

STUDENTS RETURN

Activities in Full Swing On Willamette Campus

Lines are shorter at the student book store on the Willamette campus today as most students have purchased supplies for the school year and settled down to the routine of classes and study after summer vacation.

Upperclassmen returned Monday to register for classes, while new students and freshmen completed registration Saturday. Freshmen were involved in a busy week of orientation the week before classes began, and social events such as a barbecue, mixers, and get-acquainted parties were planned for the new-comers in between orientation meetings.

Despite a current drop in enrollment in colleges over the country, Willamette is welcoming the largest freshman class since 1948 this fall with 312 freshmen registered. The total enrollment figure of 973 is only slightly below last year's total.

Students returning to Willamette have noticed a number of changes since last spring. Missing is the old football stadium on Sweetland field, which was razed during the summer, and several campus buildings have received new coats of paint inside. Installation of pay phones at all living organizations has lessened the number of calls, and Willamette men will be forced to add at least five cents to the cost of each date with a campus co-ed this year.

Uniformed men will be a new sight on campus as the AROTC program gets under way. More than 200 men will participate in the air force reserve officers training corps in Willamette's first military venture since the war-time V-12 program. Freshmen who pass entrance physicals will become eligible for two years in the basic course then may apply for advanced training as upperclassmen.

Members of Alpha Chi Omega returned this fall to a new chapter house at 610 15th street. Formerly the Lafky residence, the home was remodelled and enlarged during the summer to accommodate all members of the sorority.

All women's living groups on campus have secured new housemothers this year, while Baxter hall and the four fraternities have kept last year's hostesses. Miss Ursula Glaeser, Austrian exchange student formerly at DePauw university, is head resident at Bishop hall, re-opened this fall to house women students. Mrs. Lillian Watis is hostess at the Chi Omega chapter house; Mrs. Carl Raymaker is at Delta Gamma; Mrs. Elva Stanley, Alpha Chi Omega; Mrs. Betty Bucholz, Pi Beta Phi, and Mrs. Tom Watson, Lausanne hall.

Membership in the Associated Women Students of Willamette reached 265 this week as membership cards were sold during registration. Organized at the end of the school year last spring, the AWS will co-ordinate women's groups on campus this year. Projects planned include an all-school auction and offering an AWS scholarship to a Willamette woman.

YWCA "big sisters" entertained their "little sisters" at an informal party Wednesday evening in the Carrier room of the First Methodist church. Each incoming freshman and new student was assigned an upperclassman "big sister" by Chairman Joyce Frost of Portland during the summer. Big sisters wrote to the freshmen explaining Willamette customs welcomed them to the campus and helped them become adjusted to college life.

Freshmen will have a chance to become acquainted with upperclassmen this evening at the all-school mixer in the gym. Featured entertainment will be a "jam session," and new faculty members will be introduced by Willamette's president, G. Herbert Smith.

Football decorations will highlight the "SAE Kickoff Dance" tomorrow evening at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon chapter house. New pledges of all sororities and fraternities on campus have been invited, and pledges of Sigma Alpha Epsilon are sponsoring the affair under the direction of pledge president, Dale Ackerman of Camas, Wash.

Willamette's Bearcats will journey to Spokane tomorrow for the first football game of the season against Whitworth college.

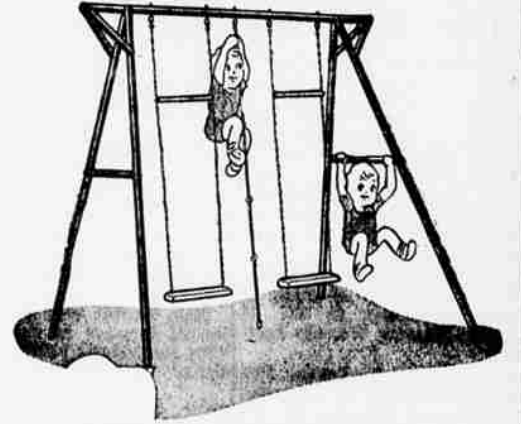
Benefit Dance Set

- Baked Eggs in Tomatoes, Creamed Peas and Mushrooms, Individual Fruit Salads, Buttered Toast Beverage

Baked Egg in Tomatoes

Ingredients: 4 fairly large well-ripened tomatoes (about 1 1/4 pounds), salt and pepper, 4 eggs, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 cup cracker crumbs (8 round flaky-type crackers).

Method: Wash tomatoes; cut thin slice from stem end of each. Do not cut into pulp wall of tomatoes, but remove center pulp with small sharp knife and remaining seeds and juice with teaspoon. (Use pulp and juice for soup or sauce.) Sprinkle insides of tomatoes with salt and pepper; place on small baking sheet or in shallow baking dish. Break an egg carefully into each tomato case; sprinkle egg with salt. Melt butter or margarine in small skillet over low heat; stir in cracker crumbs. Carefully pile crumbs on top of each egg. Bake in moderate (375 F.) oven 30 minutes so whites and yolks of eggs will be firm.
