

Oregon Payrolls Over \$ Billion

Payrolls of firms covered by the Oregon unemployment compensation law will pass the billion-dollar mark this year for the first time, the unemployment commission said today.

The commission made its prediction after finding out that payrolls for the first six months this year were at an all-time record of \$469,966,969, a 2.7 percent increase over the similar period of last year.

The record for a whole year was \$973,102,458, set in 1948. But this year payrolls are running ahead of that year.

Multnomah county's payroll of \$210,278,551 in the first six months of 1950 was \$1,600,000 less than in the similar period of last year.

Lane county was second with \$36,214,647, while Marion county placed third with \$20,013,898.

Following are the payrolls by counties for the first six months of this year, compared with the similar period of last year:

Linn \$15,734,797, up 4.7; Marion \$20,013,898, up 11.7; Polk \$6,150,619, up 18.5; Yamhill \$6,321,336, down 3.1.

Truman Writes Another Note

Washington, Dec. 13 (AP)—Word seeped out of the White House today that President Truman's advisers have urged him to cool off a bit before he answers his mail.

Even if he does, it will be somewhat like locking the barn door after Dobbin has been lost, strayed or stolen.

At least four of Mr. Truman's sizzling letters have popped into the headlines. And there's always the chance that someone will slip through his files and produce another one.

The office of Rep. F. Edward Hebert, (D., La.), disclosed last night that he had received a bitter note from Mr. Truman upbraiding him for "low" campaign tactics in Louisiana.

It said Hebert was "stunned" because it was in answer to his suggestion that Mr. Truman urge Americans to unite in prayer for God's help in the fight against communism.

The Louisiana congressman had asked the president to set aside a Sunday prior to Christmas on which all churches—Catholic, Protestant and Jewish—would seek the help of God in defeating "a Godless ideology."

The president sent Hebert a copy of his Thanksgiving proclamation calling on all citizens to "offer thanks to God for his gracious guidance and help" and said that should take care of it.

His letter, dated Dec. 7, said: "I am extremely sorry that the sentiments expressed in your letter were not thought of before Nov. 7, when the campaign in your state, Utah, North Carolina, Illinois and Indiana was carried on in a manner that was as low as I've ever seen and I've been in this game since 1906."

Steelhammer Hits Neuberger

State Representative John Steelhammer rapped proposals for non-partisan election of legislators Wednesday during a question-answer period following a talk for members of the Salem Exchange club.

Asked an opinion on the non-partisan idea, Steelhammer immediately tabbed it as the brainchild of Senator Richard Neuberger, and said that "anything coming from Neuberger has two strikes against it already so far as I'm concerned."

"I'm for the two party system," Steelhammer continued, "both for efficiency and economy in the legislature."

He went on to explain that a group of democrats during the last meeting of the legislature "who heeded the siren call of Monroe Sweetland" held daily meetings in a "state official's office" for the announced purpose of improving operation of the legislature.

"Instead," Steelhammer charged, "they attempted to toss in issues to throw at the republicans in the 1950 campaign."

"If Neuberger would only carry on his reasoning (non-partisan legislature) so far as congress is concerned, it would be very interesting."

During his regular speech time, Steelhammer said the 1951 legislature would be faced with a rough session because of the added financial obligations which must be met as a result of voter legislation dealing with the bonus, schools and other issues.

He told Exchange club members that he had called pre-legislative meetings in an effort to get the law-making machinery and committees in condition to begin functioning with the opening of the 1951 meeting.

Steelhammer said in the interest of speedier action, committees would probably have fewer members in the coming session.
