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Prudential Fetes 75th Birthday

Seventy-five years of business was celebrated Friday by the Prudential Insurance company, with luncheons held throughout the country in observance of the event.

Read during the luncheon was a message from the president of the company, which was founded in Newark, New Jersey, in 1875, and has expanded until it is serving more than 26,000,000 policyholders. Feature of the luncheon was the cutting of the 75th anniversary birthday cake.

ROKs Thrusting

The ROK troops were powerfully supported by fighter planes and the U. S. cruiser Rochester, a detached unit of the roving heavy bombardment fleet. Shells from the mighty Mo's 16-inch guns crashed onto coastal targets at more than seven tons a minute. British, Australian, Canadian and other American warships were in the naval force command by Vice Admiral Arthur D. Struble in the Mo.

The targets were port and rail lines and anything else that remains to support the Red Korean war effort on routes into Red Korea from China and the Soviet Union.

On the ground fighting fronts, allied spearheads met increasingly heavy resistance in their push toward Pyongyang, the Red capital near the west coast. Two Red divisions were reported racing from the Ongjin peninsula to help the defenders of Kumchong, 75 miles southeast of Pyongyang. The naval pounding extended from Songjin northward beyond the flaming iron and steel port of Chongjin.

She placed a lei of red carnations around the president's neck and kissed him on the cheeks in the Hawaiian tradition.

President Truman took three steps and took the lei off.

Photographers were not permitted to take pictures of the lei presentation.

Army Secretary Pace and General Bradley and other members of the president's advisory group arrived at Hickam field aboard the "Dew Drop" ten minutes before the "Independence" came winging across Honolulu's famed Diamond Head and Wai-kiki beach.

Adm. Arthur W. Radford, Pacific fleet commander, and all flag and general officers in the Hawaiian area met them at the airfield together with Governor Stainback, Mayor John Wilson of Honolulu and Delegate to Congress Joseph R. Farrington.

Wake island, a tiny coral dot in the mid-Pacific, apparently was the site of the talks the president will have with General MacArthur, but with an official announcement on the meeting place was withheld until later.

Wake is 2,300 miles west of Honolulu.
