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Republican Women Set Salem Day

Women from Portland and many other sections of the state are planning to attend the "Day in Salem," sponsored by the Republican Council of Oregon Women, Inc., next Tuesday, February 27.

Chartered buses are leaving Portland for the trip to the capital, the group to meet in the rotunda of the capitol building at 11 o'clock that morning, then proceed to the galleries of the house of representatives to be greeted briefly as a group by Speaker of the House John F. Steelhammer; then to the senate gallery where President of the Senate Paul L. Patterson will give a greeting to the group.

Immediately following the stops in the house and senate galleries the group will be received in the large reception room of Governor Douglas McKay, who is to give a brief greeting to the group.

At 2 o'clock the bus and private cars will leave the capitol for the McKay home at 395 Jerriis avenue, Mrs. McKay to receive the group at her weekly at home between 2 and 5 p.m. Wives or women relatives of former governors will pour at the home.

Unander, Portland, wife of the state republican central committee chairman; Mrs. Paul Ficke, chairman of the Marion county republican central committee; Mrs. George T. The buses will leave from the state house at 4 p.m. for the return to Portland.
