Eola to Form Fire District

Petitions are being prepared requesting formation of a rural fire district covering the Eola area.

As soon as the petitions are approved in form and printed they will be circulated among property owners of the Eola district. Twenty-five per cent of the voters must sign the petitions to make them valid.

When sufficient signatures have been obtained a board of directors will be named by the present temporary committee, and the matter brought before the county court for approval and setting of an election date.

The proposed district would embrace property bounded on the east by the West Salem city limits, on the north by Gehlhar road and on the west by a line running north and south from the westerly line of the Schuckling property, and on the south by Highway 22 and the Willamette river.

Members of the temporary committee are Ed Schies, chairman; J. L. Perkins, Harold Albert, Jack Johnson and Herbert Dalke.

Property south of Highway 22 is not included in the district because it already is included in the Independence district. However, a reciprocal agreement will be sought later with Independence to exchange fire protection, providing faster service.

Flood Waters

Ten locomotives had been placed on the bridge in the hope the added weight would enable it to withstand the battering waters of a record crest now close at hand.
But the center span gave way about noon.It was the third bridge knocked out in the capital city area in two days.
Rolling in muddy crests out of eastern Kansas where scores of cities and towns were struggling with overflows, the Kansas (Kaw) river by midmorning had inundated the Armourdale and Argentine districts of Kansas City, Kas.Then levees on the east, protecting the Missouri side, began crumbling.
Stockyards Submerged
City Manager L. P. Cookingham immediately ordered evacuation of the industrial district for the first time since 1903. In this area lie the city's famous stockyards, the Livestock Exchange building, the American Royal stockshow arena, the Armour and Co. packing plant, numerous other heavy industries and the Burlington and Frisco Railroad's roundhouses.The flood began backing up through city sewers. The Turkey creek pumping station of the city water plant was threatened with a shutdown. More than 600,000 persons using city water were asked to conserve supplies in anticipation of a shortage.
Back along the raging Kansas river, and in other flooded river basins of that state, rescue and relief teams were hard pressed.Aircraft from many areas, including the Coast Guard from New York City, were busy at rescue efforts but lowering skies made flying difficult.
The floods claimed nine lives in Kansas and two in Missouri earlier this week but vigilant disaster relief workers apparently had prevented any new loss of life.

An early morning overflow by the Kansas (Kaw) river flooded the Armourdale and Argentine districts in Kansas City, Kansas, licking at the heels of the last of 6,000 (correct) residents who had been herded from Armourdale during the night. Some fled with only the clothing they were wearing.

Oil Station Catches Fire
Gasoline from a half-submerged filling station caught fire during the wild down exodus and spread to a lumberyard and warehouse. Firemen, fighting their way through the swift flowing streets, succeeded in controlling the blaze after nearly a four-hour battle.The conflagration broke out in an area filled with huge freight yards, grain elevators and other plants. Water damage to these properties was unestimated.
In Topeka, the state capital, refugees poured into the Municipal auditorium, the Masonic hall, hotels and private homes. Almost 20,000 persons in the city of 80,000 have been forced to flee their homes.Two bridges linking the north and south sections of the city have been swept away by the Kansas river.
At Lawrence, about 20 miles downstream from Topeka, concern was expressed at mid-morning over the plight of some two score refugees marooned in two elementary school buildings in the northern part of the city. Swift currents prevented evacuation boats from reaching the buildings and unfavorable flying conditions prevented an airdrop of food supplies.

The Munroe altered its course and proceeded to the scene to investigate. The sloop had reported earlier that she was shipping water and had rigging torn away while she maneuvered through heavy seas in search of Sierks.

Sierks' disappearance was the first such accident ever to mar the Transpacific race and veteran yachtsmen gave 20 to 1 odds against finding him.
Freeman Lang, a Honolulu ham radio operator, said the L'Apache apparently insisted early yesterday morning that the Munroe make a final search in the area where Sierks was found. Judging from monitored radio conversations, he said the Munroe wanted to search downward from the spot where Sierks fell overboard.The Munroe is expected to arrive at Pearl Harbor at 8 p. m. Hawaiian time Friday (2 a. m. EDT Saturday). Sierks' condition was reported as "very good" despite the 30 hours and 15 minutes he was adrift.
Medical corpsmen aboard the ship gave him tetanus and penicillin shots and dressed four "very small lacerations." He was being fed small sips of water and kept warm in bed because of "moderate thirst, chills and exhaustion."

Cause of the fire remains a mystery, according to Fire Chief Mare Landon, who said that electricity to both buildings had been disconnected.

Filbert Spray Notice Given

The first spray or dust notice for filbert moth control has been released by Dr. B. G. Thompson, entomologist. Dr. Thompson suggests a lead arsenate or DDT program be used for control.

Growers following a spray program can use lead arsenate 3 pounds and spreader to 100 gallons water, or DDT 2 pounds 50 per cent wettable powder to 100 gallons of water.

The dust program consists of a 40 per cent lead arsenate dust, or 5 per cent DDT dust. Either of the dusts should be used at 40 pounds per acre.

Sprays or dusts should be applied immediately after receiving the notice. Dr. Thompson says that mating and egg laying by the female moths may occur within a day or so of the emergence date. Young worms may hatch from the eggs within a week.

Dr. Thompson's experimental work has shown that a DDT residue on the ground materially aids in control by killing moths as they emerge from the ground. On the other hand, lead arsenate has a more lasting effect against the young larvae than does the DDT.

For these reasons, Dr. Thompson suggests the following procedure for those growers who have not obtained good control with ordinary practices:

1. Apply thoroughly to the ground in the orchard either a DDT dust or spray. Apply at the rate of two pounds actual DDT per acre.
2. Follow the ground application with a lead arsenate dust or spray to the foliage.
3. Make the ground application as soon as possible after the emergence notice is announced.

Since the filbert moths have had two peak emergence periods during past years, another application will be necessary in a few weeks. Another news story will announce the timing of the second application for filbert moth control.

Cone Appointed—Edwin Cone, Eugene, was appointed by Governor McKay today to the Lane county public welfare commission. He succeeds the late Walter P. Fel, Eugene.
