

# ChiSox Rookie Hurlers Show Hot Stuff in Game

Chicago White Sox Manager Paul Richards, an old hand at developing young pitchers, has two rookies on his squad that are passing their tests with flying colors.

Richards, credited with turning Hal Newhouser into a star with Detroit, has been imparting his know-how to Harold (Skinny) Brown and Lefty Marv Rottblat.

Brown and Rottblat showed Richards plenty as they teamed to blank the world champion New York Yankees, 5-0, in one of nine Grapefruit league games played yesterday. It was the first time the Yanks were held ruelss since last August.

The recruits spoiled the Yanks' appearance in Manager Casey Stengel's home town, Glendale, Calif. They set the proud Bombers down on four hits, two each by Hank Bauer and Phil Rizzuto.

Rottblat, who set the Southern association on fire last year when he won 22 games and lost nine for Memphis, limited the Yanks to one hit in five innings. Brown worked for Richards at Seattle of the Pacific Coast league in 1950, splitting 26 decisions.

Two veterans, little Bob Shantz Anrzejewski Scheib, also turned in a neat bit of pitching as the Philadelphia Athletics trounced the Brooklyn Dodgers 2-1 at West Palm Beach, Fla.

The duo limited the Dodgers to six hits. The A's, meanwhile, pounded Ralph Branca, former teammate Bill McCahan and Rookie Clem Labine for 11 hits.

In another well-pitched game, the Boston Braves shaded the Boston Red Sox, 2-1, at Bradenton, Fla. The Braves scored the winning run in the sixth on a single by Roy Hartsfield, an error and another single by Earl Torgeson.

The St. Louis Cardinals edged the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3, in 10 innings at St. Petersburg, Fla. Nippy Jones, attempting a comeback, drove in the winning run with a fly ball.

Tommy Upton, light-hitting shortstop of the St. Louis Browns, cracked a two-run homer with two out in the 11th inning to give the Browns a 6-5 victory over the Cleveland Indians at Burbank, Calif.

The New York Giants won a sloppily played 16-7 decision over the Detroit Tigers at Lakeland, Fla. The Giants rallied for

six runs in the eighth. Rookie Catcher Ray Nobel started the uprising with a pinch-hit home run.

The Philadelphia Phillies took a 8-5 drubbing from the Kansas City Blues of the American association.

At San Diego, Calif., the San Diego Padres lashed four Pittsburgh pitchers for 14 hits and a 13-2 victory.

## Players to Ask Voice in Naming Chandler Successor

Lakeland, Fla., March 21 (AP)—The rank and file of the major leagues—the players—will demand that club owners give them a voice in picking a new baseball commissioner.

The unprecedented proposals comes publicly from pitcher Freddie Hutchinson of the Detroit Tigers, official player-representative of the American league.

Sharply critical of owner policy, Hutchinson said yesterday that the owners will be petitioned in July to give the players a part in selecting a successor to A. B. (Happy) Chandler.

And if the club owners don't agree to this, Hutchinson said the players may hire their own commissioner to represent them on the official baseball council.

The players now have two representatives, one from each league, serving on the council. Their status is merely advisory.

"The first name suggested by players for their own commissioner was Happy Chandler," said Hutchinson.

The Detroit pitcher said most players favored retention of Chandler. The "average player" believed Chandler was fired by the owners because he did things for baseball players that were never done before, Hutch said.

## Clubs Ask Players for Confidence in New Boss

Baseball's front office executives generally adopted a conciliatory attitude towards the idea that the players, as well as owners be given a vote naming a successor to A. B. Chandler as commissioner.

Will Harridge, president of the American League, assured the players their interests will be protected "regardless who is commissioner."

"The major clubs put the pension fund and revised player contracts in operation and will add Harridge."

Freddie Hutchinson, Detroit pitcher and player-representative to carry them out, gave for the American league,

broached the player-vote-for-commissioner idea on Monday. He said that a petition will be presented to the owners at a meeting in Detroit in July.

If the owners reject the petition, the players may hire a commissioner of their own, Hutchinson said, perhaps the deposed Chandler himself at \$40,000 a year.

Bob Carpenter, owner of the Philadelphia Phillies, expressed a minority opinion.

"It's a bad situation," he asserted, "if the players have no more confidence in the owners than to want their own commissioner. Somebody should get in another business, the players or

the owners."

Joe Cronin, general manager of the Boston Red Sox, said "Hutchinson and the players shouldn't have any fears about what may happen under a new rule commissioner. Regardless of who the commissioner is, the ball players should have no fears."

In Los Angeles, however, Shortstop Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees, commented, "It sounds like a fair suggestion. The players should have some voice in the matter."


Hutchinson, in explaining his suggestion, said "we never have been told any official reason why Chandler was fired... we think it is our business just as much as their (the club owners)... baseball is our livelihood. For many club owners, it is just a hobby."
