

Tri-City Slaps Senators, 11-4, to End Win Streak

Kennewick, Wash.—The Salem Senators, who had just gotten up wind on a winning streak, had that wind knocked right out of them Friday night as the Tri-City Braves slapped the Solons, 11-4, in a Western International league game at Tri-City park.

The loss put an end to Salem's abbreviated win streak, which had got only as far as three games. Salem had defeated Tri-City three games to none in a recent series at Waters park.

The Braves' victory was highlighted by a bases-loaded home run by Bud Peterson in the fifth inning. Until Peterson climbed his grand slammer, the game had been fairly close. The score was 3-1, Tri-City, when the big blow came to turn the contest into a rout.

Tri-City got off to a 3-0 lead in two innings off the pitching slants of Salem's Loren Monroe.

The Senators tallied in the top of the fifth to close the gap to 3-1 and set the stage for Peterson's mighty wallop. Monroe was sent to the showers after Peterson's blast, and Ludwig Lew came in to finish the game for Salem.

Tri-City kept right on rolling with three runs in the sixth inning, to make the score 10-1, and coasted on to win from there.

Salem got a couple of tallies in the eighth as Gene Tanselli doubled, Dick Faber tripled and Glenn Stetler singled. In the ninth, Salem got its final tally as Dick Bartle and Jim McKeehan doubled.

Salem and Tri-City tangled in a doubleheader Saturday night.

Louis Bid for Title Bout Upsets Heavyweight Scene

Camden, N. J., July 21 (AP)—The only thing certain about the heavyweight boxing picture today is that Jersey Joe Walcott is champion and that he has a very prosperous future.

Walcott is committed by contract to give Ezzard Charles a return shot at the title in New York.

But big question marks have suddenly appeared, fogging the heavy weight horizon.

The answer might come from Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing club that has exclusive rights to Walcott, Charles and Louis.

Up until yesterday, it appeared certain that the next big heavyweight fight would be a fourth Walcott-Charles meeting.

Then Felix Boechchio, Walcott's manager, let loose the state ment that Joe Louis had asked for the first crack at Walcott's title.

Said Boechchio:

"I told Joe it was okay with me if it was okay with the International Boxing club. Louis gave us two shots at the title. I think we owe it to him. Walcott will be glad to oblige Louis if Norris and IBC say okay."

Louis denied in Detroit that he had talked with anybody about a title fight but said, "I sure hope it's so."

The only comment from the IBS was from Harry Markson, the club's managing director. He said Norris told him the only fight he was working on was a return bout between

Walcott and Charles.

What has the Charles' camp to say about all this? The only comment was from the volatile Jake Mintz.

"Any report that Walcott will give Louis the first shot is a lot of baloney. We have an ironclad contract with Walcott for Ezzard to have first crack."

Salem Legion Defeats Stayton, Eyes Playoff

Salem's American Legion junior baseball team was looking forward today to the inter-district playoffs with the champions of the Newberg-McMinnville area.

The Capital Post team earned the right to enter inter-district play by defeating Stayton, 9-1, at Waters park Friday. The victory gave Salem the district 2B championship. Salem won two straight from Stayton in the playoffs, after Salem and Stayton had won the first and second halves, respectively, of regular season play in district 2B.

Ron Whittaker set Stayton down with four hits and struck out eight in chucking the Salem win Friday. Salem swatted

six hits off Dan Feller and Dick Cox of Stayton.

Salem started things rolling in the second inning, when it got three runs on a walk, an error, Jim Brown's single and Whittaker's double.

Salem added another in the fifth on an inside-the-park home run by Chet Schmidt, and added five more runs in the sixth as the game turned into a rout.

The lone Stayton marker of the contest was fashioned by Jerry Wipper's double, a stolen base and an error in the third inning.

Salem played sloppy ball afield, committing six errors, more than they've been charged with in any other game this season.

The win was the 11th, compared to only one defeat, for the Salem team this season.

Details of the inter-district playoffs will be decided later.

American Loop Tightens Race in Four-Team Drive

New York, July 21 (AP)—Four teams were in a virtual tie for first place today as the American league girded itself for the most spectacular pennant race in its 50-year history.

Only .005 percentage points separated the first-place Boston Red Sox and the fourth place Cleveland Indians. The Red Sox led with .598, followed by the White Sox with .566, the Yankees with .565 and the Indians with .563.

The log jam reached its height when the Yankees and Indians eked out 1 to 0 victories over the Browns and A's respectively last night and the Red Sox and White Sox lost. The Tigers beat the Red Sox, 6 to 1, and the Senators upset the White Sox, 2 to 1.

Pitchers who helped themselves with their bats were responsible for the Yankee and Indian victories. Tom Morgan pitched a three-hitter and started the Yankees' winning rally with a single off 12-game winner Ned Garver with two out in the eighth inning. Singles by Phil Rizzuto and Bobby Brown followed to produce the run.

Mike Garcia was Cleveland's hero in a brilliant pitching duel with Sam Zoldak. He allowed only four hits as he scored victory No. 12 and the Indians' 19th in 24 games and also started the tribe on the way to its run with a single in the 10th inning. Garcia was forced by Dale Mitchell but Mitchell scored the big run on Bobby Avila's double.

Meanwhile, the Red Sox and White Sox were playing their parts to perfection to create the four-way scramble. The Tigers rose up to batter Chuck Stobbs and his successors for seven singles and five runs in the fourth inning. Then Marlin Stuart, who was making his first start of the season, throttled Boston's sluggers with six hits to preserve the victory. It was Boston's sixth loss in 11 games on the current western swing.

Lou Kretlow shut out the Senators for the White Sox for eight innings but Eddie Yost singled in the ninth and Gil Coan, who had a perfect night with four hits, doubled to drive in the tying run. The Senators shoved over the winning run in the 10th on singles by Mickey Vernon and Sam Mele and an infield out. Mickey Harris, who relieved Sid Hudson, in the ninth won his fourth game.

The new rule outlawing jalopy races takes effect on July 22. So the boys are going to stage one grand and glorious smashup finale. That's at Hollywood Bowl Saturday night.

During the trophy dash, heat races, etc., the jalopies will be allowed to do just about anything they please to win the race-head-on crashes excepted.

In the main event, the last car on the track will be declared the winner. Again, anything goes but head-ons, and the object of the race is to knock the other fellow out of commission and keep on rolling yourself.

Many states throughout the nation have barred this type of racing, and other states are joining in quickly. By next season, jalopy races are expected to be a thing of the past.

Athletic Director Takes Over as Grid Coach at Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh, July 21 (AP)—In a surprise move, athletic director Tom Hamilton took over today as head football coach at the University of Pittsburgh. Hamilton said he will serve as coach for one season only.

The former player captain, who has been Pitt athletic director two years, replaces Len Casanova as grid coach. Casanova resigned a few days ago although he had three more years to go on his contract. Casanova, who had a prior 1-8 record with Pitt last season, left to accept a football coaching job at the University of Oregon.

Coaches Search For Solution to Platoon Football

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 21 (AP)—Collegiate football leaders throughout the country are "searching for a solution to the present platoon system," Lloyd Jordan, president of the American football coaches association, said today.

Jordan, Harvard coach, is attending the annual meeting of the national association of collegiate commissioners at the Broadmoor. He said he was present to "exchange ideas and not to make any recommendations."

The NACC, which is made up of the commissioners of the 10 major collegiate athletic conferences, plans to discuss possibly tomorrow the platoon system and spring football practice.

The Pacific coast conference has voted to ask the national collegiate athletic association (NCAA) to prohibit spring football training. Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt of the PCC said he would outline his conference's stand at the discussion here. "The commissioners' decision if any on the platoon system or spring football is not binding but their recommendations would probably be adopted by the NCAA."

Anglers Reminded Salmon Must Be Marked by Tags

Anglers battling a bonanza of salmon in Winchester bay and others preparing for the fall runs are reminded by the game commission that all sports caught salmon must be tagged.

Tags are obtained on a tag card issued free at any game license agency and they are attached to any steelhead or salmon 20 inches or more in length when the fish is landed.

Tagging is the means for enforcing the annual bag limit of 20 salmon or steelhead. In addition to preventing excessive catches the tag card is designed to furnish a measure of the salmon and steelhead catch.

A recent act of the legislature gives the game commission authority to use a punch card in place of the tagging system. The punch card method has been in use in Washington for steelhead. However, the punch card cannot be used until next year.
