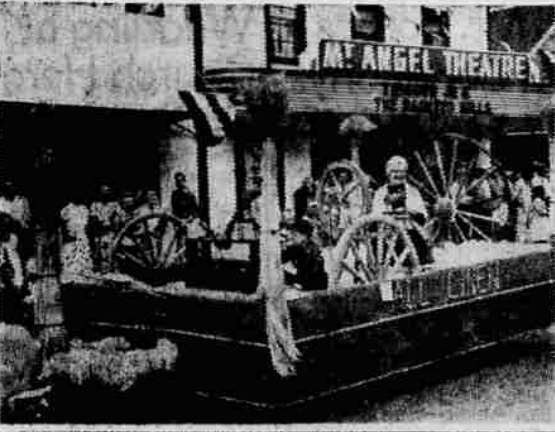

Restrictions on Logging Relaxed

Restrictions on logging operations in Oregon forest—limiting work to "hoot owl" shifts from 1 a.m. to 1 p.m.—were modified today by acting state forester Dwight L. Phipps.

The restrictions were imposed by the state forestry office August 3.

Phipps said the forest operation restrictions have been relaxed in the following areas:

Northwest Oregon state district, except for the Tillamook burn area, the Benton state district, the Lincoln county fire patrol district and the portion of the Siuslaw national forest that is north of the Lincoln-Lane county line.

The forest operation restrictions in all the national forests, state and private protection districts west of the summit of the Cascades is amended to permit operations until 2 p.m. (PDT), Phipps said. He added that all other provisions of the August 3 order will remain in effect.

Closure of two sections of the Mt. Hood national forest in the Clackamas river basin, except by permit, was ordered by Gov. Douglas McKay Saturday. The closed areas are the Fish creek and Standstone regions of the park.

Russia to Send

A total of 25 countries, headed by the United States, Britain and Russia, have now accepted invitations to the San Francisco meeting. The conference originally was scheduled to last only five days, with the grand signing ceremony Sept. 8.

Communist youth leaving their big parade heard instructions from East German communist boss Walter Ulbricht to sabotage western defenses by "all manner of strikes" in West Germany. He told them there would be ultimate ruin for West Germany if it rearm.

340,000 Guerillas Unite for Offensive

Hong Kong, Aug. 13 (AP)—Chen Hao, anti-communist resistance leader, says that 340,000 guerillas in southern China have united in one force and are preparing for a winter offensive against the communists.

Drought Damages Wooden Bridges on County Roads

Crops are not the only objects to suffer from the long drought. Ed L. Rogers, county commissioner, whose principal assignment is the construction and maintenance of bridges, reports this summer has been unusually destructive to wooden bridges.

Virtually every morning, when the county court meets for its daily session, Rogers has reports, either from his bridge foreman Ted Kuenzi, or residents, who state that planks are loosening, nails are working out and becoming a menace to tires or the spans are in other ways deteriorating.

It has become so bad at times that Rogers has almost felt it necessary to start out with a hammer and a keg of spikes to assist in the maintenance. However, Kuenzi and his crew of 10 have been able to cope with the situation. At present three men are being assigned to maintenance work exclusively.

As fast as the program can be maintained the wooden bridges are being replaced by concrete boxes or large tile. The latter necessitate considerable earth fills in some instances. Rogers estimates that 500 wooden bridges of varying length remain in Marion county. When he became county commissioner several years ago, there were 800. He had hoped to reduce the more pretentious wooden structures at the rate of 8 to 10 a year, but press of other county business has cut the replacement rate this year.

Cost of a concrete bridge over the wooden type was considerable a few years ago, but with the increased charge for lumber the differential is not more than 25 per cent at this time. Maintenance of concrete bridges is virtually non-existent. Whereas the wooden types must be entirely replaced every 10 or 11 years and must be redecked approximately every four years.

Speeding automobiles are largely responsible for the rapid deterioration of the wooden decked bridges. To eliminate as much as possible the working loose of the bridge decking, some of the bridges are being double decked, the second set of planks being applied parallel with the line of traffic.

Delivered to Others
J. A. Anderson, of Richmond, Va., president of the American Association of highway officials in a letter to Chairman Chandler, said he was of the frank belief that allocations of large amounts of steel had been made available to other claimant agencies considerably in advance of announcement of fourth quarter allocations, with the possible result that steel mills are so booked up with steel orders that rolling and fabrication of steel for highway bridges will be impossible during the remainder of this year.

Anderson is now in Washington, in an effort to aid in having the orders of NPA overruled by congress.

Highways Sidetracked
The main trouble seems to be that officials of the NPA are not aware of the importance of proceeding with essential highway work," Mr. Chandler said.

"President Truman has said that construction of main highways throughout the nation is essential to our defense effort, and yet his officials are not treating the states fairly, reducing steel allocations far beyond allocations granted to other applicants."

Chandler said that the allocation of steel needed for bridges throughout the nation was reduced in the fourth quarter from 250,000 tons to 100,000 tons.

Five state highway bridge projects and a private toll bridge at The Dalles will be delayed as a result of the action of NPA. In addition to the Salem bridges, the projects include the Snake river bridge at Payette, Idaho; Columbia slough bridge in North Portland and Willamette river bridge at Jasper.

Among the bridge projects that are authorized by the state highway department for immediate future, will also be delayed. Such projects include the four-lane bridge over the Willamette river at Wilsonville between Salem and Portland.
