Mt. Angel Officials Take Oath, Hear Yearly Reports

Mt. Angel — Oath of office was given Monday night to Mayor Jacob Berchold, City Recorder Edward F. Schaefer, Treasurer Alois Keber, councilmen Joseph Wagner and Andrew Schmidt Jr., all re-elected, William Blem, new member, and Louis LeDoux, who fills the unexpired year of the late A. G. Traeger.

W. Douglas Harris, city attorney, administered the oath.

Fire Chief Francis Schmidt stated the firemen had answered calls to two city fires and one in the county, had two fire drills and two meetings in December. They responded to 32 calls, 16 in the country, 15 in town and

one false, in the year 1951; held 158 inspections and corrected certain conditions. The total fire loss was over \$12,000, of which the largest country loss was \$7500, and in the city the greatest loss was \$1,000. Time spent in country was 19 hours and in city 12 hours.

Marshall Ed Korte and Relief Marshall Joseph Faulhaber reported on arrests and warnings and the latter told of three stop signs missing.

Joseph Hassler, water and general utilities commissioner, was commended by the mayor for his work during the year and the fine Christmas decorations for the city hall, grounds and city streets.

Mrs. Robert Drysdale and Vickroy were present to ask for sidewalk on Leo street improvement, and a light on Leo street near Gilles street.

William Predeek said he issued 25 permits for building in the city last year, and inspected them later.

Fred J. Schwab, president of the fire district, told councilmen he would meet with his officers within the week to sign the annual contract for fire protection.

Carl Mucken, chairman of the street committee, stated workmen had planned an additional 200 feet of storm sewer on Elm street, which job is to be completed Tuesday, Jan. 8.

S. Parzy Rose, representative of the Portland General Electric, advised Mucken that the light for May street would be installed this week. Mucken also stated that Jerry Farrer and J. Juve of the highway department, will be in Mt. Angel to advise on the parking problem here at the church and tell about the highway widening program.

The councilmen re-elected Francis Schmidt to again serve as fire chief of the Mt. Angel fire department. The following appointments were announced:

The Mayor appointed the Fire, Water and Park committee to study the ways and means of extending the water main for future development and to serve the Benedictine Sisters for fire protection.

The Mayor expressed his appreciation to the council for past service and asked them to work in unity for the city of Mt. Angel.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Pin Money Cookies
2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup soft shortening
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup shredded coconut
1 cup corn flakes
Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Put shortening and vanilla into mixing bowl. Add sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Add eggs; beat hard. Stir in milk. Add 1/2 of flour mixture at a time, mixing well after each addition. Fold in coconut and corn flakes. Drop by teaspoons onto greased pan 2 inches apart. Bake in moderate oven (375) 12 min., or until brown. Makes 4 doz.
