Salem Navy Dentist to Wed in Shadow of Kremlin

Moscow, Aug. 21 (AP)—Love will find a way, even in Russia. An American couple, Lt. Comdr. Irwin Edwards, Salem, Ore., and Jane Breckenridge, Orlando, Fla., are cutting through a maize of red tape, Russian style, so they can marry in the shadow of the Kremlin.

Edwards is a dentist assigned to the U. S. embassy and Miss Breckenridge is secretary to U. S. Minister Hugh Cumming. A Catholic priest, the only American clergyman available, has obtained special permission to marry the couple, neither of whom is Catholic.

The embassy has asked the Russian ministry of foreign affairs for an opinion on what steps must be taken to make the marriage conform with Soviet law. Under U. S. statutes the U. S. embassy headquarters, Spassko House, is U. S. territory.

Comdr. Edwards, son of Mrs. R. L. Edwards of 1580 Fairmount avenue and the late Dr. Edwards, left for Moscow last November and is an assistant naval attaché at the American embassy.

A regular navy man for 10 years, Edwards is a graduate of Salem schools and of the University of Southern California. He received his dental degree from the University of Oregon Dental school.

Comdr. Edwards' naval assignments have included duty on the USS Futon AS11 for 20 months during World War II, duty on the USS Helena, CA75 and just prior to leaving for Russia duty at the San Francisco naval shipyard dispensary.

Other shore stations have included Puget Sound naval yard dispensary; Tongue Point naval air station; U. S. Naval hospital at Corvallis; naval department at Washington, D. C.; and the National Navy Medical Center at Bethesda, Md.

His foreign duty has taken him to New Guinea, the Mariannas and Leyte with the U. S. support force in World War II, to Australia, Honolulu, Midway island, Eniwetok, Saipan, Guam and China and occupation duty in Japan. While on the assignment in Japan he was also out around Korea.

In the days when he was attending school Edwards was a member of the Oregon National Guard, spending 15 months with the National Guard as a private in the medical department.
