## Clean-Up Day in Circuit Court

Circuit Judge George R. Duncan and District Attorney E. O. Stadter, Jr. cleaned up Friday forenoon a bit of unfinished business held over from the day before when a parade of persons kept the court chambers full for more than two hours.

Charles H. Barnett, 35, now a resident of Mt. Vernon, Wash., entered a plea of guilty to a charge of non-support in connection with three minor children and was given a sentence of a year in the county jail. He was released on three years probation upon condition that he make monthly payments of \$50 which will be increased as his financial condition improves.

Larceny cases against Donald Dean Douglas and Everett Hoover were continued until Monday in order that the pair may secure counsel.

Lewis Onal Dutton, charged with threatening the commission of a felony, pleaded not guilty. Trial date will be set later and he remains at liberty under \$1000 bail.

Koe Moses and Frank Spencer, accused of the commission of a felony by obtaining money by false pretenses will reappear in court next Monday. They were given time in which to secure an attorney.

Convicts Blood Bank—There's been so much on the debit side at Oregon State penitentiary this week, with two guards arrested for infracting the rules and an escape plot caught while brewing, it's a pleasure to make this report on the credit side: When the bloodmobile drew up at the prison Thursday, convicts donated 28 pints of blood. That compares with 316 pints of blood contribute earlier this month in the entire city of Salem.

**New Meters Installed**—The city of Salem has finished installing in the downtown traffic metered district the short-time parking meters recently ordered by the city council. One meter is installed at the end of each block and two in the center. They are set for 24-minute parking time, or 2 cents worth, and are designed to relieve to some extent the car parking congestion on the streets. The meters are painted red to distinguish them from others.

**Refunds Ordered**—The county court Friday authorized refunds to those persons who have money due them in connection with the cutting of road pavement for the laying of pipe or for other reasons. When application is made for cutting the pavement, the person making the request puts up a \$50 bond to cover the cost of patching. If the cost does not run that high a refund is in order. The refunds ordered today were for the year 1949.

## Snow Shovelers Mob Hiring Hall

Detroit, Dec. 21 (AP)—Nearly 3,000 men seeking jobs as snow shovelers mobbed a city hiring hall last night.

Ninety policemen were called to restore order as the men pressed around the door of the hall, pushing and shoving to get in.

Police said most of the men were laid-off factory workers seeking money for Christmas. Officials said it was the largest group of job seekers since the depression.

After the men had been lined up, 1,000 were hired at \$1.41 an hour and sent out in gangs of 25 to clear the streets of snow and slush. The other 2,000 were turned away.

The crowd had formed early in the day at word that snow shovelers were wanted. Some waited all day.

## Chains Needed In Pass Roads

Highway snowplow crews continued their work in the mountains today, with chains needed in most of the passes.

## Fresh Snow

Chicago has had 37.5 inches of snow to date this fall, and all-time record for so early in the season. A normal winter season, including November through February, averages only 33.4 inches.

The city was battling a serious transportation problem and faced a cold wave tonight. Similar situations were reported in a number of midwestern cities.

**Two Storm Centers**  
In Washington, hit by heavy snow and ice, District of Columbia commissioners banned all cars without skid chains or snow tires from operating along 150 miles of heavily-traveled streets.

Two vigorous storm centers were reported by the U. S. weather bureau today, one in the vicinity of Chicago, the second near New York City. The storms brought rain and snow over wide areas from the Mississippi valley eastward to the Atlantic coast.

Snow fell over much of the Great Lakes region and the upper Mississippi valley and in northern New England.

Rain pelted areas to the south and east, with heavy falls in the middle Atlantic states, and in some sections of the Atlantic seaboard. Southeast winds of nearly 40 miles an hour, with gusts of gale force, were reported in New York City.

**1000 GIs Unreported**  
The U.N. note today said "more than 1,000 of the U.N. personnel named as POWs" in earlier broadcasts by communist radios "are missing from the roster submitted" Tuesday.

Other new names have been used since then on Red China's official Peiping radio. They were broadcast with purported Christmas greetings from allied prisoners to the folks at home.

The official Red roster named 3,198 Americans, 1,219 other U.N. soldiers and 7,142 South Koreans. The allies said they hold 132,472 Chinese and North Korean prisoners.

**To Meet Saturday**  
Friday's U.N. note did not say how many of the unaccounted for 1,000 were Americans.

The truce subcommittee on exchange of prisoners will meet Saturday for the first time since Tuesday. The question of what happened to the missing men undoubtedly will be the key to that session.

The allied offer to withdraw from all coastal islands was made by staff officers to another armistice subcommittee Friday. A U.N. spokesman called it a major concession.

"We are returning, without recompense, all islands formerly held by the communists," said Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols. "We are giving tangible evidence of our willingness to compromise. The reimbursement will be the communists' willingness to compromise."
