

# DP Family of 5 Coming Here

A displaced persons family of a widowed mother and four children will be brought to Salem under the sponsorship of the First Christian church of this city. The mother is Mrs. Reet Kallvee, aged 42.

Scheduled to sail from Europe in mid-week the family will be provided with a home upon their arrival some three weeks hence. The husband was killed by the Russians during World War II and the family later was confined to a displaced persons camp.

Mrs. Kallvee's children are Linda and Salmie, 9-year-old twins; Suri, 14 and Mai, 15. Mrs. Kallvee before the war was a student under Ardo Tarem, who before his arrival in Salem more than a year ago was an instructor in physical education in Estonia.

Mrs. Kallvee is said to be an experienced seamstress and has considerable knowledge concerning gardening, poultry farming and bee keeping.

# 12,000 Year Old Relics in Oregon

Portland, Oct. 13 (AP)—The discovery of woven sandals which the National Academy of Sciences was told yesterday dates the history of Oregon back 12,000 years was made in a Lake county cave.

Dr. Willard F. Libby and James R. Arnold of the University of Chicago said the sandals helped to determine that the first humans known in the North American continent lived in what now is Oregon and Nevada.

The sandals, thought to have been of sagebrush bark and covered by pumice believed to have come from an eruption of the Newberry crater, were found in the Fort Rock valley. Stone and bone tools were found at the same time.

The report supported the theory of Dr. L. S. Cressman, head of the University of Oregon anthropology department, that the lake region of southeastern Oregon was one of the centers of early culture.

He has made many excavations in the region.

# Thanksgiving Day Set November 23

Thanksgiving day will be on November 23, Governor Douglas McKay said today in trying to clear up a lot of confusion.

It used to be on the last Thursday of November, but congress passed a law making it the fourth Thursday. The confusion comes from the fact that there are five Thursdays in November this year.

The governor's office said it has received many queries as to when Thanksgiving would come this year. One of these queries came from the Portland Retail Trade bureau.

Some callers said they had been refused dental and medical appointments for November 30 because their doctors and dentists mistakenly believed Thanksgiving would be on that day.

# Northwest Plane Crashes Killing 5

Almeland, Minn., Oct. 13 (AP)—A Northwest Airlines Martin 2-O-2 passenger plane crashed on the outskirts of Almeland today, killing five of the six persons aboard.

The sixth passenger on the plane was seriously hurt.



# Ernest Haycox, Novelist, Dies

Portland, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—Ernest Haycox, 51, one of the nation's foremost western story writers, died of cancer at his home today.

Haycox wrote in the tradition of Zane Grey and many of his plots were converted into major movie thrillers.

A one-time police reporter, Haycox turned out a total of 20 full-length novels and 300 short stories. Most of them appeared first in the Saturday Evening Post and Collier's magazine.

Haycox was stricken with cancer several months ago. He underwent two major operations, one in May and the second in August.

Haycox, a slightly-built man with intense energy, based most of his story plots on western pioneering, the gold rush days, stagecoaching and the settlement of the Pacific northwest.

Several of his plots were produced as movies. The last and one of the best known was "Canyon Passage."

A native of Portland, Haycox worked as a bell-hop, dish washer and factory hand after completing his high school education. He enlisted in the army underage when he was 15 and served in France. On his return, he completed his education at Reed college and University of Oregon after traveling in Alaska.

He began writing short stories during his college days and his first one was accepted for publication in 1922. By 1929, he was writing westerns almost exclusively.

# County Court Allots \$3000 for Defense

Marion county's civil defense program, who has been held back due to lack of operating funds, has now been given the go-ahead signal by the county court, with the appropriation of \$3,000 for the establishment and operation of the defense program.

The court, working with county civil defense chairman Denver Young, may now hire a defense executive secretary, and set up paper work, arrange transportation, etc.

County Judge Grant Murphy said he expects the county defense program to be established and in working order by the end of the year.

# Counties Allotted Share of Liquor Tax

Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry today apportioned \$285,000 in revenues from the tax on malt and alcoholic beverages to the state and its counties.

U. S. Census 152,271,000 Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—The census bureau estimated today the U. S. population totalled 152,271,000 on Sept. 1, including 576,000 persons serving in the armed services overseas.

The bureau placed the civilian population at 159,817,000 and the number serving in the armed forces within the continental U. S. at 878,000.

The varied and in some instances complicated regulations of the new federal credit directive involving sale of real estate came up for consideration during the weekly luncheon program of the Salem Board of Realtors.

Bob Powell of the Salem Federal Savings and Loan Assn., who has a copy of the new regulation read portions of it and then endeavored to answer questions. However, questions were not many, because as one member observed "It's too complicated for one to frame an intelligent question."

However, the act does not apply to houses that were started prior to August 3. Neither are old dwellings involved, except to the extent that a statement must be made as to whether the building involved was erected prior to August 3.

Al Crose, state real estate commissioner, reported concerning realtor conventions held at Missoula, Mont. and Sun Valley, Idaho. Crose will represent the Salem board during the national convention to be held at Miami, Fla. in the near future.

# Mass Detention Of Aliens Progresses

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—Further mass detention of aliens seeking to enter the United States appeared likely today as government officials sought to write a set of rules defining who may enter under the new anti-subversives law.

State and justice department officials said clarifying regulations are being drafted, but they declined to predict when they may be ready. At issue is just who fits the law's ban against members or former members of totalitarian parties and their affiliates.

Scores of aliens who have arrived since the law's enactment almost three weeks ago, have been detained at Ellis Island by immigration officials.

# British Doctors Asked to Strike

London, Oct. 13 (AP)—The British Medical Guild is asking 26,000 general practitioners to fill out resignations from the national health service.

A preliminary letter to the doctors, who have been involved in a long dispute with the labor government's ministry of health over pay schedules, said the resignation forms would be sent out Nov. 1.

The letter pledged the guild to take no action on the matter if less than 80 percent of the doctors sent in resignations.

Final decision on whether to submit the resignations will be taken at a special conference of local medical committees in December. The guild said the resignations would not be used if the pay dispute is settled.

The Medical Guild is a parallel organization to the British Medical association, which is prohibited by its constitution
