Father Says Son Died for America

Castile, N. Y. (AP)—Frank E. Spring says his soldier son didn't die for any one man.

Spring accepted Sunday a posthumous Purple Heart award and citation made by President Truman to his son, an army air force bombardier who died during World War II in Germany.

Spring said he would not return the medal awarded his son, Lt. Merrill T. Spring, even though he did not agree with the President's policies. "This would not be in keeping with the spirit of the boy," he said. "It was America and not for any one man for whom my son died."

Delayed Blast Kills Six Men

Sacramento, Calif. (AP) — The delayed action explosion of a crippled Air Force bomber atop a crowded guard house killed six men and injured 61 at Mather Air Base Saturday.

Ironically, the 10-minute interval between crash-landing and explosion made it possible for the B-25's injured three-man crew to get out—but enlarged the scope of the tragedy.

In that interval, rescuers wormed their way from the shattered roof into the guard house, seeking to pull out men imprisoned under fallen beams. Then a fiery blast enveloped the one-story barracks in flaming gasoline.

"That did it. Completely demolished the building!" said Chaplain Howard B. Scholten, one of the rescuers.

One of the five identified dead was a fire fighter, atop the plane when it exploded. The other four were engaged in rescue work.
