

Wife's, Mother's Faith in 'Lost' Pilot's Return Is Rewarded

Tokyo, Sept. 21 (AP)—The wife and mother of jet pilot Capt. Ward M. Millar refused to believe he wouldn't come back. They put aside a "missing in action" notice and kept writing to him. To his commanding officer, they explained: "We feel confident he will return safely."

Millar last had been seen bailing out of a stricken F-80 Shooting Star behind enemy lines in June. A rescue plane failed to find any trace of him.

Today, his wife, Barbara, of Portland, Ore., and his mother, Mrs. Lysbeth W. Millar of Inglewood, Calif., knew their letters had not been in vain.

After 92 days behind enemy lines, Millar returned to allied lines—through means which cannot be disclosed—and was ordered back to the United States.

He had plenty of letter reading for the trip home.

Pope Criticizes Sex Education in Schools

Castel Gandolfo, Italy, Sept. 21 (AP)—Pope Pius XII Wednesday criticized efforts to increase sex instruction in schools, and urged Catholic parents to unite "without timidity" to defeat them.

The 75-year-old pontiff expressed horror over the flow of "obscene and erotic" literature which he said is corrupting the morals of youth and preventing proper preparation for marriage.

The pope's attack appeared to be aimed specifically at popular treatises on "sex life" and surveys of the sexual habits of individuals.

He told a group of French fathers that the Catholic church strongly opposes books which cheapen the sex relationship by exploring the "secrets of conjugal intimacy."

An estimated 2,000 persons were reported involved in the melee. The clash occurred in a working class district where numerous fights between east and west residents have broken out recently.

Rotation System Pleases Fighting Men in Korean War

New York, Sept. 21 (AP)—The war in Korea is not only halting communist aggression in Asia. It also is providing the free nations with a reservoir of trained troops for possible European duty.

Combat troops in Korea know this and are going about their job as a professional way.

While the American troops in Korea admittedly would like to be returned home, they realize at the same time that they are needed there. Morale is high and most of them are willing to do their share in Asia before being rotated to "stateside" duty and possible reassignment to Europe.

The battle-trained veterans of Korea realize communism is a real thing, a threat they must meet daily.

And to the men in the front lines, there can be no compromise and no half-way measures. You either win or lose—live or die.

Few had any hope for the Kaesong armistice talks from the beginning and were ready to slug it out if the truce talks turned out to be a trick.

At one time the officers and men in Korea would have been willing to pull out of that area on almost any terms, but that is not the case today. Most are willing to do their share and believe their combined efforts can hold back the Red wave there forever.

A big factor in the improved—and now extremely high—morale has been the initiation of the rotation system. Before rotation, the fighting men could see no end to their duty in Korea and morale hit the bottom.

Trooper's Idea of Bones May Permit Woman's Use of Arm

Wichita Falls, Tex., Sept. 21 (AP)—Oklahoma trooper Paul Scott's vague knowledge of bone surgery may enable a 37-year-old Oklahoma woman to regain full use of her mangled right arm. Mrs. Mildred Reynolds was one of four persons injured in a wreck on U. S. Highway 81 near her home, Comanche, Okla., Wednesday night.

Low Wallace Out for Mayor

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—Low Wallace, Portland insurance man, will be a candidate for mayor in the May primary election, he announced today.

The former democratic state legislator said his decision was prompted by a "draft Wallace" meeting Wednesday night at Pythian hall where 176 persons, led by ex-Governor John H. Hall, State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson and state democratic chairman William L. Josselin, asked Wallace to run and formed a committee to back him in his campaign.

"The interests of Portland are too important to waste the time of the city officials in petty bickering and quibbling," Wallace stated. "It is time to restore responsible government and leadership in Portland."

"Should I be elected mayor I shall bring to the office an earnest effort to perform my duties efficiently, constructively, effectively and honorably. I believe all citizens are important, and I have confidence in the people who want an administration such as this," Wallace said.

Troopers Scott and Joe Bowling, checking the wreckage, ran across the piece of bone, a sliver about five inches long. Scott said he almost threw it away, but suddenly remembered something about restorations doctors make these days.

After contacting a doctor in Comanche, the trooper rushed the bone fragment to Wichita Falls clinic hospital where Mrs. Reynolds had been taken. They made the 50-mile run in an hour.

Dr. Jack Maxfield, who performed an emergency operation yesterday on Mrs. Reynolds' arm, indicated the limb would have been rendered useless had the bone not been retrieved.

Dr. Maxfield immediately placed the bone in a chemical solution to prevent its deterioration. He said it will be sent to the Austenal Laboratories in New York City where a metal duplication can be made.

The doctor said the humerus bone in Mrs. Reynolds' arm broke off at the elbow and snapped in two. It pierced the flesh and slipped through the small opening into the wreckage of the car.

Dr. Maxwell said he has placed a silver pin in her forearm to keep the muscles in her upper arm from contracting.

Unless complications arise, Dr. Maxwell said he believed he could operate on Mrs. Reynolds in about a week or 10 days and place the metal mould in her arm. He said it would function like the humerus bone normally had and said it may restore the full use of her arm.

Mrs. Reynolds was driving an auto that collided with another driven by Joe Newton Watson, 29, of Duncan, Okla.

Watson and a passenger in his car, Miss Ann Cimmino, were injured but not seriously. Mrs. Reynolds' 20-year-old daughter, Betty, also was injured.

14 Mail Carriers Acquitted by Jury

Tacoma, Sept. 21 (AP)—A federal court jury last night acquitted 14 Vancouver, Wash., mail carriers charged with conspiracy to defraud the government and its post office.

The jury returned the verdict freeing the carriers after 3½ hours of deliberations.

The men were accused of making collusive bids for rural mail route vehicle contracts.

Dope in Fags Grabbed at Dock

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 21 (AP)—Customs Collector Howard MacGowan revealed today that narcotics valued at \$7,000 were smuggled ashore in packages of cigarettes by a sailor here Tuesday.

Sentries intercepted the narcotics as crewman Alexander Marshall, 35, attempted to take a carton of cigarettes ashore from the navy transport Gen. M. C. Meigs. The ship docked here last Friday with 4,498 returning Korea veterans aboard.

Marine Corporal Tony F. Foglia warned the crewman that rules permitted him to take only three packages ashore. Marshall took one package, gave the carton to the corporal and said he would return later for the rest.

The corporal said the cigarettes "didn't feel right" and handed them over to his superior officer.

Customs Agent Phil Fraser said the packages had been sealed open at the bottom and the center row of cigarettes replaced with the narcotics which included 321 capsules of cocaine and 13 packets of heroin.

Marshall told officers he had stolen the cigarettes from a shipboard locker.

The stuffed packages had been cleverly resealed.

Kitten Spends 48 Hours in Kiln 276 Degrees Heat

Spokane, Sept. 21 (AP)—Astonished workers said today a frisky month-old kitten apparently spent 48 hours in the searing 276-degree heat of a brick-baking kiln here and came out only singed.

Attracted by cries, a fireman at the plant put on an asbestos suit, broke open the kiln, reached in and got the cat yesterday.

J. C. Potts, operations manager for the plant, told this story:

The kiln was sealed Monday when green brick was piled in and the heat turned on. Yesterday, workers heard squeals. Fireman Homer Bartholomew got on his fireproof suit and looked inside. He spotted the kitten behind the kiln fire box. Bartholomew got some fish from a worker's lunch pail and dangled it out as bait. The kitten crept close and Bartholomew grabbed it.

Screen Turbines at Bonneville Dam

Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—Fish experts hope to save hundreds of fingerlings for future salmon runs in the Columbia river by screening off the turbines at Bonneville dam.

Don McKernan, research di-

rector for the Oregon game commission, said yesterday that studies since 1935 convinced him that about 15 per cent of the fingerlings coming downstream are destroyed by the turbines. He said a new screen used on the Cowlitz river was successful, and held promise that fingerlings could be diverted from the turbines. More tests are needed, through, before complete success can be assured, he said.
