Hayworth's Return to Films Depends on Public Opinion

Hollywood, July 13. (AP)—What of Rita Hayworth's future in Hollywood? Will movie-goers accept her again despite her much-publicized romantic wanderings with Aly Khan?

Those are questions Hollywood is asking as the breakup of her marriage and a return to films seem imminent. Millions of dollars may ride on the answers, but no one in the industry has them. In the end, it will be the public which decides.

Her studio, Columbia, suspended her when she first headed for Europe with the moslem prince two and a half years ago. But Columbia is willing to forgive, although it may be in no hurry to put her back to work.

President Harry Cohn declines to talk about it, indicating things haven't jelled as yet. Other sources hint she may go back before the cameras next week. A studio press agent put it this way: "It would be no good for her or for the picture if she tried to work before she has her personal affairs settled."

She still is in a "cooling off" period proposed by her husband before deciding definitely to file for divorce. Attorneys say, without giving details, that two of the chief problems — the matter of support for Princess Yasmin, 18 months old, and her religious training — have been settled. Rita has said she wants a \$3,000,000 trust fund settled on the girl. The prince wants Yasmin reared a moslem.

Miss Hayworth, one-time \$50 a week dancer in Mexican cafes whose nimble feet, ample figure and red hair combined to bring her movie stardom, wants to get back into pictures. She should. Pictures were good to her — \$5,000 a week worth. The studio would like her back, too. She has been good for it. Three of her films, "Gilda," "Cover Girl" and "Tonight and Every Night" grossed a total of \$20,000,000.

During 10 months of romancing with the son of the fabulously rich Aga Khan on the French Riviera, in Hollywood, in Mexico, Cuba, Ireland, England and Switzerland, she had many critics. An official of the General Federation of Women's Clubs urged a boycott of her pictures. A London newspaper called her "an insult to decent women." A Catholic magazine widely read in Hollywood was outspoken. Daughter of a Spanish father and an English mother, Miss Hayworth was reared a Catholic.

She and Aly were married in France in May, 1949. There was a civil ceremony one day, moslem rites the next. Seven months and a day later Yasmin was born. Aly said premature births were common in his family.

Aly's Father Not Coming to U.S.

Hollywood, July 13. —Prince Aly Khan's lawyer said today that Aga Khan, Aly's father, has no intention of coming here to help Rita Hayworth decide whether to divorce the Moslem prince.

The red-haired star has agreed to consider Aly's request to wait until Christmas time, rather than dash back to Nevada to make the split.

She conferred with Attorney Charles Torem yesterday, after Torem talked by telephone with Aly, but a friend announced later, "everything is status quo today."

Torem scouted reports that the Aga Khan might make a personal plea in his son's behalf. "The Aga Khan has no intention of interfering with his son's marital affairs," the lawyer said. "I feel sure that reports he plans to come here are wrong."

61 Die in Kyoto Flood

Tokyo, July 13. (AP)—Kyodo news agency said today 61 persons were dead, 184 injured and 103 missing in a flood Wednesday in Kyoto prefecture in southern Japan. The agency said the totals were based on police reports.

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343 Passengers Trapped on Train

Burn, Kan., July 13. (AP)—Bill Brant, a local rancher, was the only connection today between the outside world and 343 passengers on the crack Santa Fe streamliner train El Capitan.

The streamliner was marooned two days ago in a sea of water and gooey mud.

"I guess I've made four or five air trips in there," Brant drawled.

In those five trips he has brought out three babies, all less than four months old, their mothers, a 13-year-old child, and three sick women.

"I don't know who they were. I ain't much for rememberin' names," Brant said.

Besides the evacuees he had flown from the stranded train to Emporia and Newton, Brant had brought in enough meat, bread, butter, water and other supplies to feed the remaining passengers. There wasn't enough water for the passengers to wash. The muddy flood waters had been used for the boiler.

"They don't have any lights or fans either," Brant said. "The air conditioning system went out as soon as they got stuck there."

Brant flew in candles and two lanterns. He also brought a pump to feed the engine's boilers.

The Santa Fe railroad has been

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trying to get a convoy of six buses to the stranded train since yesterday morning.

Brant has made all his landings to get to the train on a narrow strip of pavement that was once U. S. highway 50, one of the state's major thoroughfares. Most of it is now under water.
