Yanks Repulse

The withdrawal from Hungnam will leave the last strong U.N. outpost in North Korea in Red hands. Across the peninsula in the west, the bulk of the allied Eighth army was dug in on a new defense line south of parallel 38, the old border between North and South Korea.

In Hungnam, many Korean civilians being left behind were panic stricken. As the Chinese Reds swarmed down toward the beachhead from snow-covered hills, picked troops from five allied divisions mounted a strong guard. The defense perimeter stretched for a radius of 14 miles around the port, protecting Hungnam and its twin city of Hamung six miles inland.

The beachhead bristled with allied artillery, mortars and tank guns. Warships of the U.N. fleet slid along the Sea of Japan coastal waters, hurling steel into the Red Chinese concentrations. Marine Corsairs, navy Panther jets and other allied planes circled overhead, alert for any Chinese Red aircraft or to counter-attack an attempted annihilating climax to the smashing successes rolled up by Chinese ground forces since late November.

All on Beachhead
All 10th corps units were reported safely out of North Korea or leaving the Hungnam-Hamung beachhead.

This included the lone unreported U.S. Seventh division's 17th regimental combat team. This outfit was stretched along the Manchurian border at the Yalu river around Hyesanjin when the Chinese Reds struck November 25 in overwhelming masses.

A tenth corps spokesman said the 17th had reached the beachhead two days ago. Associated Press Correspondent Tom Stone flew back to Tokyo from Hungnam with the story and Associated Press photographer Max Desfor recorded the evacuation in pictures taken in a cruising military plane.

Landing craft nosed up on the beaches and against the docks. Small freighters with steam up at the quays took on their cargoes of men and supplies.

Some Equipment Lost
Front dispatches said there was no hope that all the mass of weapons and supplies could be carried away by sea. There wasn't the shipping for it. Loading in the once great shipping harbor was pushed under great difficulties.

General MacArthur's Wednesday afternoon war summary made no mention of the evacuation. Only 90 words long, it said Tuesday ground activity was limited to patrol actions both around Hungnam and in the west where the Eighth army is ranged in defense positions north of Seoul.

Rear Adm. Arthur J. Doyle commands the evacuation fleet. It was a tough job for the man who handled the daring landing at Inchon last September that cut off and smashed Red Korean resistance and the later amphibious operations along the northeast coast.

The committee agreed yesterday to priority for the cease-fire measure but Russia and several other countries said they had to get new instructions from their governments. They obtained a delay until this morning.

India's Sir Benegal N. Rau said he foresaw upwards of 55 votes supporting the plan to have Assembly President Nasrullah Entezam name two other delegates to serve with him (Entezam) as a committee to try to arrange the cease-fire as the first step for a Korean truce.

The United States and Britain have gone on record supporting it.

Entezam has given no public indication who his choice of negotiators would be.

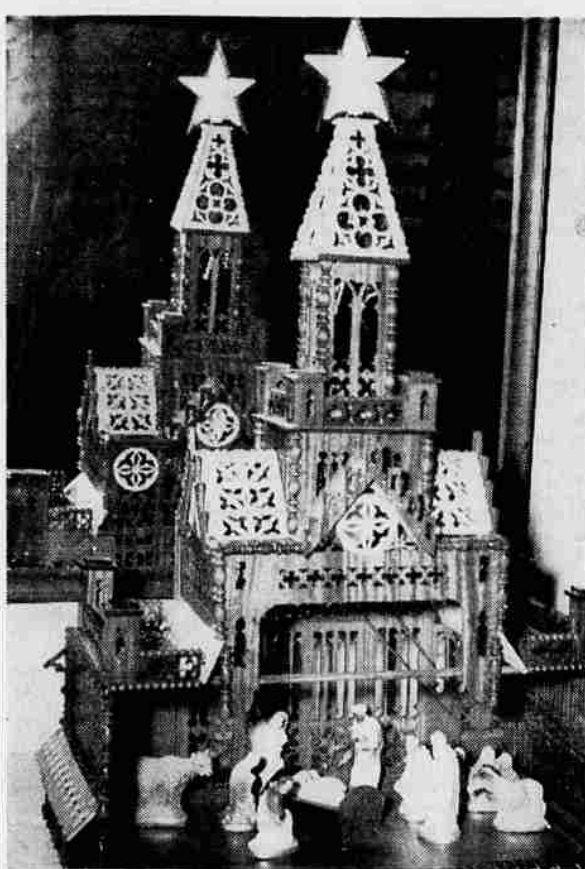

Salem Marine Writes of Escape from Hargaru Area

One of Salem's marine corps men was with the group that went into the Hargaru area and came out. He is Cpl. Darrell Burt, a member of organized marine corps reserve unit from Salem, which in late August was called to active duty.

Writing to his wife, who with their youngster, resides here, the corporal now hospitalized in Japan for frozen feet and wounds received en route out from Hargaru the corporal said:

"You will never know how good it felt to stand underneath a shower. The hair on the back of my neck was an inch long. Yesterday was the first day I had combed my hair in two months.

"I guess you have been reading the newspaper and know that we were surrounded by overwhelming odds and had to retreat. It took us two and a half hours to go into the area of Hargaru and took us three days and four nights to come back out.

"We ran into blockades on the way. The first one was at 6:50 o'clock the third night and they really had us sighted in. They killed quite a few and wounded a lot of us.

"I got a machine gun, but the mortar was too well hidden and we couldn't see him. My two buddies were on the third truck and they hopped off with a machine gun, but they were cut down before they could get it set-up. So I got off and took over. I didn't know anything about a machine gun up until then, but it didn't take long to learn.

"It seems that whenever I was firing the Chinese wouldn't fire—and I was firing constantly. I burned the barrel out of the machine gun, but it was worth it and I saved a lot of casualties.

"After the convoy had passed they opened up and there were six of us there with P-shooter, and carbines and one no-good machine gun. I ran out of ammunition and just as I stood up to get the other box a mortar shell lit right beside me, but I was lucky and didn't get any fragments in me. That, along with frozen feet, bought me my ticket to Japan.

"It's nice here in the hospital, or should I say recreation auditorium. The hospital is equipped for 500 and there are 3,000 here, so you can imagine how crowded it is. But, even so, they give us towels, shaving gear, cigarettes, etc., every day. They have a big ship-store and everything but, best of all, it is warm and that counts most.

"I am glad I am not up on that rock now, over in Korea." The corporal's brother, Sgt. Donald Burt, who was with the marine reserves inspector-instructor's office here before it was closed, is to arrive in Salem this week to spend a five-day leave prior to going to Salt Lake City for recruiting duty. Sgt. Burt is a veteran of World War II. The two marines are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Keith G. Burt of 635 North High street.

No Decision Reached on Rural School Annexation

No decision concerning the possibility of bringing into the Salem schools pupils living in the Rosedale, Prospect and surrounding territory will be made until further study of the situation can be made. The task of investigating was turned over to Superintendent Frank Bennett and he reported during Tuesday night's contract will be made.

The district has closed the deal for the T. C. Clark residence at 1935 South Cottage at a price of \$7326—appraised value plus 10 percent. The property will be needed in connection with the new high school construction.

The board agreed to pay transportation costs involved in the trip of Miss Mathilda Gilles, Richmond high principal, and president of the State Association of Elementary Principals to the national convention, scheduled for Atlantic City.

The superintendent was asked to express appreciation to the city firemen for the donation of \$100 with which to purchase hot lunches for underprivileged children. The money will provide meal tickets for five children for five months. Selection of the pupils will be made by the school administration.

The district will exercise its option on two lots at Royal and 20th streets, where a neighborhood school may be built. A third lot is needed to round out the necessary ground space.

The superintendent said he expected to secure plans of the Lincoln high school in Portland, now under construction.

Senator Taft of Ohio, acting as spokesman for republicans who attended the White House conference, dictated this statement to reporters:

"We agreed fully that a dangerous emergency exists for the people of the United States. We agreed with the president's general program for building up the armed services as rapidly as possible.

"As to the proposed declaration of a national emergency, we did not feel we were sufficiently advised as to the legal effect of such a declaration, or the program that must accompany it, to take a final position on that question.

"If the declaration is legally necessary to advance the development of our armed strength, we would be for it."

Go Slow Approach
Taft said the statement had the approval of other senate and house republicans present at the discussion with Mr. Truman.

From the statement, it appeared the republicans may have suggested a "go slow" approach to a declaration of national emergency which the administration was reported to be about ready to make.

Administration men have said such a declaration would not have any important legal effect, so far as increasing the president's powers is concerned. But they contend it would have a great psychological effect.

Senator Wherry (R., Neb.) told reporters he understands that Mr. Truman will hold two or three more conferences before deciding about an emergency proclamation.

Some diplomatic officials here believe part of this opposition is aimed at building a political case for virtually ending the occupation of Germany.

These officials feel that as the price for furnishing troops, West Germany will attempt to substitute for the occupation a security treaty with the United States, Britain and France.

The officials suggest that such a security treaty would give Atlantic powers the right to station troops in Germany for purely defensive purposes and keep controls on war potential industry.

How far the wary French—who can still bear the echoes of goose-stepping Germans—would go toward meeting such German demands probably will be discussed next week in separate Big Three meetings in Brussels.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson, British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman are expected to discuss this and wider world problems in private meetings while they are attending the Atlantic Pact conferences.
