

'It's All the Way You Word It'

It behooves us all to mark our words said Dr. Howard W. Runkel, associate professor of speech at Willamette university at the close of an entertaining address before Salem Rotarians Wednesday noon.

Based on the topic "It Is All In the Way You Word It," Dr. Runkel developed his talk by comparing the manner distinguished leaders spoke concerning the same subject. This comparison, he said, revealed that "words accurately portray ourselves to others." Furthermore, he continued, what we have said portrays our environmental background.

Dr. Runkel gave as an example during one point in his talk concerning "it is all in the way you word it," the manner in which President Abraham Lincoln wrote a letter of condolence to a woman who had supposedly lost five children during the Civil war in defense of the Union as contrasted with a similar communication by Kaiser Wilhelm.

Board to Meet Architects

Salem architects have been invited to discuss their professional ability during Wednesday night's special meeting of the Salem school board. The meeting was primarily called for the purpose of opening bids on two remodeling and enlarging jobs—Highland and Richmond grade buildings.

For the past few years a Portland firm of architects has been drawing plans for the Salem school district. Local architects in a letter to the board expressed a desire to share some of the business. The board agreed that it would be well for them to present their qualifications. They will appear before the directors after the bids have been opened.

Architects who have indicated an interest in the local school building programs include James L. Payne, William Williams, John G. Grove, Frank Struble, Louis Schmetz and Frederick Eley.

In view of the proposal to building a second senior high school, the opportunity for a good sized architectural fee will be presented during the next few years. The board has expressed a willingness to employ local architects providing they are qualified to carry out the projects involved.

Committee on Air Pollution Working

Governor McKay's committee on air pollution is working on proposed laws to be submitted to the legislature.

The committee decided here yesterday to submit the tentative legislation to the league of Oregon Cities, Association of Oregon Counties, State Grange, Oregon Farm Bureau, and the state farmers union.

The committee will meet here November 28 to consider any suggestions from these organizations.

The committee will recommend that the state sanitary authority be given power to control air pollution, such as smoke and chemicals.

Streets Flooded by Halloween Vandals

Employees of the city water department were busy Wednesday morning shutting off hydrants, especially in the Fairmount hill district.

A number of city hydrants were opened by Halloween pranksters during the night, and as a result water flooded several streets at the foot of Fairmount hill.

Water was a foot deep at one point on Lefelle street and on the South River road. The standing water was attributed to leaves which clogged the gutters, preventing the overflow of water from draining.

The hydrants were all closed by 9 a.m. Wednesday, and most of the water had been drained off the streets by noon.

Boettiger Cremation Scheduled Today

New York, Nov. 1 (AP)—John Boettiger, who killed himself yesterday in a plunge from a hotel, will be cremated today—on his wedding anniversary.

Just a year ago the 50-year-old newspaperman and former son-in-law of the late President Roosevelt married his third wife, the former Mrs. Virginia Daly Lunn in The Hague, Holland.

Yesterday, apparently suffering from nervous depression over business losses and work problems, he brushed aside a male nurse and hurled himself from his seventh floor suite in

the exclusive hotel Weylin in mid-Manhattan.

Even as he jumped, his wife was flying from Los Angeles to be with him for the anniversary.

First Defense Classes to Train

The first classes designed to prepare Marion county citizens for civilian defense work will get underway within the next few days, Robert Fenix, county deputy in charge of information, said Wednesday.

A class in small arms firing will begin Thursday night. Each member of the county's "flying squadron" will be trained in the use of small arms.

A class in radiological monitoring will open at Salem high school Monday night, Fenix said. This class will be to instruct men in how to detect the presence of radioactivity from an atom bomb, and how to cope with the situation once it is present.

Other classes scheduled to open in the near future include first aid, public welfare, reconnaissance and map reading, search and recovery, radar and electronics, etc.

Meanwhile, civilian defense programs in the various incorporated cities of Marion county are in the final stages of organization.

The entire defense program, both the county unit and the units in each city, are expected to be in practical operation by the first of the year.

Vinson Sponsors Giant Carrier

Washington, Nov. 1 (AP)—Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) proposed today the immediate construction of a new 60,000-ton aircraft carrier designed for A-bomb flights from its deck.

Vinson, chairman of the house armed services committee, has prepared a bill for introduction of the forthcoming special session of congress authorizing the navy to go ahead on a new "super carrier."

The biggest carriers the navy now has are the 45,000-ton type; only recently one of them reported the landing on its flight deck of a plane capable of carrying the A-bomb. Previously large bombers had taken off from their decks.

Both house and senate are considered likely to approve Vinson's super carrier proposal. Vinson said today he thought the program should be pushed as fast as possible. And without saying so directly, he implied it had administration approval and would not be opposed by the military joint chiefs of staff.

Vinson's bill would limit the new carrier to a top of 60,000 tons, or about 20,000 tons lighter than the navy's proposed flush deck carrier which former Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson knocked in the head last year.

Browning & Randolph To Build Supermarket

A contract has been awarded to Browning & Randolph, 246 East Salem Heights avenue, for construction of Erickson's Supermarket at South Commercial and Alice.

The plans were prepared by James L. Payne, architect. They call for a building of reinforced concrete 105x120 feet. It will have 113-foot 6-inch bolting trusses. The sales room will have an area of 9500 square feet, stock room and refrigerated storage 3500 square feet and offices 1200 square feet.

The new market will be the central office for the firm's chain of markets throughout the northwest.

Peter Lindstrom Divorces Bergman

Los Angeles, Nov. 1 (AP)—Dr. Peter Lindstrom was granted a divorce today from Actress Ingrid Bergman after testifying that the first he knew of her pregnancy by another was when he read it in a newspaper.

YMCA to Elect New Directors

Seven members of the Salem YMCA board of directors will be up for re-election and six new ones will be selected during the annual meeting of the association scheduled for the night of November 13.

The slate as prepared by the nominating committee, headed by Paul B. Wallace, includes the following men: for re-election, Dr. Robert Anderson, Doug Chambers, Robert L. Elstrom, Frederick Lampert, Walter Minier, C. A. Page and Dr. G. Herbert Smith, all for three year terms. Newly nominated: Lawrence Rich and Dr. Robert Wulf, three years; George Roth and Ron Huddins, two years; Reynolds Allen and John Kolb, one year.

Featured speaker for the dinner meeting will be Clair Johnson of the world service division of the YMCA who is in this country on a year's leave following five years spent in Caracas, Venezuela. Johnson, at one time was affiliated with the Portland YMCA as well as at Lincoln, Neb., Boston, and Pittsburgh.

Traffic Deaths in U. S. Increase

Chicago, Nov. 1 (AP)—The nation's traffic deaths in 1950 appear headed for the highest mark since 1941—a total of 35,000—says the national safety council.

Traffic fatalities for the first nine months this year were 24,580, an increase of 11 per cent over last year, the council said. It added the year's toll of 35,000 "now is virtually certain." The September toll was 3100, an increase of five per cent over September, 1949.

One of the main reasons given by the council for the increase was the big boost in automobile production.

The council estimated more than 45,000,000 vehicles are in operation.

"The answer is simply that the present traffic safety defense line cannot cope with the production line," said Ned H. Dearborn, council president.

Lumber Cargo Shifts on Ship

Balboa, Canal Zone, Nov. 1 (AP)—The American Liberty freighter Oregonian was being towed into Balboa today after her 9,000-ton cargo of lumber shifted and caused the ship to list at a dangerous 23 degrees.

The Oregonian, formerly the Arkansas and listed at a gross cargo tonnage of 7,210 tons, called for help Sunday night off the coast of Nicaragua, 400 miles from Balboa. The Panama Canal salvage tug Taboga went to her rescue.

The ship is expected to arrive here today, where the cargo will have to be unloaded and restowed. At a 23 degree list, her boilers cannot function properly.

Officials of the Orion Ship company of New York, owners of the vessel, said the Oregonian, with a crew of 39, left Portland, Ore., enroute to New York through the Panama Canal. The officials said that, although the sea was calm, the fact that 1,500 tons of the lumber cargo was stored on deck probably made the ship top-heavy and caused the shift.

'Typical' Juvenile Tests Point to Differences in Boys

The typical juvenile delinquent, as shown by a recent exhaustive study of 1,000 boys, is not at all what you'd expect him to be. Far from being an underprivileged runt he is likely to have the physique of an athlete, excellent health, little if any psychoneurotic trouble, an intelligence as high as that of the average "good" boy and probably a little more creative ability.

The study of the 1,000 boys—500 normal ones with good records at home and school, and 500 who had been in trouble with the police—was conducted by Sheldon Glueck, professor of criminology, and his wife, Dr. Eleanor Glueck, research associate of the Harvard Law School.

Significant in the survey was the careful matching of "good" boys with "bad," pair by pair, on the basis of similarity of age, background and intelligence. The trouble-maker from a low-rent, poor-neighborhood family was compared with a normal boy of the same age, economic group and social environment.

The Gluecks' findings are reported in their book, "Unraveling the Threads of Juvenile Delinquency," recently published by the Commonwealth Fund, New York.

In a preview of the book, in the November Reader's Digest, Fulton Oursler says: "The old dream of psychologists and churchmen—to spot potential lawbreakers before they have ever thrown stones at trains, set fire to houses, slugged, stolen or murdered—comes much nearer to reality as a result of the Gluecks' studies."

A striking difference between good and bad boys was found in their temperamental attitudes toward life.

The investigators learned that from earliest childhood the delinquent finds it hard to "think and act in the ways of the community." To his nature, all submissiveness is odious and he refuses to respect any rule.
