Judge Watts of Pendleton Quits

Circuit Judge Homer I. Watts of Pendleton resigned today, effective November 30, because of ill health.

Governor Douglas McKay said he hoped to announce a successor within the next 24 hours. Judge Watts, who first was appointed April 21, 1947, was severely injured in an automobile accident last May.

He said in his letter to the governor: "Since my discharge from the hospital, I have put forth my best efforts to bring my health up to a point where I could continue, but my recovery has been too slow."

Judge Watts' 8th district consists of Morrow and Umatilla counties.

He was elected to a full six-year term in 1948. But his successor will serve only two years, until the 1952 general election.

Five Injured, Cars Wrecked In South River Road Crash

Two persons are in Salem General hospital and another in Salem Memorial hospital, all injured in a head-on collision Saturday night on South River road. Two others were treated for minor injuries. The cars were wrecked and one burned.

Robert Catterson, 14, of Salem Route 3 and Jean Bowen, 761 Mill street, were passengers in a north bound 1939 Chevrolet driven by Allen Leroy Underwood, 18, of 444 North 14th street around 8 o'clock when it collided head on with a 1941 Plymouth on the South River road near the Commercial Sand & Gravel company.

Passers-by summoned first aid and while five occupants of the two cars were being treated by the first aid squad, the Underwood car burst into flames, igniting gasoline spilled on the highway and over the car.

Front ends of the cars were meshed, but police and standees were able to separate them. The Plymouth, whose occupants were driver Abraham Tom, 45, of 825 North Front street; Leo Norwest, 47, Salem Route 3 and Mrs. Mary Norwest, his wife, and their small baby, began to catch fire but was pulled away from the Chevrolet. Tom and Norwest were seated in the front seat of their car and had to be pulled from it by spectators.

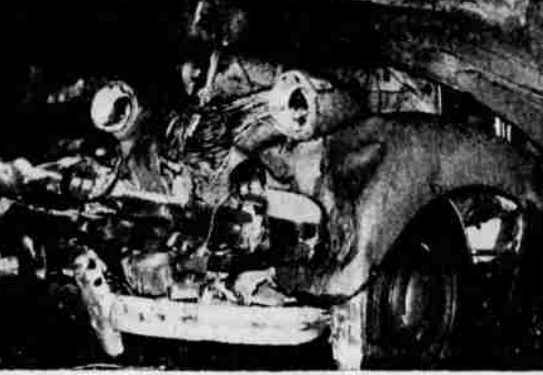

President of the sponsoring association is A. A. Manke. Proceeds from the affair will be turned into the band and orchestra benefit fund.

John W. Kelly

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He spent several years in the nation's capital as manager of the Oregonian's Washington news bureau and later wrote a column for a group of Oregon daily and weekly newspapers, including the Capital Journal.

United Nations

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The UN's strategy was applied in these three directions:

1. Australia's James Plimsoll, a member of the seven-nation Korean commission, flew to Korea to be available, with other commission members, in case Peiping wanted to negotiate a border settlement.

2. The general assembly's 60-nation economic and social committee, in joint session, pushed a plan for the post-war rehabilitation and relief of Korea.

3. Security council members continued private discussions on implementing the main strategic line—first made public in a resolution at Friday's meeting—and on what attitude to take when the Chinese Reds arrive.



Allied Moves in Korea—While bombers plastered key towns all along the Yalu river (blast symbols) ground activity was stepped up in several sectors in North Korea. In the northwest, U. S. and British troops pushed out from their Chongchon river bridgehead northward to the outskirts of Pakchon beyond which Red forces were reported massing in strength. In center sector, marines were only three miles from the Chingun reservoir. East of the marines, U. S. troops were driving toward the Pujon reservoir. Far to the northeast, South Koreans pushed within 85 miles of border in drive toward Chongjin. (AP Wirephoto map)

5 Pastors for Revised Version

Five church leaders of Salem have accepted a place on the speaker's bureau for the revised standard version Bible observance in the fall of 1952 from September 20 to October 5, when the entire revised standard version of the Bible will be published.

The leaders who have accepted the assignment are: Dr. Norman Huffman, head of the department of religions of Willamette university; Rev. Roy Fedje, superintendent of the Salem district for the Methodist church; Rev. Brooks Moore, pastor of the First Methodist church; Dr. Chester Hamblin, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, and Rev. Dudley Strain, minister of the First Christian church.

The five men will be available on the special day of the celebration, Tuesday, Sept. 30, 1952 for speaking engagements within a radius of 500 miles, according to announcement made by Dr. Harold E. Stassen, president of the University of Pennsylvania who has been president of the International Council of Religious Education since 1942.

The bill requires that benches be kept in good condition. Every application would be accompanied by a fee of \$2.50, which would be for a whole or fraction of a year. Permittees given permits for more than three benches would pay a fee equal to one-half the fee previously for outdoor advertising generally. The fee charged billboard advertisers is a minimum of \$100 per board or one-half of 1 per cent of the gross returns.

Benches would not be permitted in fire zone 1, except that they could be installed on the north and south sides of Cheimeth, the east side of High, the south side of Ferry, and streets lying west of the west bank of the Willamette.

Obscene matter would be barred from advertising and liquor ads not permitted. Permits could be revoked for fraud or misrepresentation. He might also revoke if a bench were not installed within 60 days after issuance of permit. Benches could be ordered removed to make way for improvements or to remove hazards. If not removed by the permittee within 30 days the city could do it and charge him \$5 per bench.

Coming before the council at Monday night's session will be the school board's \$53,000 bid for the old warehouse and shops at 13th and Ferry, also the application of City Transit Lines for authority to change routings. A remonstrance or two will appear.

Three public hearings are scheduled. They involve change of zone for the Hanson property on the east side of North 14th just south of D street to permit another apartment; the William Horstman application for permission to build an additional house in Block 10, Englewood; and application of Alpha Chi to build a sorority house in a Class I residential district.

Up to noon, only about 400 payments were recorded, and the line, which began at the tax collector's office, stretched to the east end of the building and snaked back to the west end, with new arrivals joining the jam in front of the assessor's office. During the peak of the morning rush, the line was even backed into the sheriff's office at the southwest corner of the floor.

It was estimated that as many as 300 persons were in line at one time.

At the rate of payment Monday morning, only a small fraction or the estimated 50,000 taxpayers would be able to beat the Wednesday deadline. But use of the second cash register was expected to speed the process.

Because of the jam, collection department employees urged taxpayers to use the mails in making their payments by check or money order. The postmark date would be taken into consideration on the payment deadline, and the payer would be able to avoid the heavy jam and wait at the county office.

Heard above the rumble of conversation of the throng in the corridor was a constant jangling of telephones both in the tax collector's office and sheriff's office as hundreds used that method to secure information on tax statements.

Wholesale Prices Continue Upward

Washington, Nov. 13 (AP)—Wholesale prices rose in the week ended Nov. 7 to a point two-tenths of one per cent below its all-time peak of Aug., 1948.

All commodities other than farm products and food reached a new high, nine per cent above the June 20 level.

Gangsters Lose

Government lawyers said the revocation action was based partly on evidence that Gioe associated with persons of known "bad reputation" and on the belief that Compagna did not tell the truth when he told the house committees he did not know who paid \$89,000 in back income tax for him while he was in prison. Parole reinstated.

The pair contested the revocation in U. S. district court in Atlanta and won an order reinstating the paroles. The government appealed to the U. S. circuit court in New Orleans. That court overruled the district court action, holding that a parole is a matter of grace, not of legal right.

Compagna and Gioe then appealed to the supreme court, contending the revocation was "solely in consequence of political pressure brought to bear on the parole board. They remained at liberty pending final action on their appeal.

The New Orleans circuit court, although ruling against Compagna and Gioe, specified that they should be permitted to file new pleading if they wished to do so.

Other Devisions

Thus their return to prison may be considerably delayed. Compagna generally spells his name "Compagna" but the appeal papers follow the other spelling throughout.

In other actions today the supreme court:

1. Unanimously upheld the government's \$100-in-ounce tax on unlicensed sales of the drug marijuana. A Chicago judge had held the levy unconstitutional.

2. Split 7 to 2 in setting aside a writ of habeas corpus for a man convicted of a robbery-slitting. Last year the tribunal divided 5 to 4 in ordering a retrial for a double homicide in the slaying. He was again convicted and sentenced to die. Both appeals claimed the judge obtained illegal evidence.

3. Tossed out, 8 to 1, the government's claim for triple damages against a Minneapolis underwear manufacturer for alleged violation of a World War II CIO price regulation. The majority opinion said the government had not properly used lower court remedies available to it in its case against Muninwear, Inc.

4. Refused to intervene in a lower court order which blocked the acquisition of 23 California banks by the Bank of America National Savings and Trust Association, of San Francisco. The federal reserve board had objected to the deal after it had been authorized by another government agency, the comptroller of the currency.

5. Turned down for a third time the appeal of Louis Blum, progressive party candidate for governor of Maryland, who was denied a place on the Nov. 7 ballot because he refused to take the loyalty oath required by that state's anti-subversive law.
