It's a Gala Week-End for Both Students and Alumni

Willamette's 1950 Homecoming was officially begun this morning at 5 o'clock when freshmen raked all leaves on campus in anticipation of many alumni expected back for Homecoming and the football game with the University of Hawaii.

Elaborate Homecoming signs were erected on the campus by all living organizations last evening and judged this afternoon by a committee of advertising men from Salem. All signs carry out the good-neighbor theme using the slogan "Bearcats Subdue the Rainbow Hue," and are being viewed with interest as alumni return to the campus.

All Willamette students, alumni and guests are invited to a no-host banquet at the Marion hotel at 6 o'clock this evening. The venison dinner is sponsored jointly by the Salem Breakfast club and the Chamber of Commerce as part of the Homecoming program.

Salemites should be prepared for a deafening roar to spread over the city this evening as the annual noise parade winds its way through the downtown streets. The 20 vehicles will be loaded with air compressors, whistles, drums, bells and screaming students with cotton in their ears as individual living organizations vie for the title of "noisiest of all." The parade will end at a rally bonfire at McCulloch field when pre-game spirit will be stirred up by the yell squad and yell king Bill Bissell.

Lausanne hall will be the scene of the alumni luncheon tomorrow at 12 noon. General chairman, Janet Stark of Portland, has extended a special invitation to all alumni to attend. Baby orchids flown from Hawaii will be presented each woman guest as couples dance "Beyond the Reef" Saturday evening at 9 o'clock in the gymnasium. Don Irwin, general chairman of the Homecoming dance, has invited all students and alumni to attend the semi-formal affair. Thatched huts, palms, beach scenes and tropical flowers will lend an authentic Hawaiian air.

Presentation of awards for the sign contest, noise parade and "Ugly Man Contest" will be made during a broadcast over KOCO directly from the dance.
