Boys Topic of Club Speaker

Salem Optimists at their Thursday luncheon meeting had as their speaker, W. W. Rosebraugh, whose topic was "Train the boy in the way he shall go." Safety Program Gets Good Start

That the survey of Salem railroad grade crossings made recently by the League of Women Voters will bring definite official action for removal of hazards was indicated at a meeting Thursday night at City hall.

Mayor Al Loucks, City Manager J. L. Franzen, City Engineer J. H. Davis and two aldermen, Albert H. Gilie and David O'Hara, met with Mrs. Robert Gangware, Mrs. John Goldsmith, Mrs. Ridgely Miller and Mrs. Frank Oettinger, all members of the league.

The city officials approved much of the report made by the league and will so report at the city council meeting Monday night. L. P. Hopkins, superintendent of the Portland division of the Southern Pacific, is expected to be at the meeting.

Engineer Davis, who recently made an inspection of the crossings, accompanied by engineers from the Southern Pacific and the state public utilities commission, said the results were comparable with those of the league's survey. The engineer was instructed to begin removal of foliage and tree branches that obscure warning devices at some of the crossings.

The city manager said he would hasten lighting improvement at the crossings, particularly along Front street.

More effective signal protection also is on the way.

Albany — Enrollment in Albany's schools had grown to 2,416 this week, City School Superintendent I. R. Halsey reported, with still more registrations coming in. Enrolled in the first seven grades were 1,400 pupils, an increase of 61 over the first day's figures; in junior high school 435 were reported, a gain of 10 during the week, and in the senior high school the total was 581, an increase of 13, for a total increase of 145 over the first day.

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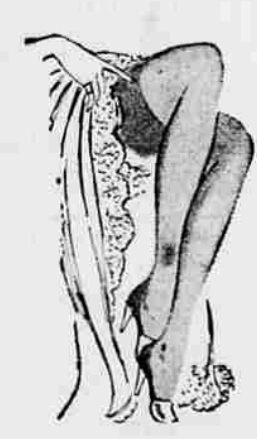
