

Take Equipment to Insure Safe Season in the Sun

Scouts Going To Austria

Eagle Scout Al Trimble of Albany and Life Scout Harvey Rose of Lebanon will represent Cascade Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, at the seventh world jamboree of scouting to be held at Bad Ischl, Austria, August 3-13, according to announcement by Gordon Gilmore, Scout executive.

The two young men will be among the group of about 800 sailing from New York City, July 13 aboard the S.S. Argentina. The ship will stop a day at Algiers in North Africa on July 23 for a day of sightseeing and seven choices of tours starting from Naples on July 25 or Genoa July 26 will be available to scouts en route to the camp.

Following the jamboree there will be three tour groups, including three days in Paris. The American contingent will sail from Cherbourg, France, August 19 aboard the S. S. Homeland, reaching New York, August 28.

But the Academy award winning actor said his lawyer will represent him in Beverly Hills justice court today in the "peekaboo" poker raid case.

Deputies noticed the lights burning early Sunday morning at the Players club west room and peeked in the windows. They said they heard poker talk.

"Some busybody probably complained because we were playing after midnight," said the 72-year-old Coburn. "Who wants to play poker before 12 o'clock?"

His partners were Producers Paul A. Malvern, 48, and Howard S. Benedict, 49, and Writers Paul A. Yawitz, 50, and Morrie Ryskind, 55.

Coburn said the five have been getting together in a friendly game for years and no money was involved.

The deputies said they violated a county anti-gambling ordinance. Snorted Coburn:

"The law was never intended to harass friendly games. If this silly law were strictly enforced, there wouldn't be enough room in our jails."

A small fine is the usual penalty for violations.
