Lebanon Has Active Year

Lebanon—Improvement in health and recreational facilities made important strides in Lebanon during 1951. Construction began on the community hospital early in the summer. The 50-bed institution, costing more than half a million dollars, is expected to be in use before the fall of 1952.

Construction of a large municipal swimming pool on the high school campus was rushed to completion and opened to bathers in August. Booth park, Lebanon's first large city playground, was completed and has been in use since July.

A 500,000 gallon capacity clear well and storage basin, installed by Mountain States Power company provided another factor in insuring community health.

Industrial development forged ahead during the past year with initial construction under way by Cascades Plywood corporation of a \$1,000,000 hard board plant, designed to use all types of wood waste. Crown Zellerbach corporation reaffirmed its position in Lebanon's economy by announcing in December that a \$500,000 plant to dispose of waste liquor products from paper making would be erected at once on their paper mill property in North Lebanon.

The First National Bank of Lebanon continued to hold a substantial deposit lead over all banks in Linn county, and new banking interests announced the building of a second bank in Lebanon, a modern structure at Sherman and Park streets. Owned and controlled locally, the new Bank of Lebanon is scheduled to open early in the spring.

A three-year program of street paving was completed during the fall in preparation for the city's sewage disposal plant, which is the next sizeable development in civic improvement.
