Recover Two Bodies Following Drownings

The bodies of two persons, drowned in swimming accidents, were recovered yesterday (Monday). James Courtney, 15, drowned last night in Jordan creek while swimming with companions near Jordan dam. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Courtney, Seio. Eleven brothers and sisters survive. The body of John McCoy Wood, 62, was recovered yesterday from the Santiam river near

the Sweet Home water plant. Coroner Glen N. Huston said Wood apparently drowned while swimming Sunday. His clothing and billfold were found on the river bank.

Huks Kill Eight
Manila, Aug. 21 (AP)—Communist Hukbong forces killed eight persons last night when they ambushed an army weapons carrier and armored car in Pampanga province. Several others were injured. The Huks escaped. Most people, it has been found, are unable to hold a camera and shoot a picture at less than 1/25th of a second.

\$1436 Is Found Ave. U. S. 1950 Income

Washington, Aug. 21 (AP)—American income in 1950 averaged \$1,436 for every man, woman and child, according to the commerce department. This was a gain of \$116, or nine per cent, over 1949 and was the highest dollar total in history, the department added in a report Saturday. A 6.5 per cent advance in the cost of living plus a rise in taxes cut down the net gain. Average incomes ranged from \$698 in Mississippi to \$1,909 in Delaware and \$1,986 in the District of Columbia.

Campus ROTC Ready to Work

With full appointment of four commissioned officers and completion of new campus headquarters the Willamette university AF ROTC program is ready to begin operation September 15, when students register for fall semester work.

New classrooms, offices and supply rooms have been renovated in the university gymnasium for the unit.

Major Gilbert H. Charters, assistant professor of air science and tactics has just returned to Salem, following a six week academic instructor's course at Maxwell air force base in Montgomery, Ala.

Three newly assigned master sergeants in the Willamette AF ROTC are currently enrolled in a similar course at Maxwell air base, preparatory to the unit's activation in September.

Major Gilbert H. Charters and Captain John W. Thompson, assistant professor of air science and tactics, are slated to enroll in a special 10 day course in world political geography at the University of Portland, Aug. 20. They will instruct the newly developed geographical course to freshmen AF ROTC students in September.

Major Norman W. Campion, professor of air science and tactics, will attend the annual conference of AF ROTC professor at 4th air force headquarters, Hamilton field, Cal., Aug. 27. Officers from the western states and Hawaii will be present. Hugh Given, Dallas, was appointed assistant military property custodian this week.

Kefauver Insists He Is Not Candidate

Washington, Aug. 21 (AP)—Insisting he is not a candidate, Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) says he has asked supporters to stop circulating petitions to put him in the Oregon primary as a presidential candidate.

He told a reporter that on a recent trip to Oregon he told friends "I wasn't a candidate" and "asked them to stop circulating petitions to put my name on the ballot."

Senator Douglas (D-Ill.) has taken a similar step, but his supporters have said they will go ahead anyway.

Saar Industrialist Released by French

Bonn, Germany, Aug. 21 (AP)—French occupation authorities announced last night they have released Hermann Roebling, 78-year-old Saar industrialist, after serving two and a half years of a 10-year war crimes sentence.

French High Commissioner Andre Francois-Poncet said Roebling—known as the "Krupp of the Saar"—had been "conditionally" freed for good conduct and because of bad health.

Roebling was convicted in January, 1949, of using slave labor and exploiting French industries during the war.

Capital Journal Ad Sells Home Quickly

Jockey Jerry Sullivan Dies From Injury

Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 21 (CP) Jockey Jerry Sullivan, 24, who suffered a broken neck in a spill at Exhibition Park, died yesterday in a hospital.

The English-born jockey was injured Saturday when his mount Alcie Walker stumbled in the back stretch during the sixth race, throwing him to the track.

Had he recovered, doctors said he would have been paralyzed for life.

Sullivan came to Canada two years ago. He is survived by his widow and one child.
