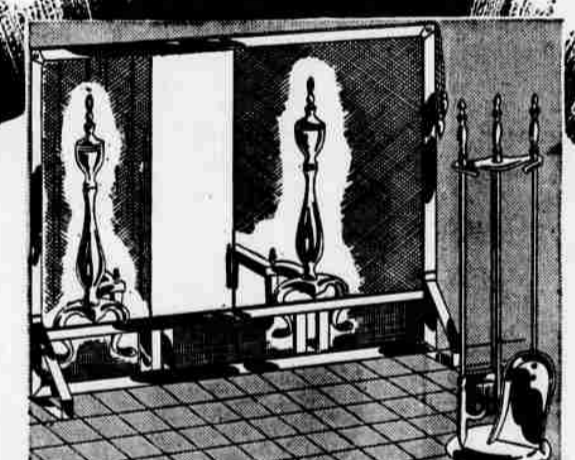
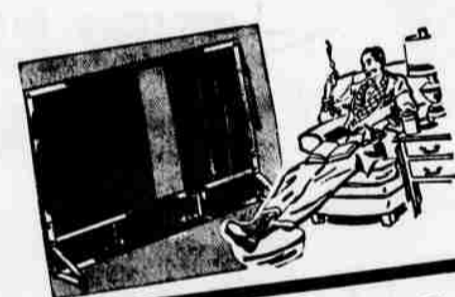
