

Brown-Eyed Woman Chosen as Aide to Marshall Has Energy

New York, Nov. 13 (AP)—A brown-eyed woman with more energy than most of her male colleagues is packing up to leave her beige-carpeted Manhattan office to move to Washington as assistant secretary of defense.

Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, 48-year-old labor and public relations counselor who was recommended for the new post by Defense Secretary George C. Marshall, always had insisted she would not accept a government post. Even when President Roosevelt offered to make her secretary of labor she turned him down.

"But she has such a great admiration for Secretary Marshall she felt she couldn't say no," explained her son, Tom, who works with her in her office here.

If she is allowed to redecorate her office in Washington, it is likely to have relaxing beige or light blue walls, a beige carpet and light wood furniture. She insisted on this color scheme when she opened her labor and public relations office here, even though her friends insisted the touch of glamour might not appeal to men who attend her labor conferences.

"It's the way I like it, so why should they object?" she said firmly. They didn't. Many a long labor conference, lasting as much as 36 hours at a time, has been held beneath the crystal chandelier in the Rosenberg conference room.

She is inclined to belittle reports of her inexhaustible energy, and calls it, instead, "nervous tension." She says she's too keyed up to rest until a problem is settled.

The most frequent picture shows Mrs. Rosenberg at the telephone, making one of the scores of calls that punctuate her day and interrupt her office interviews. In recent months many have been from Washington, since she has been serving as consultant on manpower problems for the war resources board.

"She used to put an 'X' by important phone calls she had to make during the day," her son said. "Then she added two 'X's' for especially important calls. Now she's up to a four-X system. A phone call on her reminder pad with no X gets crowded off the wires for days, and sometimes weeks."

Mrs. Rosenberg, who will hold the highest position ever given a woman in the government's military defense division, regards the move with mixed feelings.

"She's proud, of course," said a spokesman at her office. "But she knows it will be hard work."

Timken Wage Hike Accepted

Canton, O., Nov. 13 (AP)—An offer by the Timken Roller Bearing Co. to boost wages 10 per cent has been accepted by CIO United Steelworkers at four plants in Ohio.

I. W. Isbel, USW district manager here, said increases would range from 12½ cents to 30 cents an hour and would bring the average pay to about \$1.87 an hour.

The four plants—here and at Columbus, Mount Vernon and Zanesville—employ some 13,000 persons.

Contracts are expected to be signed early this week. The agreement was the first reached in the steel industry since the union demanded substantial but unspecified pay increases.

Boeing Mechanics Accept Wage Offer

Seattle, Nov. 13 (AP)—Members of the Aero Mechanics' union (Independent) accepted yesterday an average 9.4 cents an hour wage increase offered by the Boeing Airplane company.

The boost will go to 14,917 workers at the company's Seattle and Renton plants. It is retroactive to November 1.

The union petitioned the company in September for a voluntary wage increase because of the rising cost of living and the increasing number of workers who had left for better paying jobs.

Man Confesses To 1946 Killing

Norristown, Pa., Nov. 13 (AP)—The Montgomery county district attorney scheduled a conference with state police today to discuss a "confession" by a man who says he killed Mrs. Miriam Green, Gerald Pottstown, Pa., divorcee, four years ago.

The body of the 29-year-old divorcee was found in her Pottstown apartment December 8, 1944. She had been garroted with a scarf, Gerald C. Wentzel, 39-year-old Pottstown civic leader, was convicted of second degree murder for the slaying and sentenced to 10 to 20 years in prison.

He has steadily maintained his innocence.

The defense department said

the confession came from a soldier who has returned to this country from Europe. A military spokesman said the statement gives the wrong date, by several months, for the slaying of Mrs. Green.

The soldier, whose name was not disclosed, was a civilian when Mrs. Green was slain, the defense department said, and volunteered his statement while imprisoned on another charge in a Berlin stockade. A wire recording was made and a copy of the statement was sent to Norristown after the soldier had been returned to the U.S. as a prisoner.

A detective said it appeared the place in suburban Northridge was burglarized, then set afire, perhaps in an attempt to cover up thefts. Sabu reported prowlers at the estate a week ago.
