Gaines School Breaks Merger

Albany—Members of the Linn county district boundary board Tuesday granted a petition from the Gaines school district asking that this district, formerly Gaines No. 1, be separated from a consolidation into which it was recently voted and re-designated as a separate district.

The consolidation, yet to be completed, was approved in six districts, including Gaines, Happy Home, Reeds, Berlin, East Berlin and Mt. Hope, at district elections but the unification was found too cumbersome to be practical so far as the Gaines district was concerned.

The five districts, however, could be conveniently served by a school located somewhere near Berlin, from which the former Gaines district would be remote, it was found.

The restored Gaines district was instructed by the boundary board to hold a meeting early in February to elect directors. The meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Josephine Riddle.

According to W. H. Dolmyer, county school superintendent, consolidation of the remaining five districts may be completed soon, whereupon they may issue bonds to construct their school. Names and numbers of the restored and consolidated districts are also yet to be determined.
