MOSCOW VIEW: Time Not Now For Peace Talk

Moscow, June 13 (AP)—There was no outward indication in Moscow today that the Soviet union has approached the United States with suggestions for ending the Korean war, and this does not appear to observers here to be the time for an east-to-west appeal concerning Korea.
As far as can be judged from observation in this Soviet capital, the Russians regard the fighting in Korea as going satisfactorily—viewed from a long range standpoint. The Russians appear to be confident that the North Koreans and Chinese can prevent any western victory. So long as they do this, the Russians feel, they are winning in the long run.
Western diplomats here express doubts that the Soviet union at the present time intends any overtures to the west on the Korean question. They point out that the Soviets seem convinced the west cannot win in Korea and that the Americans and other western troops either will make a costly blunder or will pull out of Korea for some other reason.
There is nothing here to suggest outwardly that Moscow believes the Koreans and Chinese communists are experiencing serious reverses.

Socialite's Death Declared Suicide

White Plains, N. Y., June 13 (AP)—The death of socialite Lena Wilson Stillman, 41, has been listed as a suicide by Westchester County District Attorney George M. Fanelli.
Mrs. Stillman, who came from the Canadian backwoods to Park Avenue society, was the wife of Dr. James (Bud) Stillman, son of the late James A. Stillman, one-time president and chairman of the board of the National City bank.
Her body was discovered Sunday in bed at her home in Pleasantville, N. Y.
Fanelli said last night a note found among her effects explained her actions. The contents of the note were not revealed.
Earlier yesterday, the county medical examiner had listed barbiturate poisoning as the cause of death.

Independence Orders Removal of Grass

Independence—Police Chief Ray Howard issued a notice this week that two city ordinances require cutting and removing of grass, thistles and weeds from property within the city limits between June 1 and 15.
Failure to comply with the ordinances will mean that the city will have the work done, and property owners will be liable.
Ordinance 396 makes it a misdemeanor for owners of abutting property not to cut and remove grass, weeds, etc., from streets and alleys. Failure to clean out property or alleys makes property owners subject to fines of from \$5 to \$50.

Horse Rapidly Racing To Rarity, If Not Oblivion

Except at the race tracks and in sporting events, the horse is rapidly pacing "toward rarity, if not oblivion," according to the 1951 Britannica Book of the Year.
In 1950 there were 5,310,000 horses on U. S. farms, compared with 5,898,000 in 1949. In 1950 there were 2,153,000 mules on the farms, compared with 2,348,000 head the year before.
The rate at which the nation's horse and mule population has decreased is seen in a comparison of the 1950 figures with those found in an earlier Encyclopaedia Britannica yearbook, the one covering 1939. That volume shows that in the last 11 years the horse and mule population is just about halved, for in 1939 there were 11,100,000 horses on U. S. farms, and 4,307,000 mules.
By comparison, in 1939 there were 1,527,989 tractors on U. S. farms; in 1950 there were 3,550,000, exclusive of 275,000 garden tractors.

Beef Shortages In Oregon Cities

Portland, June 13 (AP)—Short supplies of beef turned up in two Oregon cities yesterday.
W. R. McBroom of the Irish-McBroom Packing company in Eugene, said his firm was no longer slaughtering beef animals because it can no longer make a profit on beef under present ceiling regulations.
He said the difference between what he had to pay for beef and what he received was so small it didn't pay to continue handling it. He said the firm would continue to slaughter pork.
Prineville, right in the heart of the beef producing area, reported a shortage in retail markets.
For most Prineville markets there was very little beef in sight for the next few days. One of the city's major markets had no beef at all yesterday.
Cattlemen in the area said they would not sell their animals at the present ceiling prices.

Medal of Honor to Cpl. John Collier

Washington, June 13 (AP)—The medal of honor has been awarded in death of Cpl. John W. Collier, 21, of Worthington, Ky., who smothered a grenade to save the lives of fellow soldiers in Korea.
Collier, a member of the 27th regiment of the 25th division, was killed last September 19 after he had wiped out an enemy machine gun nest blocking the advance of his company.
Earl Collier of Worthington, his father, will receive the nation's highest military award on here June 21.

Morse Would Break Relations

Baltimore, June 13 (AP)—Senator Morse (R., Ore.) warned last night that persons who would lead us into an all-out war with Russia now must be stopped dead in their tracks—by facts.

"The United States could make no graver mistake," he said in a speech, "than to follow the proposals made to the senate committees by Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer.

"We are in no position now to fight an all-out war with Russia without suffering hundreds of thousands of casualties which need not be suffered."
Wedemeyer told the senators he advocated withdrawing United Nations ground forces from Korea because "I just don't think we are going to get anywhere there."

He recommended this country break off diplomatic relations with Russia and her satellites. And like General MacArthur, Wedemeyer called for extended air and sea attacks against Red China, and "going it alone" against the communists if other U. N. powers won't back us up. Morse said that bombing bases in Manchuria would force Russia into an all-out war, if only to preserve her prestige.
Morse is a member of the joint senate committee investigating the dismissal of MacArthur as Far Eastern commander.

Bookies Sought On Indictments

Los Angeles, June 13 (AP)—U. S. marshals are busy today rounding up 68 bookie agents and ex-employees of the notorious Guarantee Finance company on tax evasion charges. Secret federal indictments were voted yesterday in the latest action against the loan company, which fronted for a \$7,000,000 a year bookmaking racket. Its top officials already have been convicted of bookmaking conspiracy charges and are now awaiting an appeal.
The Guarantee set-up took up much of the time of the Kefauver senate crime committee in its two visits here. The senate probers blasted the Los Angeles county sheriff's officers for failure to act against the bookie set-up.

Water Tank in Use

250 Acres in State Set Aside

Washington, June 13 (AP)—The government set aside 34,861 acres within national forests today for use as administrative centers, camp grounds, recreation areas and ranger stations.
Some of the forest land withdrawn from settlement or mining or commercial development will be used for skiing and other winter sports.

The lands are in 47 tracts in 14 states and Alaska. Although they are part of areas administered by the forest service in the department of agriculture, the authority for such withdrawals rests with the secretary of interior.
Marion McLawson, director of interior's bureau of land management, said in a news release the withdrawals are designed to prevent mining activities in the specific areas to be used for administrative or recreational purposes. However, oil and gas development will be permitted where circumstances warrant.

The lands withdrawn include: Oregon—Deschutes national forest, Todd lake forest camp, 170 acres; Whitman national forest, Marble creek forest camp, 80 acres.
Washington—Wenatchee national forest, Swauk creek recreation area, 240 acres.

Russians Halt American Travel

Vienna, June 13 (AP)—The Russians created difficulties again today on American travel out of four-power Vienna, but U. S. officials were optimistic the sudden Soviet obstacles would soon end.
Since Monday, the Russians have been returning unapproved American applications to cross the Soviet zone to the British zone of Austria—one of the two exit routes for U. S. citizens from Vienna.
The Russians refused to act on nine of 11 applications for permits Monday, and would not approve 11 of 19 more applications Tuesday.
U. S. officials hesitated to conclude the Soviets were retaliating for the forcible removal of a Soviet mission last Saturday from the U. S. zone of Austria.
"We believe that the matter may be ironed out quickly," an American official said.
