Ex-Convict Terrorizes S. F. Crowds, Wounds Girl, 19

San Francisco, Aug. 13 (AP)—An ex-convict who wounded a 19-year-old girl and terrorized downtown crowds during two running gun battles with police, warned his captors that "I'll show you when I get out."

Escaping two police traps, James Alonzo Rogers, 35, was seized by two police officers last night at Sixth and Mission streets as he attempted to draw a .38 caliber German pistol from his trouser belt and shoot it out for a third time.

The former San Quentin convict was wanted in connection with the attempted robbery of a Millbrae, Calif., motel early yesterday. He was charged with robbery, assault with intent to commit murder, violation of the California gun law and auto theft.

"I might as well shoot it out all the way," the ex-convict told the arresting officers as they seized his pistol. "You guys have all you need on me."

Engineer Who Was War Prisoner Visits

Alex Moffat, who was a prisoner of the Japanese through World War II, is visiting in Salem at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Don Madison, 1555 North 24th, and says he would like to meet any Salem service man who was on Corregidor when he was.

Moffat is on six-months leave from his work as a construction engineer with Standard-Vacuum Oil company at Manila with whom he has been for 25 years.

When the war started Moffat was manager of an oil terminal at Manila, and under direction of the army was in charge of the destruction of large oil tanks for his and other companies to prevent their falling into the hands of the Japanese.

When the Japanese landed at Manila January 2, 1942, Moffat was taken prisoner and was held at Santo Tomas prison with his wife and two young daughters. The Japanese forced him to help restore the tanks. After working as a prisoner on Corregidor and in northern Luzon he was returned to Santo Tomas where he remained until liberated.

Moffat is a Scotsman. Some day he hopes to be an American citizen.

Bellboy Charged With Starting Fires

Miami, Fla., Aug. 13 (AP)—Albert Callahan, 30, a former bellboy, has been charged in county court with starting fires in two hotels and a tavern.

Deputy state fire marshal, A. M. Willis, said Callahan told officers he had a hero complex which caused him to set fires while he was intoxicated.

Willis said he admitted starting blazes in the Charles hotel, the Surfside hotel and in vacant rooms above the Allee club on Miami Beach.

Callahan was the "hero" of the Charles hotel fire. He suffered minor burns when he extinguished the flames in an unoccupied room. He was employed at the hotel as a bellboy. The Allee club fire caused \$12,000 damage.

Los Angeles, Aug. 13 (AP)—A top California fashion authority today said thumbs down to Paris' decree of hem down.

The word from Paris is longer skirts especially since Christian Dior came out recently endorsing the trend. That makes it official in the fashion-conscious French capital.

But G. Peter Rosenfeld, president of the California fashion creators, said his association will resist the trend.

"American women have the most beautiful legs in the world. Why hide them?" asks Rosenfeld. The industry association he heads do a \$500,000,000 annual business.

"Besides," he added, "Paris creates clothes only for those people who have nothing to do but dress up all the time. California clothes are functional."

The Paris decree would have the high water mark in skirts about 14 inches from the floor. Rosenfeld said such a length would look "ridiculous" on many women.

"American women have now found the becoming length in skirts — about mid-calf. They will not change."

Iowa Governor Says City Should Secede

Long Beach, Calif., Aug. 13 (AP)—Gov. William S. Beardsley of Iowa, here to address Saturday's picnic of 50,000 transplanted Hawkeyes, told reporters:

"I want to see Long Beach secede from California and rejoin the folks in the corn belt. Long Beach is Iowa's greatest city."

The governor and his wife, Charlotte, arrived by train yesterday, and were greeted by Carlyle F. Richards, president of the Iowa Association of Southern California. Two other governors are here for the picnic, California's Earl Warren and Luther Youngdahl of Minnesota.

Governor Beardsley said the Iowa corn crop has "snapped out" and is doing well, thanks to a change in weather. "We've been having humid weather that tortures people but makes the corn grow," he said.

Higher Freight Rates Aug. 28

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Higher rates on everything but grain and grain products will probably go into effect Aug. 28.

The interstate commerce commission ICC five days ago authorized a boost in most rail freight rates of nine per cent east of the Mississippi and north of the Potomac and six per cent elsewhere.

The ICC made the six per cent rise effective nationally on grain and grain products. The commission stipulated the public should have 15 days prior notice.

This was amended Friday to require 30 days' notice for the new grain schedules.

The Association of American Railroads had said it was told the higher tariffs would be ready for public display today. That would make the effective dates Sept. 12 for grains and grain products, and Aug. 28 for other shipments.

Noting that, the ICC said, the increases were designed to meet mounting over-all railway operating costs.

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Warren Would Extend CVP

Bakersfield, Calif., Aug. 13 (AP)—Gov. Earl Warren has urged the expansion of the Central Valley project "until all water in the state is being put to maximum use."

The governor and Reclamation Commissioner Michael Strauss spoke at festivities here inaugurating the \$400,000,000 irrigation project.

The CVP, which transfers water from northern California to the arable land in the central and southern San Joaquin valley was hailed by Warren and Strauss as the background for California's future development.

Commenting on the role of the federal government, the governor said: "We will work with the bureau and the government whenever necessary to solve our water problems, but we won't ask for federal aid unless it is necessary."

Reds Jail 500

Hong Kong, Aug. 13 (AP)—Prison terms of one to 15 years were meted out to 500 "counter revolutionaries" Aug. 6 by communist Chinese authorities in Shanghai, it was learned today. The 500 were condemned to undergo vigorous "reeducation through compulsory hard labor."

Everett Shipyard to Be Leased to Car Company

Washington, Aug. 13 (AP)—Rep. Henry M. Jackson (D., Wash.), said today the navy plans to lease its reserve shipyard at Everett, Wash., to the Pacific Car and Foundry company.

The company operated the yard during World War II but it has been closed for the last two years.

Mrs. Doug. MacArthur Hometown Adds Honors

Murfreesboro, Tenn., Aug. 13 (AP)—The home town of Mrs. Douglas MacArthur decided today to bestow another honor on her famous husband.

The city council voted to rename Broad St., which sweeps through this middle Tennessee town, MacArthur Boulevard. General MacArthur accompanied his wife to her home here in late April for a one-day celebration.

Egypt to Cancel British Treaty

Cairo, Egypt, Aug. 13 (AP)—The newspaper Al Ahran said today Egypt will cancel its much disputed treaty with Britain on Aug. 28. The treaty was signed Aug. 28, 1936.

Al Ahran said Egyptian foreign minister, Mohammed Salah

El Dn is now preparing a statement for the parliament denouncing the treaty.

The paper said nationalist groups are preparing celebrations for the cancellation of the treaty under which Britain garrisoned the Suez canal. The foreign minister told parliament last week there was no hope of working out a revision of the treaty by negotiation with the British.
