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Capitalism Championed in Address by Ruth Alexander

Dr. Ruth Alexander, lecturer and columnist, presented the capitalistic form of government against socialism in an hour-long discussion Monday night, and when she had concluded, her audience of some 300 Salem Knife and Fork club devotees were pretty much convinced that something should be done to halt the gradual encroachment of socialism.

The assertion that Dr. Alexander's audience did not need much convincing that capitalism was much to be preferred over the Marxian brand of government should take nothing away from the speaker's ability. She knew her facts, had them well arranged, and it was not necessary for her to introduce a humorous vein into her discussion to hold her audience in close attention.

That the United States is further along the road to socialism at this moment than at any time during the past 20 years was one of the speaker's many emphatic statements.

"We set out to Americanize Europe and succeeded in having America become Europeanized," she declared.

She stated that we climbed on the socialist bandwagon when we went in for planned economy.

Then she went on to point out that under the capitalistic form of government the U. S. was able to produce the greatest volume of goods for the largest number of persons. So great
