

OSC, California Clash In Cow Palace at 'Frisco

San Francisco, Dec. 21 (AP)—The first double-header of the season in San Francisco's mammoth Cow Palace will highlight the west's week-end schedule of basketball games tonight when California battles Oregon State and Stanford meets the University of San Francisco.

Stanford's high scoring Indians, shooting for their eighth straight victory, are favored over the USF although the Dons upset Kentucky Kansas State last week.

Stanford has hit for an average of 83.5 points per game so far and the fast-moving quietest is led by speedsters Ed Tucker, Jim Ramstead and Ron Tomasic.

California will start a revamped lineup against the Beavers, who have a height advantage over the Bears. Coach Nils Price has replaced Guard Jim Doan with Tom Greenleaf in the hope the latter can snap up a large number of rebounds.

There are a number of top intercollegiate featuring tonight's week-end.

Tonight Wyoming meets Oregon at Portland, UCLA plays Denver in the Rockies, and Santa Clara visits Brigham Young in Utah. In other games, Cal Poly vs. Nevada, Montana vs. WSC, Southern Oregon vs. Oregon Tech, Pomona vs. Chico State and Puget Sound vs. Seattle.

Tomorrow night Wyoming and Oregon tangle again, Washington invades Minnesota, USC plays Kansas, Loyola vs. Stanford, Oregon State vs. California, Fresno State vs. Washington University of St. Louis, Mid Valley Fresno State vs. San Jose State, Santa Clara vs. Brigham Young, Montana vs. WSC, Southern Oregon vs. Oregon Tech, Pomona vs. Chico State and Puget Sound vs. Seattle.

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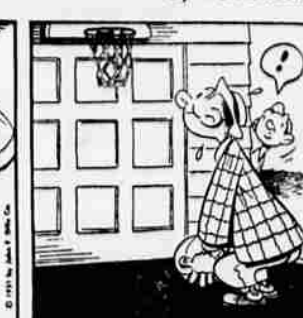

Bill McColl Awarded Voit Memorial Trophy

Los Angeles, Dec. 21 (AP)—Bill McColl, Stanford's great all-American end, has been awarded the first W. J. Voit Memorial football trophy as the outstanding Pacific Coast griddler.

McColl was named for the honor by Pacific coast sports editors, who gave him 31 points in a poll, four more than the runner-up fullback Hugh McElhenny of Washington.

The Helms athletic foundation, which supervised the balloting said players received three points for each first place votes, two for second and one for third.

McColl will receive the trophy Jan. 2 following his college career finale in the Rose Bowl from Willard D. Voit, son of the man in whose honor the award was established.

Others receiving points from the editors were Ollie Matson, University of San Francisco, 24; Les Richter, California, 10; Ed Barker, Washington State, 9; Pat Cannamela, Southern California, 5; Frank Gifford, Southern California, 4; Gary Kerkorian, Stanford, 2; Paul Cameron, UCLA, 1, and Don Klosterman, Loyola, 1.

Burr Fails to Notch 300th Victory of Year

Coral Gables, Fla., Dec. 21 (AP)—Try, try again was Charlie Burr's watchword today as he sought to join that exclusive set of jockeys who have ridden 300 or more winners in one year.

With 299 winners to his credit, Burr went to the post six times yesterday at Tropical Park in an attempt to nail down No. 300 but failed each time.

The 17-year-old jockey from Arkansas City, Kan., will get at least six more chances to reach the 300-mark today. He was named to ride Campaigner in the first race, Hyp Home in the fourth, Clytie in the seventh and Four Notrump in the eighth.

In the second race, Burr will ride either Solid Trick or Monte Cassino, and in the sixth race he will get the Mount Abroad Service or the Traveller.

Only six jockeys have ridden more than 300 winners in one year. They are Joe Culmore, Willie Shoemaker, Jackie Wastroppe, Johnny Longden, Walt Miller and Vince Powers.

Kazmaier Steals Show In East Grid Camp

Santa Clara, Calif., Dec. 21 (AP)—Dick Kazmaier remains the leading light in the camp of the East all-stars as they drill for next week's Shrine game. The Princeton all-American stole the show again yesterday during a double practice session that featured wind sprints, offensive plays and passes.

Duke University's sophomore punting star, Red Smith, led the Southern Conference in kicking with a 40.7 average on 47 kicks. Only one was blocked.

Big Ralph Kiner Top Slugger in National League

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Big Ralph Kiner of Pittsburgh was credited with the National league's slugging championship for 1951 today on the basis of his .627 percentage.

The Pittsburgh powerhouse compiled the mark by hitting for 333 total bases in 531 times at bat. Stan Musial of the Cardinals was second in slugging with .614, followed by stocky Roy Campanella of Brooklyn with .590.

Kiner also received the most bases on balls, 137, and of course, led the circuit in homers with 42.

Burly Gil Hodges of Brooklyn struck out the most times, 99, and Sid Gordon of the Braves rapped into the most double plays, 28.

Harry (Peanuts) Lowry of the Cardinals showed the best eye at the plate, striking out only 12 times in 114 games.

Andy Seminick, now with the Reds but then with the Phillies, and Solly Hemus of the Cardinals tied the same record dur- ing 1951 when each drew five walks in a single game.

Andy Pafko of Brooklyn was hit by pitched balls most often, 12 times.

Poorest slugging mark was the .390 figure turned in by Cincinnati.

Robinson to Get Buck for Title Bout with Olson

San Francisco, Dec. 21 (AP)—Sugar Ray Robinson will defend his middleweight title against Carl (Bobo) Olson of Honolulu for \$1 here Jan. 24. The 15-round bout, for the Damon Runyon cancer fund, was approved yesterday by the California state athletic commission.

Both Robinson and Promoter William P. Kyne will contribute all earnings except \$1 each to the fund. The fight will be held in the 8,000 seat Civic auditorium.

Robinson stopped Olson in 11 rounds when they fought for the title in Philadelphia.
