### Mrs. Hanson Enters Plea of Not Guilty

Corvallis, Nov. 21 (AP)—Mrs. Sigurd Hansen, 53, charged with murder in the death of her husband, pleaded innocent yesterday before Circuit Judge Fred McHenry.

The battered body of her husband was found Sept. 10 in the garage of an apartment building where they lived. She was arrested in Eugene Saturday after a Benton county grand jury returned a secret indictment charging first degree murder.

A tentative date of Dec. 12 was set for her trial. Meanwhile, because of her health, she was ordered confined in Multnomah county jail quarters for women until the trial date. Her physician had her placed in a Corvallis hospital Saturday night, explaining she long had suffered from high blood pressure.
