Fishing Reported Good In Most Parts of State

Portland, July 13 (AP)—With only a few exceptions, fishing is generally good throughout Oregon and anglers should have fair week-end luck, the state game commission said today.

The weekly bulletin said coastal streams were providing fair catches and trout angling was good on the North Umpqua river and in the Cascade lakes. Willamette area catches were reported fair to good and Willamette valley streams were said to be good in most sections.

The detailed report: Northwest—McKenzie river and tributaries are providing good catches, especially on dry flies. Drake and Caddis are preferred patterns. North Umpqua river is fair on single caddis and flies above Detroit dam. Water is rising below the dam. South Santiam and Calapooya are yielding good catches. All valley streams are low and poor. Bona fishing on Willamette sloughs and valley lakes continues fair to good. Crappie and bluegill catches are very good. The main Clackamas river and tributaries above the North Fork guard station, 7 1/2 miles east of Estacada, are closed to all anglers because of the fire hazard.

Good catches of 10-12-inch rainbow are being made on the upper Salmon river. Limer creek road is now open. Upper Sandy river is poor. Badger lake catches have been excellent and the lake will be accessible via Bennett and Barlow Pass roads this week-end. Monom and Olla lakes are good, especially on flies. Walhuta lake road will open this week-end and fishing is good on trout with Ford feeder and worms or using flies in the evening. Marion, Pamela, Clear, Lost, and other Willamette national forest lake reports show fair to good angling on all waters. Pine, single caddis, and spinner and worms are all producing good trout fishing. There is fair with a few bluebacks taken in the lower Elsie, Nescuse, Sitouah and Alsea bays.

Southeast—Trout angling is generally good on the North Umpqua river and in Cascade lakes in the Timpania area. Catches have fallen off in the South Umpqua. A good run of summer steelhead is now according to the North Umpqua and nice catches have been made in the stream.

\$1,000 in Prizes To Go to PITA Shooters in Salem

Over \$1,000 worth of trophies will be awarded as prizes during the Pacific International Trapshooters association's Oregon state zone shoot which opens at the Salem Gun club Saturday.

Thirty-seven trophies are at stake in four events — singles, doubles, preliminary handicap and grand handicap.

A number of special trophies, such as for the best score posted from each distance during the handicap shoots, best score posted among shooters over 65 years of age, etc., will be awarded.

The zone shoot will emphasize the awarding of trophies for recognition, instead of cash prizes. Many of the 100 shooters expected for the meet were arriving in Salem Friday, and taking practice shots at the clay pigeons on the Turner road traps.

The first half of the singles will be fired at 9 a.m. Saturday. The preliminary handicap is scheduled for a 12:30 p.m. Saturday start.

Sunday's action will include the second half of singles, doubles, and grand handicap events.

Rocky Asks for Louis or Charles After Layne KO

New York, July 13 (AP)—Unbeaten Rocky Marciano, the Brockton dynamite who blasted out Rex Layne in the sixth round, began moving his explosives toward Joe Louis and heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles today.

"We want Louis or Charles as his next opponent," declared manager Marty Weill, still deliriously elated at Rocky's upset knockout victory over highly touted young Layne of Utah at 35 seconds of the sixth round last night.

Stocky, swarthy Marciano of Brockton, Mass., achieved his 31st knockout in 16 straight victories before 12,565 surprised fans in Madison Square Garden with a looping right to the chin that dropped Layne as if he had been shot.

Chunky, fair-skinned Layne — bleeding from a six-stitch gash on his left brow, from his nose and from his mouth, and with two teeth knocked out — and his bridgework smashed — lay on his left side with knees slightly drawn up as referee Mark Conn tolled the count of 10 above him.

Before the 11-5 favorite suffered the first knockout and the second defeat of his career of 38 fights, he had been staggered twice in the first round, once in the third and once in the fifth. And he had been on the canvas in the fourth round in a half-knockdown resulting from a right to the body, accompanied by a wrestling bump. Only his gloves and one knee touched the canvas then.

Although the bout was neither televised nor broadcast to the general public, it drew only 12,565 fans and \$73,190 — about half what had been expected. In addition to the gate, the International Boxing club received \$10,000 for piping the bout to 11 theaters in eight cities.

North fork of Malheur has been fair to good on flies or bait. Nice catches of small rainbow and eastern brook have been taken from McDermott creek. The drain ditches are fair on worms. Angling in Lake county lakes and streams has been good.

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Star Flag Hopes Fade As Yanks Grab Hurler

Whatever plans the Hollywood Stars had for winning the Pacific Coast league pennant were abbreviated somewhat today with the loss of one of their ace moundsmen, Artie Schallock.

The little southpaw was purchased yesterday by the New York Yankees, who gave up three farm players and an undisclosed amount of cash for his immediate services.

The loss of Schallock could hardly have come at a more inopportune time, with the crucial Seattle series impending next week. With Seattle and Hollywood the prospective principals in the pennant drive, the Stars will need all the pitching help they can get.

The Yankees tried to provide some of it, at least, and at the expense of the San Francisco Seals, who can scarcely be hurt no matter whom they lose.

For Schallock, the Hollywoods get on option from San Francisco one of the PCL's brighter young mound prospects, Wally Hood. From Oakland, they get outright veteran catcher Eddie Malone. And on option from Kansas City comes another pitcher, Arnold Landeck.

The actual purchase was made from Brooklyn which, under a working agreement, was to pay Hollywood the

draft price of \$10,000 for Schallock at the end of the season.

There were no games last night while the teams traveled. One double header is on tap at Oakland in the opening of tonight's series with Sam Jones (11-7) and Guy Fletcher (6-11) pitching for San Diego against Johnny Vander Meer (0-1) and Frank Hardy (0-0) for the Oaks. Other assignments include:

San Francisco at Seattle: Manny Perez (4-4) vs. Earl Johnson (2-0).
