

## Bull and Four Others Fired

Portland, Ore., Aug. 21 (AP)—State Sen. Vernon Bull and four other employees of the Union Pacific railroad in the LaGrande area were fired, officials reported today.

A spokesman for the Railroad Brotherhood said Bull, a yardman, conductor and brakeman was charged with failure to put out the proper sign flag at Hermiton. The spokesman said there were other minor offenses.

Brotherhood officials said they were not convinced discharge was justified in the cases.

Other men discharged, according to the spokesman, were A. L. Chestnut, engineer of The Dalles, C. J. Gilson, C. H. Abbott, and H. F. Richardson, all trainmen from LaGrande.

Bull is a veteran state lawmaker. He was first elected to the house of representatives from Union county in 1934. He served as a senator from Walla Walla and Union counties in the last legislative sessions with membership on several prominent committees, including chairmanship of the controversial public institutions and welfare.

Last November, he was defeated by Rep. Lowell Stockman in a bid for a congressional seat from Oregon's second district. At one time, he was president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen in LaGrande.

## College Rolls Will Show Drop

Portland, Aug. 21 (AP)—The Korean war, high employment and confusion about the future will result in a substantial decrease in enrollments in most colleges in Oregon this fall.

That is what college officials said in a survey made by the Oregonian Saturday.

Oregon State college expects a decrease of about 30 per cent and the University of Oregon about 20 per cent compared with last fall.

Vanport Extension Center was the only school expecting an increase. Willamette University at Salem expected enrollments to remain at the present level.

At other schools applications from new students have fallen from 15 to 50 per cent.

## Larry Evans, 19, New Chess Champion

New York, Aug. 21 (AP)—Larry Evans, a 19-year-old sophomore at City College of New York, is the new national chess champion, youngest ever to gain the honor.

Evans defeated Dr. Ariel Mengarini Sunday to nose out by one point Samuel Reshevsky, a strong favorite at the start. Evans had a score of 9½ points in the 11-round competition.

Mengarini had defeated Reshevsky, known as an international grand master of the game, in the seventh round.

Evans, who started playing the game at 13, is the fourth to win the biennial United States chess federation tournament. Previous winners were Reshevsky and Arnold S. Denker, both of New York, and Herman Steiner, of Los Angeles.

## GIs in Korea Send \$500 for Flood Aid

Washington, Aug. 21 (AP)—President Truman has received \$500 from the Korean battlefields for flood victims in Missouri and Kansas.

Five \$100 money orders were collected from troops and forwarded to the White House by Master Sgt. Joseph Pastula of a machine gun platoon in Company B, 19th infantry regiment.

Pastula wrote that the GIs in Korea were so familiar with the picture of suffering that they wanted to do everything possible to alleviate such suffering at home.

Mr. Truman forwarded the contribution to E. Roland Hariman, president of the American Red Cross.

Miss Dunne, who's reigned as the town's No. 1 lady for almost two decades, thinks it's high time a few of the younger celebrities learned to mind their manners.

"Honestly, it's shocking the way some of them neglect the rules of good taste," she said. "They just don't seem to realize they're looked up to all around the world. It's time they discovered that's the very reason they have to behave themselves."
