

Crowded Schedule Ready For Greater Keizer Days

Keizer — The coming of Greater Keizer Days to the suburban north of Salem has brought it the greatest excitement in its young history. The festivities will be held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 22, 23 and 24.

The excitement will begin with "Hi-Neighbor" day which will include many family and group gatherings on Friday.

At 8:00 p. m. at least 1,000 Keizerites are expected to be at the big ball game between the Salem Senators and Wenatchee Chiefs at Waters field. Bill Bevers, a Keizer resident and former New York Yankee star, will be Salem's starting hurler. Tickets have been on sale in all Keizer stores for the past two weeks.

More than a score of prizes will be given to Senator ball players, including everything from an alarm clock for an error, five dollars for the first player to start a rhubarb, to ten dollars for each home run. Wherever it is possible the prizes will be given while the game is in progress.

Biggest feature of the 15-minute pre-game ceremonies will be the first formal introduction of Keizer's honorary mayor. A suspense packed three week campaign was completed last week with Ray Laffey, assistant state attorney, coming out the winner. Ballots were given by all Keizer merchants with one vote cast for each ten cent purchase. The school band will be on hand to provide music.

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In the reviewing stand as judges will be Clay Cochran and Ed Schreder, manager and president of the Salem Chamber of Commerce; Coburn Grabenhorst, Robert White and Leo Reinmann, presidents respectively of the Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions clubs.

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Timber Sales Set by Bureau

Two sales of bureau of land management timber will be held during July, it was announced today at Portland by James F. Doyle, assistant regional administrator of the bureau.

Twenty-eight million board feet of saw timber and 2,700 linear feet of western red cedar poles in seven tracts in the Q&C area valued at \$592,521.75 will be offered at a special sale as follows:

Medford district by sealed bid, one tract, 2,435,000 board feet on July 3; Roseburg district by oral bid, three tracts, 8,015,000 board feet, July 2; Salem district by oral bid, two tracts, 14,900,000 board feet, July 2; Eugene district by oral bid, one tract, 2,974,000 board feet, and the red cedar poles will be offered on July 2. The timber is located in Clackamas, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, and Linn counties.

Four parcels of saw timber on public domain will be offered by sealed bids to be opened July 10. 1,051,000 board feet valued at \$26,144.70 is located as follows: Medford district, Jackson county, one tract, 400,000 board feet; Bend district, Deschutes county, one tract, 116,000 board feet, and two tracts in the western Washington district, one in Clallam county, and one in Whatcom county, with a total of 535,000 board feet.
