**Dr. Vollmar Returns**—Dr. G. Kenneth Vollmar has returned from the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies where he participated in a course in basic uses of radio-active materials. # Fires Explode

(Continued from Page 1)

Mill City reported all business and mills in Mill City and Lyons shut down and the men sent in as fire crews. Last reports given by residents of Mill City were that the fire was moving toward that town on both sides of the Santiam river, with most of the fire on the Linn county side. They reported several families evacuated from Gates Thursday night, but not on a wholesale scale.

Friday morning reports were that the residents of Elkhorn had been evacuated, and those who had not left Gates had been alerted. Shelters were being set up at Mill City by the Red Cross with Delbert B. Hill, Jr., that town's Red Cross chairman, in charge.

**Fire Inside Fire Lines**  
It was a fire burning inside the fire lines on the Sardine creek fire that flared up and caused the spread, moving through an area that had already been burned previously and spotting into new spots.

The state forestry department at the time that the fire flared up in the middle of Thursday afternoon had 300 men on the fire. There now is no estimate of the number of men fighting it, they have been poured in so fast. A camp has been set up at Mill City by the forestry department and will be used as headquarters for the fire. The department has sent cooks and cooking equipment, plus other equipment to the camp.

The fire, which continues to spot, from about 5 p.m. through last night had moved from Sardine creek to just north of Gates and, the forestry department said, did not stop burning at all during the night.

**Burning Along Ridge**  
State police reporting by radio from the fire area a little after 11:30 a.m. Friday said the fire was burning along the ridge up from the old Sardine creek blaze and was right behind Gates to the north and about two or two and a half miles from Mill City.

At that time the fire was working more to the north in the direction of the Little North Fork of the Santiam. Quite a large fire was burning on the south side of the Santiam river across from Little Sweden, the police said.

**Report by Sheriff**  
Thursday night and Friday morning Sheriff Denver Young and his deputies were in that area. Young returned to Salem about 4 a.m. Friday and his chief criminal deputy, Larry Wright, about 6:30 a.m. Their reports were that the fire was burning mostly along the ridge north of Little Sweden and Gates. About 4 a.m. it crept down the hill to within 600 feet of the buildings at Little Sweden, but then the wind whipped it back up the hill before it reached the buildings. A spot fire, they said, had swept toward Mill City to the north.

**Situation Unchanged at Noon**  
Radioing into the sheriff's office late Friday morning Sheriff's deputy Harvey Frankum said that the situation was unchanged at the fire and reported the wind to be from the southeast direction and carrying the fire away from Gates. The wind was expected to reach 35 miles per hour during the day.

The sheriff's office said that loggers coming in from Elkhorn about 2 a.m. Friday reported the fire plainly visible on the north side of the ridge.

Two pumper trucks from Stayton went into the fire area, one at Little Sweden and one at Nisgara. During the night was a fire truck from Salem.

Sheriff Young said that while he was at the fire he noticed two families to have been evacuated. One was the Hampton family from the area directly north of Gates, who raise goats.

The extreme fire danger brought closures at midnight Thursday of all the areas north of Douglas county in Oregon and that part of Douglas county north of the Drain-Reedsport highway.

Keynote would serve as the keystone of a new command around which the powers here hoped to coordinate the strategy and armed forces of the key middle eastern countries, like the Arab states, even though they do not belong to NATO. The contention of the military men is that the practical basis for such an extraordinary grouping of countries could be found in their common need for a joint defense against possible Soviet attack.

**On Russia's Flank**  
The heart of the idea therefore is to forge a new and powerful military element on Russia's flank, to link it tightly with NATO through Turkey but not to be bound by NATO membership limitations in making it effective. The critical question now is what the reaction of Egypt and other non-NATO countries will be.

The plan was worked out by the standing group (American, British, French staff officers) of the NATO military committee within recent weeks at Washington, according to authoritative information, and is understood to have won the approval of the American joint chiefs of staff prior to the Ottawa conference.

He even made Time magazine of August 13 in a section devoted to medicine and his trained diaphragm.

Time said: "Few medical fakery have made the A. M. A. Journal as often as Urwiler. Besides a galloping case of the 'Munchausen syndrome' which makes hospital care irresistibly attractive to him, he has a rare ability: he can control his phrenic nerve so that his diaphragm flutters. This along with loud complaints of chest pains, helps him fool the doctors. . . his trick diaphragm is usually good for a comfortable bed and kind attention."

But his publicity brought his downfall in Salem.

A nurse recognized the patient at Salem General as the fabled faker of medical records. But his tall stories have endeared him to the nurses of the hospital. They think he's cute and seem to like him, notwithstanding his racket.

His doctor says he can leave any time.

## Lyle Thomas, Secretary of Farmers' Union, Passes

Lyle Thomas, 42, secretary of the Oregon Farmers Union and a former state representative, died Thursday night following a heart attack suffered while he was addressing a meeting of the Farmers Union at McMinnville.

He died almost immediately following the attack at about 9 p. m. Thomas had a heart condition for some time and had been under the care of a doctor for several months. However, he had remained active.

A native of Salem, Thomas was born January 15, 1909, and was a graduate of Salem high school. He graduated from the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth and the Oregon College of Education and had a bachelor's degree from the University of Oregon.

A teacher for a number of years, Thomas taught his first school at Zion school near Eugene. After one year there he came to the West Salem school as principal and was there a number of years. Thomas left West Salem to teach one year at Pendleton, then returned to this part of the country to serve as principal of the Dallas junior high school.

Thomas for seven regular sessions and for one special session of the Oregon legislature was a representative from Polk county and for at least two sessions was considered for speakership. He first was appointed to the legislature by the Polk county court and the succeeding years was elected.

A member of the Methodist church, belonging at Dallas since moving there, Thomas had often spoken pulpits, including the one at Brownsville, where he served for one full summer. He also was a member of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ruth Thomas of Dallas; two children, David and Mary Jane of Dallas; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac W. Thomas of Salem; a brother, William A. Thomas of Lebanon; and two sisters, Mrs. Evelyn Earley and Mrs. Ruth Hindman, both of Salem.

## Allies Smash

Infantry patrols on the flanks of the column were pinned down by fire from Red bunkers.

On the hitherto flaming eastern front, the five-weeks-old "battle of the hills" ebbed to sporadic clashes.

The armored thrusts on the central front were the first heavy allied attacks in that sector since the communist offensive last May was rolled back.

The assault force led deep into the broad valley forming area before it ran into firm resistance.

"The boys are beginning to have a little trouble," an allied officer said.

Front line reports said one spearhead was locked in savage combat with Red troops swarming on all sides.

Overhead, allied warplanes darkened the skies.

**Operation Cleaver**  
The thrust was dubbed "Operation Cleaver." But it was not officially labeled an offensive. Rather, it was an armored raid.

Pyeonggang, apex of the triangle which key cities is bounded by the key cities of Chorwon on the southwest and Kumhwa on the southeast, is 29 miles north of batter 38.

Blistering flared across 80 miles of the Korean front, all the way from the triangle area eastward to the Sea of Japan.

On the mountainous east-central front, leathernecks of the U. S. first marine division knocked nearly 2,000 Reds off a 3,000 foot peak they had defended stubbornly four days.

In more than four hours of savage fighting the marines pried the Reds out of their eight-foot bunkers and captured the high ground.

Nearly, a marine company which was ferried to a hilltop by helicopter Thursday linked up with the main allied force. No enemy opposition was reported.
