25 Year Term Asked for Gold

Philadelphia, Dec. 7 (AP)—The government today demanded a prison sentence of 25 years for confessed atomic spy courier Harry Gold, and sentence was delayed until Saturday morning to permit "reflection" by U.S. District Judge James P. McGranery.

The delay surprised the crowd jamming the court room. Gold received it without visible emotion, and later was led back to his prison cell.

U.S. Attorney Gerald A. Gleason said his recommendation for the 25-year term had the approval of Attorney General Howard McGrath. And he charged that Gold, in helping deliver U. S. atomic and industrial secrets to Soviet Russia, had acted "in contempt of the authority of the United States."

Defense Attorney John D. M. Hamilton did not make a specific recommendation of sentence. Through a three-hour argument tracing Gold's background he emphasized that Gold "is not accused of conspiring to harm the United States."

Two Killed in Bomber Crash

Seattle, Dec. 7 (AP)—A B-26 air National Guard light bomber crashed and exploded 12 miles south of here last night, killing the two occupants and spreading wreckage over a four-acre area.

McChord air force base officials said the plane was on the 103rd fighter wing, Air National Guard, which is stationed at Bradley Field base in Windsor Locks, Conn. The crash occurred near Renton.

Air Force spokesmen said they did not know how long the plane had been in this area, but that it came west on a cross-country training flight and was on a round-robin hop between McChord and central Washington when it crashed.

At New Haven, Conn., Gen. George R. Stanley said the crashed ship was a Connecticut air National Guard plane. He said he was awaiting word from Seattle as to identification of the victims.

Unofficial sources said the plane might have been one of several sent from Connecticut to the west coast in September to tow targets for air gunnery exercises.

Names of the victims were withheld pending notification of kin.

Elizabeth Taylor Leaves Nicky

Hollywood, Dec. 7 (AP)—Elizabeth Taylor went home to mother after a "big fight" with her handsome bridegroom, and her studio admitted today she may not go back.

The beautiful 18-year-old star and Nick Hilton, who have been squabbling and separating ever since their storybook wedding May 6, had their biggest battle, friends said, over Hilton "treating her like a beautiful plaything when she wants to be a wife."

Miss Taylor packed up and went home to mother. Hilton is leaving town today on a business trip with his father, Conrad Hilton, and a brother to tour the Hilton hotel chain.

Hilton's 10-day business trip had been planned some time ago, and Miss Taylor was to move in with her mother tonight during her husband's absence. But because of their violent fight, which presumably occurred late yesterday, she left their home a day earlier.

Miss Taylor was to start work today on a picture, "Love Is Better Than Ever."

"They'll talk it over again when he gets back in two weeks, but it's doubtful whether they'll get together again," an official spokesman for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer said.

Canadian Wheat to Be Shipped to Japan

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 7 (AP)—Officials of the Canadian wheat board confirmed yesterday the sale of 7,000,000 bushels of Canadian wheat to Japan. The wheat is valued at \$14,000,000.

W. C. McNamara of Winnipeg, assistant chief commissioner of the board, said the first of 20 cargoes will be loaded here next month.

Ample Supply Of Manpower

New York, Dec. 7 (AP)—America's critical manpower needs for defense mobilization can be met.

That message was brought to the 55th annual congress of American industry today by Robert C. Goodwin, executive director of the office of defense manpower of the department of labor.

"I believe that manpower requirements under our current contemplated defense mobilization program can be achieved," he said.

Goodwin said millions of new workers are needed, and he predicted the total labor force will grow to 68,000,000 persons by next summer as compared with a peak of 66,200,000 persons in the total labor force last summer.

Conservation of America's resources in the war effort was a general theme, while mobilization for war was the keynote of the congress sponsored by the National Association of Manufacturers and attended by some 3,000 persons.

J. L. Kelly, acting director of the national production authority's office of small business, said NPA learned a lesson from World War II and is determined to prevent "loss of production, waste of techniques and sacrifice of capital investment."

He said some shutdowns may come from the defense drive, but added: "The stakes are high and winning is the important thing."

U. S. Casualties Total 32,442

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—The defense department said today that 32,442 American casualties, including 5,816 dead, have been reported officially through last Friday.

The announced total was less than the actual number because of the lag in time required to notify the next of kin. It would not include many of the casualties suffered in the Chinese communists' big drive to crush the United Nations forces.

The new total, however, added 1,414 casualties during the week since publication of the last previous casualty summary. The army, with a total of 27,940 casualties, still bore the brunt.

Marine casualties in this summary list, the 15th issued since outbreak of the Korean war, totaled 3,907. The navy had 335 and the air force, 260.

The army reported 4,724 dead; 18,373 wounded; and 4,848 missing in action. The missing in action included 600 prisoners of the communists; 104 dead and 4,139 still missing.

The marines had 747 dead; 3,146 wounded and 14 missing. The navy had 50 dead; 229 wounded; 54 missing and two missing who have since been found.

Air force casualties included 95 deaths; 16 wounded; 127 currently missing; three prisoners of war and 19 once missing and now returned.

Retail Food Prices Jump

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—Retail food prices jumped seventeenth of one percent between Oct. 30 and Nov. 15. The Bureau of Labor statistics reported today.

The increase may lead to another hike in the cost of living index, which reached an all-time high Oct. 15. Figures for other items in the general price index have not been computed as of Nov. 15.

A survey of eight cities showed that a 7.2 percent jump in the cost of fresh fruits and vegetables during the 15-day period was an important factor in the food price rise last month.

The retail food price index soared to 209.5 percent of the 1935-39 average, and was 2.2 percent higher than on June 15, before the Korean war began.

U. S. Xmas Tree Bill To Total \$50,000,000

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—Americans will spend more than \$50,000,000 for Christmas trees this year.

This estimate forecasting the sale of 28,500,000 trees was made today by the agriculture department.

The department said this season's supply will equal last year's, and that prices are likely to be about the same.

The agency said about 21,500,000 trees will be cut in this country and about 7,000,000 imported from Canada. Montana leads the states in tree production, providing about one seventh of the country's cut.

Man of Peace's Trip

Dr. Bunche: 'Weeks Ahead Decisive'

Berlin, Dec. 7 (AP)—A man of peace journeyed on across war-shadowed Europe today.

Dr. Ralph J. Bunche glanced again at the crisis headlines in the afternoon papers as he left the ruins of Berlin for Oslo. As newly-made German friends clasped his hand and wished him Goodspeed, there was the inevitable question, the question he has heard on every hand in Rome, Paris and this battered city.

"Another war?"

On Sunday, the calm, patient, U. N. mediator who got Arabs and Israelis to end their bloodshed, will receive the Nobel peace prize.

It is perhaps the world's highest distinction. It comes at a time when, paradoxically, millions of desperate men are losing their hope of peace.

The 46-year-old "American" who carried through to success the mission of murdered Count Folke Bernadotte in Palestine has no answer as to whether a global war will be averted.

"It may be decided in the next few weeks," Dr. Bunche said ruefully today. "The present international situation is extremely critical."

"But I have no doubt that the only way to secure lasting peace is through the United Nations; if there is to be peace, it will be because the U. N. succeeds; if not, it will be because the U. N. fails, leaving the world with a catastrophe."

To Dr. Bunche, the United Nations "reflects the universal longing for peace everywhere." The urgent need of the mo-

2 Oregon Students Trying For Rhodes Scholarships

Oregon will have two representatives, one of them a Salem man, Thomas Bartlett, competing in examinations at Spokane Saturday for the Rhodes Scholarship at Oxford University.

The other Oregon man is Kalman J. Cohen of Pittsburgh, Pa.

A student at Reed college.

Young Bartlett, son of C. W. Bartlett, 1880 North 24th street, and Cohen led candidates in oral examinations given in Portland Wednesday by a sections panel. They compete against 12 other scholars from five northwestern states Saturday. Four of the 12 will get the scholarships.

A Salem high school graduate with the class of 1947, Thomas Bartlett, who now is home until after the Christmas holidays, is a senior at Stanford university.

Bartlett's first two years of college work were taken at Willamette university, where he had the Rotary scholarship. A political science major, he transferred to Stanford from Willamette and at Stanford has the Newhouse Foundation scholarship.

The Salem candidate was prominent in speech and debate circles here. In high school he won three state championships in speech, two in discussion and one in debate. He was president of the Salem high school student body his senior year.

When in Willamette Bartlett and Bob Sayre, were members of a debate team ranking among the top ten of the nation. He was a member of Phi Eta Sigma, scholastic honorary, and Beta Theta Pi fraternity.

While in Stanford he has served as president of the student world council of Northern California and was vice president of the Stanford International Relations club.

President Attends Charlie Ross Funeral

Washington, Dec. 7 (AP)—President Truman called off his weekly news conference today to attend the funeral of his press secretary, Charlie Ross.

Private services were held at the Ross home in suburban Chevy Chase, Md.

Ross died of a heart attack Tuesday. He had just briefed newsmen on the most recent conference between the president and British Prime Minister Attlee when he slumped over at his desk, dying almost at once.

The former newspaperman was 65.

After receiving the peace prize, Dr. Bunche will deliver seven lectures in Scandinavia, speaking first at Oslo and then at Copenhagen, Stockholm and Helsinki.

In the Swedish capital, he and his wife will be the house guests of Countess Bernadotte.

Dr. Bunche said he was very surprised, when announcement of the award was made in September, for he had felt that no single U. N. official could be singled out for the honor from an organization dedicated so completely to peace.

But he said he regarded it as a direct tribute to U. N. ideals, to Count Bernadotte and nearly a dozen of his staff who had died in Palestine, and to the cause of international settlements by peaceful means.
