

Woodwork Operators Meet Tonight for Organization

Operators of Salem woodworking plants will have a dinner meeting Tuesday night, starting at 6:30, in the Capitol room at the Senator hotel to effect an organization similar to that already formed by the metal shop men.

Between 50 and 70 members of the woodworking industry are expected to be present, and any connected with the industry who have not been contacted by the Chamber of Commerce are requested to come nevertheless. The invitation list includes persons who have small shops at their own homes. It will be a no-host dinner.

Present will be John G. Barnett, from the Portland office of the national production authority, who is expected to answer a number of questions relative to contracts and subcontracts under the national defense program, which is the purpose of the industrial organizations now being formed here.

The metal men, who started their organization a week ago at a dinner meeting, completed it Monday night with a second dinner meeting at the Senator. The name adopted is Metal Industries of Salem, and a list of officers previously nominated was unanimously elected Monday night. They are:

W. W. Rosebraugh, president; Jack Neilsen, vice president; E. O. Bushnell, secretary; and Jack Reimann, treasurer. Directors are A. Truman Cummings, Ray Smith, and Carl B. Armbrist. The Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring organization, announced that representatives of the office of price administration and of the national production authority will be here from time to time to confer with the Salem industrial groups.

At the meeting Monday night the chamber distributed the first compilation of metals industries and the data they have furnished to qualify for participation in the defense program.

The executive board of the metals group will meet with Mr. Barnett Tuesday night at 5:30, prior to the wood operators meeting, and sitting with them also will be A. B. McClachlan in an advisory capacity.

Dr. Holy Tells School Bill Status

A report to the membership of the Salem Kiwanis club concerning the status of the various provisions of educational legislation recommended in the so-called "Holy report" was made Tuesday noon by its author, Dr. T. C. Holy.

Dr. Holy commended the senate and house educational committees for their "thorough going and conscientious" manner in which they have considered the more than 30 measures and constitutional amendments that have been presented in the present legislature. He said he felt that "some worthwhile legislation will come out of the effort."

Next Tuesday's luncheon program will be one in keeping with Holy Week observance.

Board to Estimate Cost of Initiative Bills

The house passed and sent to the senate Tuesday a bill for a three-man board to estimate the cost of initiative and referendum measures, and to publish these estimates in the state voters' pamphlet. Members of this board would be the secretary of state, state budget director, and the chairman of the state tax commission.

Another bill approved by the house and sent to the senate would make it a misdemeanor to abandon or mistreat a domestic animal.

The senate voted for a bill to give the state board of funeral directors and embalmers authority to license and regulate all funeral establishments.

1981 Cases Epidemic Flu Reported by Ore. Counties

Portland, March 13 (AP)—Epidemic influenza was reported in four more Oregon counties today and the state-wide total reached 1981 cases—a 59 per cent increase over last week's total number of cases—the state board of health reported today.

Crook county reported 200 cases, Jackson 809, Marion 422 and Linn 102 for the week ending March 3. These four areas have been declared epidemic by Dr. Samuel Osgood, head of the epidemiology department of the state board of health.

The number of pneumonia cases was up throughout the state almost 20 per cent—from 46 for the week ending Feb. 24 to 54 for the week ending March 3.

Dr. Osgood explained that in some cases pneumonia followed influenza attacks. He pointed out that Jackson county which has the highest influenza number, also has the highest pneumonia total—15 cases.

Jackson is the only area where the epidemic has held on for more than one week. Last week Marion county reported only 51 cases and Crook county, none. Jackson's total for the week ending Feb. 24 was 494.

Last week's other reported epidemic area—Wheeler county with 204 cases—reported a drop to 44 cases.

The disease was reported in these other counties: Benton 21, Clackamas 43, Clatsop 5, Columbia 4, Coos 3, Curry 47, Deschutes 8, Douglas 12, Grant 23, Josephine 32, Lane 2, Morrow 50, Portland 15, Polk 38, Tillamook 6, Umatilla 64, Walla Walla 22 and Washington 19.

Dr. Osgood said the figures did not represent a dangerous situation. So far the attacks of the virus respiratory infection have been mild. It is spread by close contact, he said, usually in poorly ventilated rooms.

Chemawa Fete Dated March 16

Chemawa Indian school was 71 years old February 25. A program commemorating the event will be held Friday, March 16.

By annual custom Chemawa will celebrate by crowning a queen, cutting and eating a giant birthday cake, holding native ceremonies and social dancing.

The celebration, originally scheduled for an earlier date, was postponed because of the flu epidemic. As in other years, the public will be welcome to attend the festivities, which are scheduled to be held at 7:30 in the school gym.

The Chemawa students have selected as their birthday queen Martina Quaepts of the Cayuse-Yakima tribe, who is a sophomore and comes from Pendleton.

Supt. R. M. Kelley will start the evening's program by welcoming the visitors.

Ceremonies planned for the program include: The Welcome Dance (Northwest), the Feather Dance (Northwest), the Swan Dance (Northwest), Hoop Dance (Northwest), Round Dance (Navajo), Squaw Dance (Navajo), Yeibechai Dance (Navajo), the Feather Dance (Navajo), Indian Dance (small boys) and War Dance (Northwest).

The Chemawa a capella choir and a girls' chorus will each contribute numbers. A square dancing exhibition will be staged to the tunes of "Alabama Jubilee" and "Step Right Up and Watch Her Smile."

The ceremony of the birthday cake, a much-prized event for the students, will precede the

final event of the evening, social dancing in which the student body and the visitors will take part.

Holy School Bill Passes House

The house of representatives completed legislative action today on a proposed constitutional amendment to have the state superintendent of public instruction appointed by the state board of education. He now is elected by the people.

The people will vote on the proposed amendment at the November, 1952 general election.

The amendment is one of the recommendations of Dr. T. C. Holy, Ohio State university education expert who recommended many changes in Oregon's school system.

Another senate Holy bill passed by the house today will give legal status to the state department of education.

The house vote on the proposed amendment was 38 to 18.

Rep. Earl Fisher, Beaverton, said that to have the superintendent appointed, rather than elected, is "another step in the wrong way—toward dictatorship."

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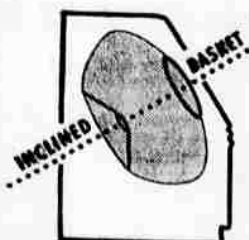
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What kind of a outfit is this?
