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To Ask Council For Sanction of Street Benches

Propose Use of Sidewalks and Parking Strips for Bus Patrons

Benches for the convenience of persons waiting on the streets for transportation may shortly appear on sidewalks and parking strips in Salem. They are an advertising medium and would pay the city some revenue in fees.

City Manager J. L. Franzen said he had no information about an ordinance bill that is to be introduced Monday night, but knew a private concern had been consulting some of the other city officials.

Paid by Advertising
The bill that has been prepared for introduction provides that the benches may be set up "on sidewalks and sidewalk parking strips for free use of all pedestrians and persons awaiting transportation."

It is provided that advertising for any person, firm or institution may appear on the benches. Permits would be granted by the city engineer. Before issuance of a permit the written and signed approval of the owner, lessee or tenant of the property abutting the location of the bench would have to be filed with the engineer together with the application.

Bench Plans Outlined
The engineer would have authority to approve or deny the application, and if denied, to keep a record of the reason for denial. The applicant could, within 30 days, appeal to the council.

No bench could be more than 42 inches high, two feet and six inches wide, or more than six feet long. To discourage upsetting and vandalism it would be of heavy construction and weigh 50 pounds.

The applicant would be required to file a bond to relieve the city of the owner, lessee or tenant of abutting property of liability for damage to persons or property. The amount of the bonds would be \$500 to \$10,000 for from one to 10 benches; \$10,000 to \$20,000 for from 11 to 50 benches; \$20,000 to \$40,000 for from 51 to 100 benches; and \$50,000 to \$100,000 for over 100 benches.

Willamette Pass—Spots of ice, 2 inches roadside snow.

Gangsters Lose Fight to Keep Out of Prison

Supreme Court Decides Against Capone Racketeers

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Two former members of the old Al Capone gang today lost a supreme court fight to remain out of prison on paroles granted in 1947.

They are Louis Compagna and Charles Gioe, one-time associates of the late Chicago mobster, who had served a third of their ten-year sentences in the Atlanta penitentiary before they were freed. Later their paroles were revoked after a congressional investigation.

The supreme court decided the case with a 4-4 vote in which Justice Clark took no part. No opinion was written and the votes of the individual judges were not disclosed.

A tie vote upholds the decision of the lower court, in this case the U. S. circuit court in New Orleans.

Sought for \$1,000,000
Compagna and Gioe were among a group sentenced in New York City for conspiring to extort more than \$1,000,000 from the movie industry. They were parolee Aug. 13, 1947, by the U. S. parole board.

An investigation of the paroles was made by a house executive expenditures subcommittee the next year and on July 21, 1948, the parole board ordered the two returned to prison on the ground that they had violated parole conditions.

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Coldest Night Of Autumn

Winter gave further notice it is on its way in, Monday, thermometers in Salem vicinity dropping down to 27 degrees for the coldest morning since March 10 last.

A heavy frost coated lawns and roofs. Forecast for tonight and Tuesday calls for cloudiness and occasional rain, with temperatures to turn cooler again Tuesday.

Central and eastern Oregon sections were hit with colder temperatures and snow. Farmers in the central part of the state are particularly worried about potato and Ladino clover still unharvested. Six inches of snow covered Jefferson county farms where an estimated 30 percent of the clover crop is still unharvested.

Pendleton, Lakeview and the Klamath Falls area all reported snow this morning, 3.2 inches being measured in a 10-hour fall at Pendleton Saturday night and Sunday morning. The fall was the most ever recorded there in a 24-hour period in November.

Valley points, like Salem, had clear, snappy weather this morning. The mercury at Portland was down to 28 degrees, 27 at Eugene and 28 at Corvallis.

The low in the state this morning was 20, recorded at Baker.

Youths Arrests Solve Polk County Burglaries

Dallas, Nov. 13—The basement of the Polk county courthouse is loaded with an odd assortment of food, blankets, surplus motor oil, overcoats, clothing, and various other miscellaneous items.

And lodged in the Polk county jail are Lester LeRoy Brown, 17, of box 15, Amity, and Vernon Ross Shoemaker, 18, box 5, Amity, who are being held on suspicion of robbery.

Following the robbery Thursday evening, November 9, of the Perrydale high school and of the Farmers Union cooperative at Derry Station near Rickreall, county and state police had little to go on aside from a few scattered fingerprints.

However, that same Thursday night, Mrs. Virgil Beaver who lives near the northern Yamhill-Polk county line reported the theft of a pickup truck. That same evening later, neighbors told her of seeing the truck up in the hills. She recovered the truck but found it loaded with clothing, containers of oil and other items. She reported the find to county officers who identified it as part of the loot taken from the Perrydale school.

The persons who first spotted the truck had also seen and recognized the two boys now under arrest.



McKay Chairman West Governors

Governor Douglas McKay is the new chairman of the Western Governors' conference.

The conference, which includes governors of the 11 western states, Alaska and Hawaii, met Friday and Saturday in Denver, Colo., for its annual meeting.

Governor McKay, who returned today, said the governors are friendly to the idea of establishing regional centers for higher education.

Under this plan, each state with an outstanding school of specialized college education would open these schools to students from other states. The other states then would pay the costs of educating their own students.

For instance, Oregon, which has an outstanding medical school, would take students from any of the other western states. The other states would pay about \$3,000 a year for educating their students here, and the money would be used to expand the medical school.

"The plan would eliminate costly duplication," the governor said.

Under the same plan, for instance, the school of veterinary medicine at Washington State college would be built up.

Cut in Western Rates Ordered

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission today ordered a cut of about 3.5 percent in rail and water freight rates between a score of midwestern cities and the remainder of the western states.

The cities affected are located on the western border of so-called zone one of western trunk line territory.

The zone traditionally has freight rates somewhat lower than the eastern states and somewhat higher than the rest of the west so as to avoid too abrupt a change in the level of charges in the middle of the country.

Under general freight rate increases were granted in 1947 and 1948, many shippers complained that longstanding competitive relationships had been disturbed because the zone one western border points were included in the zone one increases, rather than the slightly lower increases applied generally in the west.

Courthouse Crowded By Irate Taxpayers

A mighty throng of townspeople and farmers, both men and women jammed the main floor of the Marion county courthouse Monday in an effort to beat the deadline in paying their taxes.

Officially, they have until the close of business Wednesday to make the payment and take advantage of the three percent discount on the tax statement.

The last of the statements were put in the mail at 9 a.m. Monday; consequently, it was considered likely that many of the country's residents would not receive their statements before expiration of the discount deadline.

For this reason, Sheriff Denver Young's office emphasized that payment of taxes may now be made without presentation of a statement. By lining up at the tax window, a counter check on the statement can be made and payment received.

The first payments were received Friday shortly after the sheriff officially received the tax rolls from County Assessor "Bud" Shelton, who had been delayed from October 16 to November 10 in completing the lists.

In an effort to speed counterwork, a second huge cash register was installed, but mechanical troubles put the machine out of operation early Monday.

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Ban German Arms Making

Bonn, Germany, Nov. 13 (AP)—The allies have forbidden the West Germans to make for themselves the small arms for their special 30,000 security police.

And the Germans say they cannot afford the dollars to buy the weapons from the United States.

This impasse has apparently halted the arming of the force, which was authorized by the September foreign ministers' conference to guard against communist attempts to overthrow the Bonn regime.

Maj. Gen. George P. Hays, deputy U. S. high commissioner, said today that the Germans asked the allied reaction to a proposal that they make the pistols and carbines for the force themselves.

Because the three allies could not agree on the point, the Germans were told it would not be allowed, Hays said.

Count Gerd von Schwerin, former military advisor to Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, denied he had submitted a memorandum to the allies suggested German manufacture of weapons.

Published reports (not carried by the Associated Press) had attributed the proposal to him.

Under the allied program for demilitarizing Germany, the Germans have been forbidden ever since the war to manufacture arms except for sport.

Hays said he personally could see no objection to the small arms as German gunsmiths were already making sporting guns.

Portland Milk Prices Upped Cent a Quart

Portland, Nov. 13 (AP)—The state marketing administration today announced a one-cent a quart milk price increase here, starting Thursday.

This will bring the price to 20½ cents a quart. Store and home delivery prices remain the same.

The price boost was granted after a series of hearings held here in September.

United Nations Seek to Avert World War III

Three Pronged Diplomatic Offensive to Neutralize Red China

Lake Success, Nov. 13 (AP)—The United Nations mounted a three-pronged diplomatic offensive today, seeking to neutralize communist China and to prevent the Korean campaign from exploding into World War III.

On the eve of the departure from Peiping of a Red delegation to the security council, diplomats moved swiftly to keep the war localized.

The basic strategy was to reassure Chinese communist leaders that UN forces had no designs on their territory, would not interfere with China's supply of electric power from North Korean dams and would build a united, democratic, independent Korea which would present no threat to China.

Warns Red China
This was combined with a clear warning, however, that continued Red Chinese intervention in Korea would lead to drastic action.

As though to point up these efforts, a spokesman at Gen. MacArthur's Tokyo headquarters announced that the current allied push toward the Yalu river is just a "limited offensive."

Informed observers here considered this indicated that the UN military command also was treading gingerly, hoping to win a decisive victory over the North Koreans while giving the Chinese an opportunity to withdraw with a minimum loss of face.

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Left Wingers Peace Parley

Sheffield, Eng., Nov. 13 (AP)—Sheffield's bob-tailed peace congress met in chaotic session today to devise means of moving quickly to Warsaw, Poland.

The Sheffield city hall, where the communist-led congress had engaged an auditorium for a five-day meeting, was for a few hours a strongly guarded fortress. Dozens of stewards admitted only delegates with credentials, and some people were left out in the rain because they could not find their tickets. Reporters and the public were not allowed inside.

Some of the hundreds of persons who got past the screening at the doors and came out said the practical problems of making a thousand-mile shift in scene on short notice were being considered. These problems were largely financial but delegates were taking what comfort they could from reports that the Polish government is willing to meet the costs of an adjourned meeting in Warsaw.

There, on Thursday, the travelers will open their week-long congress to demand a Russian-style ban on the atom bomb and reduction and control of armaments.

John W. Kelly Dies Suddenly

John William Kelly, 75, veteran newspaperman and executive director of the Oregon commission on postwar development after the close of World War II, died at his home here Monday morning from a heart attack.

Kelly, a resident of 255 South 14th street, suffered the heart attack about 8:45 a.m. First aid and a doctor were called but he was dead on their arrival.

Born in Portland, Oregon, August 27, 1875, John Kelly was the son of William James and Harriet Gleason Kelly. His education was received at Mt. Angel college.

A newspaperman since 1894, Kelly was drama critic for the Portland Telegram from 1899 to 1918 and served as columnist from 1904 to 1907. Later he went to the Oregonian to become its chief political writer.

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Find 2 Dead In Stalled Auto

Corvallis, Nov. 13 (AP)—Two men, tentatively identified as Isaac Elmore Parks, 54, Kennewick, Wash., and Steve Elmer Kish, 33, possibly from Sacramento, were found dead in their automobile about six miles south of here this morning.

There were no marks on either body, but Undertaker Frank Werner voiced the opinion they were not victims of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Doctors were to examine the bodies this afternoon to attempt to arrive at the cause of death. Identification of Parks was made through a liquor license found on his body and Kish through a nine-year-old California driver's license which listed his address as the Palace hotel, Sacramento.

The automobile in which the bodies were found had been driven off Highway 99-W but not into a nearby ditch. Authorities were notified by passersby who saw the bodies.

California motor vehicle records at Sacramento listed the car's license plates as registered to George D. Lindsey, 4162 Folsom St., San Francisco.

35 Percent Cut-back For Aluminum Use

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—A 35 percent cutback in use of aluminum for civilian consumer revenue production schedules and deder today by the national production authority.

The cutback order limits manufacturers of consumer goods to 65 percent of the average amount of aluminum they used during the first half of this year.

They will be allowed to use their full normal consumption during the rest of this year, giving them a month and a half to revise production schedules and find substitutes for aluminum, if possible.

Marines Drive 5.5 Miles Upon Changjin Lake

Bundled Like Eskimos, Blue Jackets Advance Continuously

Seoul, Korea, Nov. 13 (AP)—Parka-clad U. S. Marines pushed cautiously five and a half miles through undefended, icy hills toward the great Changjin reservoir today.

While the marines advanced in the center of the front, there was dogged fighting near both coasts.

Back of the front, United Nations forces drew a solid defense line across the narrow waist of Korea. The line was completed by the junction of the Third division, built up to battle strength by the addition of South Koreans and Puerto Ricans, and the South Korean Eighth division.

Weather Below Freezing
The advancing marines, bundled like Eskimos, wound through a corkscrew gorge in below freezing weather without tank support. Tank tracks churned the mountain road into a soggy mass that bogged down the heavy equipment.

Marine planes flew close cover. Even that was unneeded as the leathernecks ran into only a scattered handful of Chinese communists, remnants of the 124th division, garbed in padded cotton uniforms. The Reds were eliminated without marine loss.

To the west, communists appeared to be digging in or fighting delaying actions; but on the east coast they swarmed to the attack.

First Cavalry Advances
Near the west coast, U. S. First cavalry division units advanced a mile and one-half. That carried them half way to the walled town of Yongbyon. Patrols reached the walls but did not enter the town.

Heavy communist resistance stopped other First cavalry troops near Won, eight miles southeast of Yongbyon.

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Ask ROK Police For Supply Lines

Seoul, Nov. 13 (AP)—U.S. army officials have asked for 3,900 South Korean police to guard supply lines north of parallel 38 against Red raiders, Korean officials said today.

Under a United Nations resolution, South Korean government authority was limited to the area south of parallel 38. But, said Home Minister Chou Pyong OK, 7,000 police already have been sent to the east coast north of 37.

He said the new request came from the U. S. Eighth army. Twenty-five hundred police were requested for the area around Pongyang, former Red Korean capital, and another 1,400 for the Sariwon sector. Sariwon is south of Pongyang on the highway and railway to Seoul.

Kidnaping Lady Doctor Freed on \$25,000 Bond

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 13 (AP)—Dr. Nancy Campbell, 43-year-old Yale-trained woman doctor, was released from jail today on bond pending trial on charges of kidnaping a contractor's nine-year-old daughter.

The \$25,000 bond was signed by two doctors and two other property owners: Dr. Charlotte Jones, close friend, Dr. Herbert Ellis, vice president of the Santa Fe County Medical Association; David Hughes and Walter G. Turley.

Her attorney made immediate plans to send Dr. Campbell to an Albuquerque hospital the district attorney's office said arraignment on the kidnaping charges, carrying a penalty of five years to death would be in a week or two.

Through the night, a suicide guard stood watch in Dr. Campbell's jail cell, placed there by her attorney.

Dr. Campbell, dressed in men's clothes, was caught red-handed Saturday night when she reached for \$20,000 ransom cash and 30 hidden FBI agents and police rushed her in the darkness.

"I'm only a go-between," they said she shouted as they hurried into her, thinking she was a man.
