THE BRIDE COOKS DINNER
 Broiled Paprika Chicken
 Cole Slaw with Cucumbers
 Bread and Butter
 New Potatoes
 Prune Whip
 Beverage

PRUNE WHIP
 Ingredients: 1 large egg white, dash of salt, 2 tablespoons finely granulated sugar, 1 five-ounce jar (about 1/2 cup) baby-food strained prunes, 1 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice.

Method: Allow egg white to stand out of refrigerator so it will be at room temperature; it will give greatest volume this way. Beat egg white and salt with rotary beater (electric or hand) until peaks form that tip over slightly when beater is slowly withdrawn. Beat in sugar gradually and thoroughly. Fold in prunes a little at a time, then lemon juice. Spoon into serving dishes; chill. Makes 2 servings.
