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Fall Classes To Begin At YWCA

Lampshade making is one of the new classes which offers the opportunity to make shades for an old lamp that needs perking up or ceramic bases made in a previous class. Materials that are most successful will be discussed and time will allow for the completion of at least a set of shades. Mrs. Frank Watt will instruct the class when it meets Thursday, October 4, at 7:30 p.m.

Millinery, another new class, will be taught by Miss Marie Baker on Tuesdays, beginning October 2 at 7:30 p.m.

The conversational Spanish class is an advanced group meeting on Wednesdays at 7:30 p.m. There is no charge and newcomers are welcomed, reports Mrs. Fred G. Starrett, leader of the group. The members have started meetings, but the nature of the group makes it possible to join at any time.

The course in English meets on Mondays at 7:30 p.m. and will not begin until October 8. The group is organized by Mrs. W. S. Ankney, Mrs. Lloyd Hockett and Miss Gertrude Acheson. There is no charge.

Beginning bridge is offered this season with more advanced classes planned later. Mrs. Arthur Lewis will instruct the group on Tuesdays, beginning October 2 at 10 a.m. The group will study the game from the beginning, learning the elements. Textile painting is a favorite that keeps its place on the schedule because of popular demand. The first meeting of the group is to be Monday, October 1, at 1 p.m. with Mrs. George Gregor instructing.

Next Thursday evening they are to entertain another group for a dinner at their home.

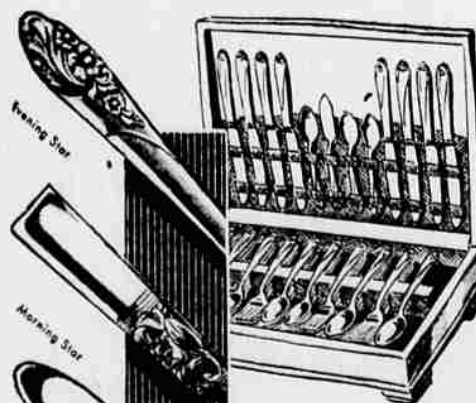
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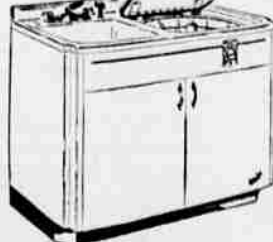
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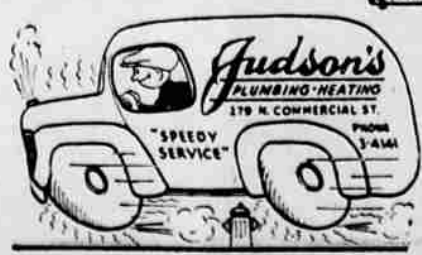
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
