Lebanon Cop Quits In Row

Lebanon — Assistant Police Chief Wade Collins, a member of the local force for several years, resigned from the department Friday evening. Collins handed in badge and credentials at the conclusion of a special council session that saw four of the five council members support Chief Ben Scheele in his recent demotion of Collins to patrolman status.

Collins charged that the police chief lacked the power to demote him from office, in that he was appointed to that post by the city council. This fact was proven during the special council session, which was called at the request of Collins.

Chief Scheele charged during the hearing that Collins had failed to carry out instructions ever since he, Scheele, took office April 3, 1951. He said that he had reported this fact to the police committee on several occasions and Clarence Shimanek, chairman of that committee, said the matter had been brought to his attention.

Collins denied he had failed to carry out instructions left by the chief, and said he had always left reports of arrest incidents, as he worked the night shift.

At the outset of the hearing Collins had asked that instructions in the police log be read. They request officers to log into the book all incidents relating to police activity.

Collins then produced a list of eight business firms which, he claimed, had lost merchandise to shoplifters during the Christmas season. None of the alleged thefts was found in the book. He questioned the chief's statement to the press saying there had been only one shoplifting case.

The chief said his department had not been functioning successfully and charged that Collins appeared to resent orders that he issued.

City Attorney Kenneth Wilshire advised the council that Lebanon has no post of assistant police chief in a legal sense.

Wilshire said that although the council had appointed Wade Collins to the post, upon the recommendation of Chief Scheele, the position was actually an assistant to the chief, rather than that of assistant chief.

Voting to support Scheele in his demotion of Collins were councilmen Glenn Gillenwater, Clarence Shimanek, O. M. Stevenson and Kenneth Fuller. Voting against the action was councilman Glenn Huston, who told the two officers that he felt the whole matter was one that should have been settled on a personal basis.

All five councilmen voted to accept Collins' resignation when he tendered it at the close of the session.

Will Multiply Low Cost Homes

Albany—Delegates to the annual conference of AFL Building Trades learned Sunday in their closing sessions, from Thomas Saxon, representing the San Francisco office of the Federal Housing Authority, that Oregon's allocation of low cost-low rent housing units for 1952 has been increased from 5,000, the 1951 allocation, to 50,000 units.

Saxon, in addressing the 150 accredited delegates at the Veterans' Memorial hall, and more than 50 guests, explained the workings of the housing authority.

The delegation at this conference, concurred with the painters in condemning the use of the "stud gun" in construction work, branding it as highly dangerous, particularly in the hands of inexperienced operators, and passed a resolution addressed to the state legislature calling for more stringent safety laws.

Likewise the state industrial accident commission was requested by resolution to expand its safety regulations particularly in regard to underground work such as tunneling and ditching, in which better protection for workers was held greatly needed. Many recent fatalities from both stud gun use and in underground work throughout Oregon were cited.

The delegates, representing 10 districts, including 53 locals, 11 building trade councils, and two central labor councils, reported last year's construction program throughout Oregon as gratifying and demand for construction in 1952 equally good, with building prospects excellent unless construction is curtailed by materials shortages.

Fire Destroys Albany Home

Albany—Fire completely destroyed the home of Mrs. Hazel Jerde, Albany RFD 2, on the Scarehill road, four miles northeast of Albany. This is the second time within a year that tragedy has struck Mrs. Jerde as she was widowed last July when her husband, Elmer, died in an industrial accident here.

Fire started Sunday evening and swept through the large two-story frame house leaving nothing standing but two brick chimneys. The Albany fire department was called but flames had consumed the building upon its arrival. Assistant Fire Chief Cecil Burkhardt, blamed the fire on a defective chimney.

Mrs. Jerde at present is visiting relatives in North Dakota. Her home was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Jim Cooper, and four of Mrs. Jerde's children. Mrs. Cooper is Mrs. Jerde's daughter. The fire was first noticed by Mr. Cooper, who turned in the alarm.

The loss has been estimated at \$7,000, partly covered by insurance.
