



Prep Gridders Shift Into High Gear for Weekenders

High school football gets going in earnest Friday night in the first full weekend of play in the 1951 season. Scarcely started in last week's openers, the play will speed up now with elimination games scheduled in 12 of the state's 16 class A districts Friday.

The biggest of the crowds will turn out at Portland, where the annual high school jamboree will be staged. The schools are hoping to better the attendance record of 32,319 established in 1946.

Update there was one district game last night, University High trouncing St. Francis, both of Eugene, 33-0.

Other games upstate will send the southern Oregon favorites, Grants Pass, to North Bend in a non-district encounter. North Bend is rated the top southwest Oregon team. In the same sector Roseburg will invade Klamath Falls in a non-district game.

Albany, pre-season pick as the Willamette valley's best team, will be host to Lebanon in an important district game. Bend will travel to Corvallis in another contest in the same district.

Astoria, the favorite in the northwest corner of the state, also will be in a district contest, meeting Hood River. In that same district Central Catholic of Portland will play Milwaukie.

The Tualatin-Yamhill Valley league, which constitutes district 4 of the 1-A teams, gets under way with a full schedule of games. Highly regarded Hillsboro will travel to Forest Grove, Oregon City to McMinnville.

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Fair to Good Trout Fishing Is Forecast

Portland, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—The state game commission fishing report told of fair to good luck over the state with top catches of rainbow trout in the southeast section.

The report included: Northwest—Fishing in the Willamette area and lower Columbia for crappie and cutfish continues to be good. The McKenzie river is still producing good catches in the upper section. Tributaries are very low and still poor. Dorena reservoir is fair. Trout snalling at the north coast is poor to fair above the tide and fair to good in the upper tide with more salmon being taken. Jetty fishing is poor to fair.

Southeast—Salmon fishing at the mouth of the Rogue is fair. Steelhead fishing in the lower Rogue is fair to good. Poor catches of rainbow and cutthroat are reported in the coastal trout streams. In the upper and middle sections of the Rogue river trout fishing continues to be good. Steelhead fishing is poor to fair in the Grants Pass to Galloway area, with catches made mostly on flies. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay is poor; steelhead angling continues good at Winchester and fair at Steamboat. Trout angling is fair in the upper Umpqua.

Central—Angling in the central region is reported to be very good in most lakes and streams. Three Creeks lake is very good but you will need your own boat as the concessions have been closed as of September 17. Big Lake lake is also reported good. Crane Prairie reservoir is producing limit catches. East lake is very good and fish fishing is also on trail. Steelhead fishing on the lower Deschutes is reported to be excellent.

Southeast—Lower Emigrant creek is yielding excellent catches of 10 to 12-inch rainbow. Upper Silver creek is good. Delinquent lake is very good on ball. Deer creek is producing limit of 8 to 10-inch rainbow. In the Steens mountains area, Fish lake, Indian creek, and upper Blitzen river are very good. Malheur county angling has been fair to good. In Lake county fishing continues fair, with some large fish being taken from Cottonwood reservoir.

Northeast—Early September high lake fishing in the Wallawalla has been good. Limit catches of eastern brook are reported from Horseshoe, Anenoid, Green and Steamboat lakes. Large rainbow have been taken recently on the lower Inaba and Wallawalla rivers. Eagle creek has produced excellent catches of rainbow. Maxene lake continues to be good on troll. Strawberry lake has been fair. Limit catches of rainbow are being made on the south fork of the John Day river.

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Yanks Show Clutch Power In Comeback over ChiSox

New York, Sept. 21 (U.P.)—If it comes down to the last inning of the last game of the season and the Yankees have to come from behind to win it for the pennant—don't bet against 'em.

The old sentimentalists who have seen Yankees rise to the occasion so many, many times in the past, will tell you there is a heart and a soul in those pin-striped uniforms even before they put the player inside of it. And maybe they're right.

There are many who tire of the Yankees winning pennant after pennant and there is a revival once more of that old cry that resounded through the golden era of Babe Ruth to "break up the Yankees."

But what is there to break up about a "powerhouse" in which day after day the opposition gets more hits, where not one player is among the league's leading batters, where nobody on the roster has driven in more than 85 runs in a league where the pace-setter has a total of 124, and where even in home runs, the old Yankee trade mark, there is not a challenging leader?

But despite these deficiencies, the heart, the hustle and that raw clutch courage are there when there is a game that just has to be won.

There could be no better illustration than in yesterday's smashing 5 to 4 triumph over the White Sox. Joe Collins, occasionally able to hit a long ball although he is not noted for it, connected for a three-run eighth inning homer, giving the Yankees the victory they needed to go half a game ahead of the idle Indians, who they now lead with a 91-54 won and lost record and a .628 percentage as against .52-56 and .622 for Cleveland.

After Chicago had taken a 4 to 2 lead mainly on the efforts of big Eddie Robinson who homered for one tally and tripled and came home on a fly ball for another, the Yankees looked beaten in the eighth. But Saul Rogovin, who had yielded no runs since the first inning got in trouble when Phil Rizzuto singled and Mickey Mantle walked. Then Collins delivered.

The Giants, who have been existing on hope alone found all of their dreams ebbing away after the Dodgers topped the Cardinals, 4 to 3, and the Reds put across three runs in the eighth inning to beat the New Yorkers, 3 to 1, for the first time in Cincinnati this season. That put Brooklyn 4½ games in front with only 10 more to play. And it means that any combination of five Dodger victories and Giant defeats will settle the issue—once and for all.

Carl Erskine, though touched for eight hits including three triples and two doubles, kept the Cardinals from being troublesome in the clutch and Gil Hodges set the hitting pace with his 3rd homer, driving in two runs for the day. A

ninth inning double by Pee-Wee Reese drove in the winning run.

The Giants were ahead 1 to 0 in a pitching battle between Jim Hearn and Cincy's Ken Raffensberger after scoring a run in the eighth on Bobby Thomson's single. The Reds rebounded in their half of the inning as Bobby Adams, Walter Post with fluke doubles, and Johnny Wyrostek with a slow bounding single drove in the deciding runs. The Giants tried to keep themselves alive when Relief Pitcher Kewell Blackwell put the first two runners, Whitey Lockman and Willie Mays, on base with a walk and a single in the ninth. Then he bled down and got Don Mueller on a fly and struck out Wes Westrum and Hank Thompson. Raffensberger received credit for his 15th victory.

In a night game, the Browns beat the Senators at Washington, 4 to 3, as Relief Pitcher Satchel Paige struck out the last four Senator batters and gained his third victory. The Browns scored the winning run in the eighth on Ben Taylor's triple

Hotshot Cougar Back Quits Team On Eve of Start

Pullman, Wash., Sept. 21 (U.P.)—A highly publicized sophomore halfback suddenly quit the Washington State college football team today, a day before the Cougars were scheduled to fly to Los Angeles for their season opener against the powerful University of Southern California.

Carl Williams, fleet 145-pound Negro who came from Dallas, Tex., via Compton Junior college, left the team this morning to the apparent bewilderment of the Cougar coaching staff. Coach Forest Evashevski had labeled Williams, a 5'4" scabback one of the most elusive backs on the coast.

Evashevski had no immediate explanation for Williams' departure. "He never even came around to say goodbye," the WSC mentor explained. Evashevski hinted that Williams, who is 19, had been unhappy with certain unnamed team adjustments in fall practice.

In the face of the loss, Evashevski said his team is in top shape for its opener Saturday with USC. The squad will leave, presumably without Williams tomorrow morning by plane.

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There were no other games scheduled.
