

GOP Strengthens Grip in Oregon

Portland, Ore., Nov. 8 (P)—Republicans strengthened their stranglehold on Oregon at Tuesday's election, with maverick republican Sen. Wayne L. Morse, piling the party's thumping victory.

Senator Morse, who has been under fire from some republican leaders because of his lack of party regularity, defeated Howard F. Latourette, Portland, self-styled Jeffersonian democrat.

Returns from 1,413 of 2,018 precincts gave Morse 188,153 to Latourette's 59,677. When Morse was elected for the first time six years ago, he had only a 3 to 2 margin.

Governor Douglas McKay was returned to office with a 170,610 to 85,105 edge at the same stage in the count, over State Sen. Austin F. Flegel, Portland lawyer and industrialist.

The size of the victory was surprising because the democrats had a 17,000 edge in registered voters.

Two years ago, Thomas E. Dewey carried Oregon 260,904 to 243,147 over President Truman, to make Oregon the only republican state in the west in that election. Oregon hasn't elected a democratic senator since 1914.

Three of the state's congressmen—Walter Norblad of Astoria, Homer D. Angell of Portland, and Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg, were re-elected easily. All are republicans.

The fourth congressman, Rep. Lowell Stockman of Pendleton, was leading 26,995 to 19,211 over State Sen. Vernon D. Bull, La Grande democrat.

Dewey Wins by 500,000 Votes

New York, Nov. 8 (P)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey won his third term as governor of New York yesterday in a smashing election victory that re-established him as a power to be reckoned with when the republicans choose a 1952 presidential candidate.

The rout of New York state democrats was virtually complete except for the re-election of Sen. Herbert H. Lehman, the 72-year-old veteran campaigner who rode to victory on the democrat-liberal ticket.

More than 5,250,000 persons voted—a record for an election in a non-presidential year. There were 6,443,512 registered and eligible to vote.

Dewey defeated Rep. Walter A. Lynch, 56-year-old democratic-liberal candidate, by a plurality of about 500,000 votes.

With 9,690 of New York's 9,706 districts reported, Dewey had 2,807,325 votes, to 2,245,265 for Lynch, who came into the race from the relative obscurity of a Bronx congressional district.

In the senatorial contest, Lehman, in 9,686 districts, had 2,621,754 votes to 2,358,939 for Lt. Gov. Joe E. Hanley, who broke down of exhaustion in the closing days of the campaign and met defeat in a hospital bed.

A feature of Dewey's triumph was his sudden, unusual jump in the esteem of big city voters.

'Forget Me Not Day' Set Next Friday

Fred S. Bynon Jr. Passes at Home

Funeral services will be held at the Clough-Barrick chapel, Thursday, November 9, at 10:30 a.m. for Fred S. Bynon Jr., who died at his home at route 1, box 308, Wednesday following a long illness.

Rev. Lloyd T. Anderson will officiate at the service and concluding services, which will be private, will be in Belcrest Memorial park, Thursday at 10:30 a.m.

Bynon, who was in the insurance and collection business here, was born November 16, 1902, in Hollywood, Calif. With his parents, Mrs. Frederick S. Bynon, Sr., and the late Mr. Bynon, he came to Oregon in 1908. He attended Salem public schools and Willamette law school. Bynon had been operating a farm at route 1, box 308.

Veteran of service with the Army infantry in World War II, Bynon was a member of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion.

Surviving Bynon are his wife, Eunice Helen Bynon of Salem; a son, Fred S. Bynon, III, Salem; a daughter, Mrs. Edith Wells of Seattle; mother, Mrs. Fred S. Bynon of Salem; three sisters, Mrs. F. C. Van Gortler of Seattle, Mrs. Charles E. Low of Brookings, Oregon, and Mrs. I. N. Stewart of Klamath Falls; a brother, George Edward Bynon of Salem; and a granddaughter, Mary Louise Wells of Seattle.

Tydings Loses In Maryland

Baltimore, Nov. 8 (P)—Mildred E. Tydings, democratic senator from Maryland since back in 1927 and a pillar of the Truman administration, yesterday tasted defeat at the polls for the first time in 30 years.

It came at the hands of a political unknown, John Marshall Butler, Baltimore republican lawyer.

A republican upset also unseated democratic Governor William Preston Lane, Jr., who also had held a place in the sun as national committeeman. He will be succeeded by former Mayor Theodore R. McKeldin of Baltimore, who finally won the job on his third try.

Tydings had not fallen at the polls since he first was named to the Maryland general assembly in 1920. Into his seat will go a quiet, unassuming attorney who was making his first bid for an elective office.

The lanky democratic senator, who among other things was chairman of the powerful armed services committee, ran on his record in that post and also as chief of the subcommittee which investigated charges of communist infiltration into the state department.

In 790 of the state's 1,429 polling places Butler's vote was 207,336 and Tydings had 173,797.

In the same number of polling places, McKeldin garnered 235,323 votes to Lane's 172,990.

Magnusen Wins In Washington

Seattle, Nov. 8 (P)—The vote-getting power of handsome Warren G. Magnusen survived another test yesterday as the actor senator from Washington proved as good as his slogan: "He gets things done."

He got himself re-elected in spite of a spirited challenge by a newcomer to politics, W. Walter Williams, Seattle republican. When the weary candidates finally retired early this morning Magnusen's campaign manager was claiming the election.

With 2,333 of the state's 4,242 precincts reported, Magnusen had a lead of 192,497 to 166,948, and his supporters predicted his final margin would approach 50,000.

Three representatives, a democrat and two republicans, also were safely past their election roadblocks. Democrat John Coffey, who spent 10 years in the house, failed in his comeback attempt to unseat Republican Thor Tollefson. The veteran Henry Jackson was re-elected to a sixth term by second district democrats, and republican Walt Horan won again in the fifth district.

Apparently on the road to re-election was another republican, Hal Holmes of Ellensburg, but two nip-and-tuck scrambles had

developed in the first and third districts. Rep. Hugh Mitchell (D) and Mrs. F. F. Powell (R) swapped the lead frequently in the first district, and there was a possibility it might take the count of absentee ballots to decide the race.

McMahon Wins In Connecticut

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 8 (P)—Connecticut's ticket-splitting electorate retained its two democratic senators, one by a wide

margin and the other by such a slim edge that his GOP rival refused to concede.

Complete unofficial results tabulated today, however, cost democrats the governorship. Re-elected by the biggest majority given any candidate, democratic or republican, was Senator Brian McMahon. He is chairman of the joint congressional committee on atomic energy.

He scored close to a 45,000 vote victory over ex-Rep. Joseph E. Talbot.

In contrast, the second senatorial race went to senator William Benton by about 1,500 votes. His GOP rival, Prescott Bush, steadfastly refused to concede defeat, and his supporters talked of a possible demand for a recount.

The biggest off-year turnout of voters in the state's history saw Governor Chester Bowles, wartime OPA administrator, lose his bid for re-election.

The office went to Rep. John Lodge, member of an old Massachusetts republican family. He defeated Bowles by more than 15,000 to become the first winner of a four-year term.

Watkings, Allenby Advanced By First National Bank

The promotion of Ford E. Watkings, assistant manager of the First National Bank of Portland, to assistant vice-president at the main office in Portland, and the subsequent appointment of James H. Allenby of Portland to the vacant Salem post were announced today by A. A. Atherton, manager of the Salem branch.

Allenby, who will leave his duties in the loan production and examination department at the Portland head office of the First National bank to accept the new post, has had over 20 years of banking experience with emphasis on loans. His service as manager and assistant manager at other banks especially qualify him for the new post.

Watkings will move to Portland to accept a position as public relations officer at the First National Bank's main office. He has been associated with First National for 25 years and has served as assistant manager of the Salem branch since 1948, prior to which he had been manager of the bank's Oregon City branch.

While associated with the Salem bank, Watkings has been very active in Salem civic affairs. He is the present chairman of Associated Services for Salem and Marion county, president of the Salem Credit association, chairman of the Salem committee of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, and a director of the Salem YMCA.

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Yamhill Quashes Local Option Bill

McMinnville—In the Yamhill county balloting, the local option bill which would have enabled the county to vote itself "wet" or "dry" at any election was receiving a strong defeat at 7080 to 3401 as votes from 31 of 33 precincts were tabulated.

The levy of some \$90,000 per year for county road maintenance was almost assured of its fourth straight defeat by a vote of 5010 to 4448.

Republicans were making a strong race of it in the contest for the state legislature as incumbent State Senator Eugene Marsh led by 5755 over his democratic opponent Keith Coburn.

In the dispute for delegates to the state house of representatives, republicans Carl H. Francis and Elliott Cummins were leading with 6449 and 5691 over their democratic opponents Guy Shumway and Will Bolash with 4222 and 2130.

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GOP Landslide Say Defeated

Portland, Nov. 8 (P)—It didn't take long for the democratic candidates to throw in the sponge after the polls closed in Oregon last night.

State Sen. Austin F. Flegel conceded defeat to Governor Douglas McKay at 9:45 p.m., after the first scattering returns showed McKay an easy winner.

Howard F. Latourette was a little harder to convince, but he conceded at 10:30 p.m. that his opponent, Sen. Wayne L. Morse, had won. At the same time, Carl C. Donaguh conceded that Rep. Homer D. Angell had won a seventh term in congress.

The republican landslide made it possible to know the results much earlier than usual. By midnight, almost all of the candidates knew their fate.

Here's what the top party men had to say about it:

Latourette—"My main objective in this campaign was to emphasize that this country must be strong in national defense, uncompromising against communism and sound in its domestic economy."

Flegel—"I have wired the governor . . . and wished him complete success in his administration. I worked hard in the campaign and have no regrets at running. We were simply caught in a national landslide."

Ralph Cake, republican national committeeman—"The results will be taken soberly, recognizing the responsibility ahead and I hope that with continued hard work, the results will be even better in 1952."

Monroe Sweetland, democratic national committeeman—"Bucking a national rip-tide of off-year republicanism, we were licked before we started. But two years of republicanism will give us our chance in 1952 as it did in 1948, after the people had tasted the effect of a similar wave of reaction in 1946."

Four Months Notice For Personnel Called

After November 10 National Guard units, reserve organizations and individuals called to active duty with U. S. armed forces will receive at least four months' notice.

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That information was received from Sixth army headquarters by Oregon's adjutant general, Maj. Thomas E. Rilea.

The telegram stated that up to November 10 National Guard units, reserve organizations or individuals would receive 30 days' notice and thereafter it would be four months unless there was a serious change in the international situation.

Duff Wins in Pennsylvania

Philadelphia, Nov. 8 (P)—James H. Duff won election to the U. S. senate today, gaining added stature as a republican presidential possibility in 1952.

"Big Red," who has been Pennsylvania's governor for the last four years, trounced the senate's number two democrat, Francis J. Myers, by 125,000 votes in near record balloting that swept Duff's hand-picked mate for governor, John S. Fine, into office.

Backslapping, handshaking Duff supporters cheered the governor as he walked into GOP headquarters at Harrisburg shortly before 3 a.m.

"How are you, Mr. President?" some shouted.

"Not yet," cautioned the 67-year-old Duff. He would say no more when quizzed about any presidential aspirations. The democrats had maintained that Duff intended using a senate seat as a springboard for a campaign for the presidential nomination in 1952.

It was a clean sweep for the republicans in this important state, long considered a GOP stronghold.

In addition to electing Duff and Fine, the nearly 3,500,000 voters who cast ballots selected: (A) GOP candidates for lieutenant governor, secretary of internal affairs and for judgeships on the state supreme and superior courts; (B) a republican majority in both state houses, and (C) two additional republicans for the U. S. house, upping the GOP strength from 18 to 20.

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Phone Crews Here Will Work

Normal operation of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph office in Salem was expected to continue despite a nationwide dispute involving Western Electric equipment workers.

The basis for the expectation for normal conditions here was a statement by Elmer Berglund, local manager, to the effect that there were no Western Electric equipment workers in Salem.

"Our crew is planning to keep working," Berglund said.

Picket lines are expected to be operated against telephone company offices in cities throughout the nation Thursday when a strike deadline is reached. Western Electric equipment workers are installers employed by Western Electric, a Bell Telephone company subsidiary.

A possibility that picket lines would be out in Portland came with the disclosure that some of the equipment workers were located there.

Provided picket lines are respected by other telephone company employees throughout the nation, long distance calls from and to Salem might meet with delay. Supervisory employees normally take over switchboards.

William Morrison, vice president of the Oregon CIO Communication Workers, said other workers, those directly employed by PT&T, were expected to respect the lines.

There are about 100 employees of the Western Electric division of the phone company in Oregon. Most of them now are working in Portland.
