

53 Salem Area Names On 2nd Tax Jackpot List

A second list of names, totaling 53 persons in the Salem area entitled to refunds on federal income tax payments has been compiled. Additional names will be published as fast as they are processed by the federal collector of revenue in Portland.

Taxpayers whose names appear on the lists can start the process of getting their money by applying at the Portland customs house. There a short form will be provided which is for signature identification and to indicate they have not received their refund.

Report Made On Seal Sales

Latest reports from 31 counties in Oregon indicate that \$245,479.52 has been raised to date from the 1951 sale of Christmas Seals, Frank K. Morrow, treasurer of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health association reported yesterday.

"This indicates that the people of Oregon are continuing their tradition of strong support for the work of the association, for the work of the association," Morrow continued. "However, there are many people who intend to pay for their seals but who have not done so because of the Christmas rush."

"We hope that everyone who has not done so already will send in his Christmas Seal dollars," said Morrow, "in order that the association's program of tuberculosis prevention through public education may expand in the coming year. We are deeply grateful, however, to the many residents who have already acknowledged their Christmas Seals."

Morrow also praised the many volunteers and the enthusiastic cooperation of newspapers, radio stations, schools, churches, business firms, and labor groups and said that their tireless work had given a new insight into community teamwork.

The Christmas Seal sale is the sole means of support of the OTHA program in Oregon. Ninety-four per cent of the money raised remains in the state.

Rail Rates in State Upped

A decision by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel was issued Friday authorizing railroads to increase their intrastate freight rates in Oregon by 6 percent in line with similar increases allowed by the interstate commerce commission in its decision of August 2, 1951.

The interstate commerce commission order permitted increases in rates generally of 9 percent in the east, and 6 percent in the south and west of the Mississippi river, with lesser increases on lumber and forest products, fresh fruits and vegetables, sugar and canned goods, in lieu of a nationwide 15 percent increase requested by the railroads.

Lesser increases on these basic commodities of immense importance to the economy of Oregon were found justified because of the large volume of this traffic moving from the western states which must be marketed in the east in competition with other producers located much nearer to these markets.

Members of the commissioner's staff, together with representatives of other western commissions, appeared before the interstate commerce commission to justify this lesser increase as between western and eastern territory, so that the disadvantage with eastern shipper would be minimized. The interstate commerce commission acceded to this stand taken by the western shippers.

Oregon, as well as other western states, has generally allowed in previous increase cases a similar pattern of increases as permitted by the interstate commerce commission. The effect of this order issued today will be to bring the level of rates in Oregon up to those in effect on interstate traffic, and parallels similar increases recently authorized in California and Washington.

Much of the agriculture of Lower California is limited to irrigated regions in the north.

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Main Detroit Dam Structure Now 78 Percent Complete

The main structure of Detroit dam is now 74 per cent complete with concrete placed in the main dam, stilling basin, training walls and powerhouse, increased from 181,000 to 1,120,000 cubic yards.

This information was forwarded to Ivan E. Oakes, executive secretary of the Willamette River basin commission by Col. T. H. Lipscomb, district engineer of the Portland district of the army engineers.

Col. Lipscomb reported that the clearing operations in the Detroit reservoir area under three contracts is 80 per cent complete and under one contract for Big Cliff dam, located about two miles below Detroit dam, clearing is 59 per cent complete.

Placing of concrete at Detroit dam was interrupted twice in January because of heavy snowfall and clearing operations were

Design and fabrication of powerhouse and spillway equipment for both dams has been initiated under 35 various contracts, Col. Lipscomb reported.

Principal features of the Detroit project completed include the powerhouse substructure at Detroit dam; the river diversion tunnel and railroad location at Big Cliff; clearing operations under two contracts; the Kinney creek access road and Blowout Creek to Idanha Forest service road.
